Fr. Thompson's Reflections

Epiphany Chalk

Today is the feast of the Epiphany of the Lord, and I would like to devote my column this week to providing instructions for the tradition of "chalking the door." This traditional annual blessing of our homes, as with so many other Catholic traditions, has come back into vogue in recent years after a long period of bland attempts to replace or forget these treasures of our heritage.

Door chalking helps us at the beginning of our calendar year to remember to trust our homes to the Lord, a sign and symbol of asking God's blessing upon those who live, work, or visit throughout the coming year. It also helps us to "live liturgically," keeping the events of salvation history in mind; in this case commemorating the visit of the magi to the infant Jesus. In that same vein it is a reminder to us of the duty and blessing of hospitality to our neighbors. It really is a tradition small but deep in significance.

So, for those who aren't familiar (or those who just would like the procedure written out as a reminder). I began today's Mass with blessing a large quantity of chalk and marking the doors of our churches. After Mass today (or right now, if you took a bulletin after Mass), you are welcome to take one of the pieces of chalk home to mark the front door or steps of your home (some people like to mark all exterior doors, its up to you). What follows below is one version of the epiphany blessing of a home, but you can find a number of other versions online.

Take the blessed chalk and first write the initials of the three Wise Men, connected with Crosses, over the inside of your front door (on the lintel, if possible). Then write the year, breaking up the numbers and the year so that they fall on both sides of the initials. It should look like this, for example

20+C+M+B+22

with the "20 "being the millennium and century, the "C" standing for the first Wise Man, Caspar, the "M" standing for Melchior, the "B" standing for Balthasar, and the "22" standing for the decade and year. It is also popularly believed that the Kings' initials stand for "Christus mansionem benedicat" ("Christ bless this house").

While you do this, or after, say the prayer:

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is your incarnate Word, now and forever. Amen.

God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten One to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Savior. Amen.

Loving God, bless this household. May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness, and abiding in your will. We ask this through Christ our Savior. Amen.



Blessing of Chalk on Epiphany



What is Blessed Chalk:

It is traditional for parish priests to bless chalk for each family so that they may mark the names of the three Magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar) over their doors. In the blessing of homes this serves as a witness of their faith to follow the Star and protection against evil in obeying the warning not to return to Herod. We as Catholics are called to always to follow the light of Christ and to resist the temptations of the enemy. Marking the initials of these three Magi and the current year is a way of dedicating ones household to remain faithful to Christ and serves as a symbol of that promise as you go to a from your house each day.

The chalk is a type of memento ("*Remember, man, you are dust and to dust you will return.*"), a reminder of the dust of the earth from which man was made. See Genesis 3:19.

Note that any color of chalk is valid for this blessing.

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



Visit <u>www.usccb.org/bible/readings</u> or download an app such as *Laudate* or *iBreviary* to access the Mass readings. The Magi from our Gospel studied the skies carefully. Our study of astronomy has built so much upon their work that we might not recognize them as scientists. But they were the best kind of scientist because they were happy to follow the truth wherever it led them.

St. Thomas Aquinas taught that all truth is God's truth. That's why people of faith like <u>Fr. Georges Lemaitre who</u> <u>discovered the Big Bang</u> are such good scientists. Like the Magi or wise men, they trust that following the truth will lead us to God. If your children are interested in science, introduce them to resources like the <u>Magis Center</u> that reveal the compatibility of faith and science.

- Show your child the Wikipedia entry on <u>Science and the</u> <u>Catholic Church</u>: Ordinarily, we would want to be cautious about using Wikipedia to teach our children. The site can be edited by anyone, it changes frequently and isn't always even handed in it's presentation of the faith. Having said that, currently, the entry on Science and the Catholic Church does a good job of showing how our faith has embraced and fostered scientific development.
- Share the <u>Magis Center</u> with your child: The website <u>magiscenter.com</u> provides lots of great, free information for your child to explore and find out more about how our faith and science complement one another.



LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Human beings easily get bored. Life's routines can become so predictable that there is often little time for excitement or freshness. Today is all about the new and the wonderful. In celebrating the beauty and simplicity of the Epiphany, we see in tangible ways God's creative, redemptive, and restorative power. This refreshment and revitalization is offered not only to a select few but to everyone throughout the world. There is nothing routine or static about God. Surprises, wonders, miracles, opportunities, healings, and joy without measure are available to those who believe. There are never any endings, just beginnings. And, when darkness, boredom, and gloom seem to be the order of the day, a bright new light now shines pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."



GOSPEL MEDITATION Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

The Light of the Moon

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.

Remember — the magi didn't chart their own course. They merely followed the star.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer:

This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).

First Reading




