

We are a Catholic faith community that seeks to place God first, to know Him, and to grow in holiness together. We strive to live the Gospel through the Eucharist, in our teaching and way of life.



Gender Ideology

A few years ago, the Vatican released a document entitled *Male and Female He Created them*, discussing the issue that we have been seeing in world society in the past few years with regard to some foundational errors about humanity that have come into popularity of late. Most notably, these errors include the notion that there is a reality of gender that can vary independently from biological sex, that either or both gender and sex are qualities that an individual can choose or define for oneself, and that all this rests upon the subjective feelings of the individual. This is all, of course, absolute nonsense.

As Christians, we should see these errors as not only patently wrong, but also very tragic. Pressure to accept or treat as valid the claims the plurality (i.e. beyond the two) or mutability of gender—or that it is not objectively tied to biological reality--is not merely just one more way in which modern culture, to its peril and ruin, is abandoning its Judeo-Christian roots, but also in a very particular way strikes at the core of our very humanity and being, a being that is created in the Image and Likeness of God. What is more, it is real people's humanity, real people's being that is disrespected and deformed by these errors. These people are in danger of real painful consequences when these false lights and false promises inevitably fail to address the real sources of unhappiness in these peoples' lives.

This is especially true of young people, who so often when trying to think through and discover what it means to be men or women and live it out in their own particular lives and with their own particular gifts and personalities, would find the task difficult and confusing enough in a sane and healthy culture; the other deformations of ourselves and our world due to sin, and now all this gender theory garbage, does not make it any easier, either. We should be ready and willing to guide and help our young people through this inner drama, especially those who experience disharmony or disintegration between their body, mind, and spirit. As Christians and as people of good will, we must hold firm to the fact that it does not help a confused child in any way to mutilate him or her, physically or psychologically. The ideology of gender being a subjective reality and independently variable from bodily sex is a lie from the Devil of Hell. Yet so many otherwise rational Christians have been led astray because advocates of this wicked ideology have appealed to our sense of compassion. Beware those who try to manipulate your compassion, they are so often selling the worst kind of evils.

We are not ghosts riding in puppets made of meat. Together with our souls, our bodies **are** us. The body has purpose, the body has meaning, the body is good. When people struggle to love and accept their bodies (and it need not only be something as extreme as gender dysphoria. Kids and adults in their millions suffer body-image disorders and other mental issues to one degree or another), we always need to respond with love, but also always love shaped by truth (even when that truth, given in love, is hard for the person to receive). It is important for us, even while rejecting this vile ideology, not to do so in a way that harms or denigrates people who have been ensuared by these lies.





Por más de 50 años, la Campaña Católica para el Desarrollo Humano (CCHD) ha apoyado a organizaciones que luchan contra la pobreza y mejoran la vida de las personas en comunidades en Estados Unidos. Desde capacitar a los inmigrantes en los pueblos a lo largo de la frontera sur hasta abogar por mejores oportunidades para la vivienda y la educación en ciudades del norte y del medio oeste, los grupos financiados por CCHD se enfrentan a una gran cantidad de desafíos económicos y de justicia social que afectan a las comunidades locales en áreas urbanas y rurales.


PADRE PIO BETWEEN HEAVEN AND EARTH



The child of a reputable family and a faithful son of the Church, Robert of Locksley had no intention of becoming an outlaw. But the relentless cruelty and tyranny by the elite nobility of England demanded that someone rise up to give answer. And so Robert of Locksley became Robin Hood — a man thrown into a fierce struggle to balance his deep faith with a call to action in a violent age.





The story of St. Charles de Foucauld illustrates a theme in this Sunday's Gospel: sacrificing the things of this world for the more beautiful things can bring true joy in unexpected ways.



Born to an aristocratic family, Charles de Foucauld spent the first part of his life pursuing adventure and glory. Yet, these things never satisfied him. Later, he found peace in a hidden life serving the people he encountered during his adventures in Morocco.

Inspired by his time serving in a Trappist monastery, St. Charles founded a small religious community dedicated to going out to the peripheries and caring for whoever he encountered, whatever their faith. In his quiet way, living in a remote place, enduring rugged conditions, St. Charles de Foucauld took to heart Jesus' admonition to trade the wealth of this world for the things of the next by caring for others with humility.

Sacrifice the things of earth for better things in heaven.


At Home with Faith

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family.

Help your child value the hidden life:

- Ask your child why people think being famous is important. Let your child reflect on something that our popular culture strongly suggests: that being famous is important. See if your child recognizes this presumption that is so common.
- Let your child know that many famous people are not happy. In fact, many only tolerate the fame as something that must be endured in order to work in certain professions.
- Let your child know that many saints truly enjoyed a more humble life. Many saints only became well known after their death because of the holiness of their life. Rather than seeking attention, they were very happy to work quietly. In fact, not worrying about what people thought of them helped them to be both happy and kind.
- Catch your child doing something good quietly. When you observe your child doing something kind or helpful for the family, friends, or community, let them know that their kind act makes a difference. Let them know that you know that they don't do it for attention and thank them for doing good things in a hidden way.



LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Human beings are often very clever when managing money and making a profit. Sometimes, we place so much of our sense of security in money that we lower ourselves to deceit and fraud. Our need to produce a profit can easily lead to economic injustice and exploitation. Money is necessary to conduct the business of our lives. However, it cannot become the god we serve. Being smart, savvy, and creative with financial wealth can be good. Being smart, savvy, and creative with living out our relationship with God is even better. Our hearts have to find a home somewhere. Jesus reminds us of a choice we must make: God or mammon. We need to be cautious about "selling our souls" to what cannot fully satisfy us and falling into the traps of lust, gluttony, pride, and greed. Instead, we can better direct our efforts and our talents to the management of God's kingdom, which in the end is the only thing that matters. Any ideas on how we can use the talents and skills God gave us to make for a better world?



SAINT OF THE WEEK

Best known as Padre Pio, St. Pius was born Francesco Forgione in 1887 in Pietrelcina, Italy. As a young boy he suffered many illnesses including typhoid. He joined Capuchin Franciscans at 15 and took the name of Pius or "Pio" in honor of Pope Pius I. He was ordained in 1910, and at this time he received the marks of stigmata, the wounds of Christ, but they eventually healed. Frequent illnesses continued to plague him as a young man.

Padre Pio served in the Italian Medical Corps during World War I, but he was discharged early because of illness, which was likely tuberculosis. He was assigned to the friary in San Giovanni Rotondo. In 1918, while continuing to serve at the friary, the stigmata appeared again, and this time remained until his death.

Many faithful came to see him at the friary, his days were long, beginning with Mass at 5 a.m. then hearing confessions all day with breaks to bless the sick. A simple man, content to do God's will on earth and with the ardent desire to serve the sick and poor in whom he saw Christ, he urged a hospital, Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza (House for the Relief of Suffering), to be built in San Giovanni Rotondo. It opened in 1956

Padre Pio died at the age of eighty-one in 1968 and in 2002 Pope John Paul II proclaimed him "St. Pio of Pietrelcina."



GOSPEL MEDITATION

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

"You cannot serve both God and mammon." Merriam-Webster defines mammon as material wealth or possessions, especially having a debasing influence. While God does not take issue with our need to use money for the business of our lives, there can be a problem with the attitudes we bring to it. We can easily become so preoccupied and obsessed with money that it becomes the real "god" we worship. Do we serve mammon instead of God? In their book, Wealth, Riches and Money, Craig Hill and Earl Pitts outline symptoms of mammon's influence in our lives. Some of these are worry and anxiety over money, money mismanagement, fear over "never having enough," an "I can't afford it" mentality, impulse buying, stinginess, greed, debt, and discontent.

Many of the things on that list can consume us to the point that we are distracted from what we really need to be doing. Many people spend an inordinate amount of time worrying about money and it becomes the source of their worst fears. If we are honest with ourselves, we need to admit that we place far more emphasis on our material securities than we ought. In fact, we have actually convinced ourselves that we cannot live without it. Are we that certain about the presence of God? Many of the world's problems, especially those involving inequity and injustice, result from conflicts about money. Many equate money with happiness. Those successful in accumulating large amounts of it quickly realize just how wrong they are.

"Your ultimate allegiance is not to the government, not to the state, not to nation, not to any man-made institution. The Christian owes his ultimate allegiance to God, and if any earthly institution conflicts with God's will it is your Christian duty to take a stand against it. You must never allow the transitory evanescent demands of man-made institutions to take precedence over the eternal demands of the Almighty God (Martin Luther King, Jr.)." This is the point Jesus is trying to make. Unfortunately, when we look around our man-made kingdoms are far more prevalent than God's kingdom. When we start seeing greater evidence of justice, equity, dignity, respect, opportunity, gentleness, holiness, solidarity, honesty, simplicity, care for creation, and a decrease in ambition, then we will know that God's kingdom is being served. We will be doing what we are supposed to do.

Fixing the Scales

Most people don't intend on being selfish. The reality of selfishness usually lies in the grey shades of our decision-making. We would never go out of our way to kick a homeless person begging by the highway exit. We would never steal money from our parish collection plate.

But would we drive past the homeless person without even extending a thought or a prayer toward his need? Would we justify stinginess in time, talent, and treasure because of our own comfort? We all have been guilty of transgressions such as these in the past. We will fall again in the future.

Most of the evil in this world can be traced back to a feeling of entitlement that lurks deep within each of us — a frantic concern for our own good that we find difficult to shake. The same instinct that compelled Eve to reach for the fruit that would give her the knowledge of good and evil still compels people to focus on what they are owed, on what they have "earned," on what they have "coming to them." We are so tempted to fix the scales. We are so tempted to keep score.

We would do well to remember that our God is not a God who keeps score. He is not a God who acts entitled or who tacks on extra dues, taking as much as He can get. He is a God who seats the lowly with princes. He is a God who seeks avenues for reconciliation and mercy.

Why do we celebrate Catechetical Sunday?

Answer:

The mission of the church reflects the mission of Jesus to teach, preach, heal, and forgive. Through these acts, Jesus shares the good news of salvation and invites all people to share in the life and love of God. The church continues this mission in all its ministries, but especially, and perhaps most importantly, through catechesis.

Catechetical Sunday is celebrated on the third Sunday of September. The task of handing on the Gospel is entrusted to the whole community, who by word and example, form young and new members in the way of the Gospel. Parish programs assist parents in teaching the basics of faith through liturgical experience, instruction, and faith formation. First Reading


The prophet Amos warns those who exploit the poor and the vulnerable will be harshly condemned by the Lord. In what ways do you defend those marginalized in our society?

Gospel Reading






