

#### **Columbus Day**

Happy Columbus Day!

This weekend in our civil society we celebrate the Catholic explorer who discovered the New World (or at least realized he had discovered it), Christopher Columbus. He is an eminent figure of western civilization and worth celebrating. Columbus' labors enabled the Gospel and its values to reach to the farthest corners of the world and bring the hope of Salvation in Jesus Christ to the peoples and civilizations dwelling in this part of the world.

So many people bring against Columbus tired old attacks, mostly based on false ideologies and lies—often based on libels against him by his contemporary rivals, or degrade him as some sort of fool who got lost—he knew he wasn't in India, he thought the "west indies" were signs of a sea route that would eventually lead to India (he was right, too, although the route was quite long before we built the Panama canal). These attacks are not true, categorically. Yes, he was a man of his time and surely not sinless, but he is not the bigoted villain that so many people who denounce him claim.

Indeed, we need to recognize that these baseless attacks are not really about Columbus, but contempt for Western Civilization, its foundation upon the Catholic Church, and ultimately Jesus Christ—God—who is the ultimate foundation and logic of the universe. These opponents of what is true and good and beautiful and just are very clever and very manipulative and very subtle; we should resist their rhetoric wholly anyway. Christ is the one hope of all humanity, and those who oppose him will oppose the good fruits of those who follow him: Thus the hatred for the great explorers who enabled Christ to be known in these continents, the missionaries who did the proclaiming, and the settlers who established our country.

Of course, one can oppose this hatred of our own civilization, and indeed be proud of the goodness and value and necessity of Christian values being brought to every corner of the world, and even the secular fruits of our country (though that is a distant third behind, and not the same thing as, the Kingdom of God expanding) without denigrating or holding in contempt or looking down on the cultures and histories of ancient and still continuing American Indian and South American cultures. I am not saying that Western Civilization and figures like Columbus should be immune from critique and evaluation (some of the excuses Europeans used to take advantage of native people in the Americas were morally flimsy and opposed by the Church even at the time; incidentally, Columbus was on the Church's side in those debates), any more than any culture or individual should be immune from such evaluation (I think we can agree the Aztecs were objectively wrong to cut our human hearts for sacrifices), only that the standard of critique should be the objective one of Christ, and not the shifting power games of modern ideologues.




### John XXIII: The Pope of Peace

Take time to read and reflect on the Scriptures for this day.

#### Don't have access to a Bible?

Visit <u>www.usccb.org/bible/readings</u> or download an app such as *Laudate* or *iBreviary* to access the Mass readings. God promises healing of body and soul. Throughout the Bible, we witness prophets, priests and most importantly, Jesus offer healing of the body. Notably, Jesus offers these acts of healing the body as a sign of the deeper healing he offers our souls.

In a similar way, our faith continues this healing work of Jesus. Followers of Jesus like the Apostles, St. Catherine of Siena and today, religious orders like the Sisters of Providence follow his command to heal the sick. And throughout the world, priests offer the Anointing of the Sick to invite God to heal body and soul and give hope that we can rely upon God's healing power over sickness and death.

# Talk

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family. Tell your children about God's healing power:

- Look for a time when your child is sick or is receiving some kind of medical care: Moments when we are sick or in need of medical care make us realize the fragility of our bodies and can provide insights into our dependence upon God.
- Encourage your child to offer a prayer to God for healing: Let her know that God is never to busy to help and no concern is to small for him to care.
- Suggest to your child that it is a due to God's providence that our bodies function at all: Reflect with your child on the extraordinary complexity of the human body and the way 37 trillion cells have to work in harmony for our bodies to function. Let her know that, without our intervention, these many processes work effectively and, behind it all is God's providence and care.
- Encourage your child to turn to God for help in care for soul as well as body: Help her to know that Jesus offered healing of body so as to provide an even deeper healing of soul. Encourage her to turn to him and look for spiritual healing as well.



#### LIVE THE LITURGY

#### Inspiration for the week

Expressing gratitude is a sign of a loving heart. When we have received a gracious gesture, the appreciation experienced forms a bond between the giver and receiver. This can only happen when abundance and kind gestures are seen as gifts and not something to which we are entitled. The power of gratitude is more profound when we realize all that we are and all we are given do not have a human source but are of God. Walking around believing that our glass is only half full leaves us always wanting more. We are never satisfied. We become nothing more than entitled pursuers of whatever we can get. Instead, the one who is eager to count their blessings and appreciate the wonder and beauty of the gift of life itself is at peace. Before they take another step or venture off on another journey, they bow in gratitude to the presence of God himself. They are most keenly aware that all would cease to be without God.



#### SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint John XIII was born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli on November 25, 1881, in a small village in Italy. He was ordained in 1904 and later earned a doctorate in canon law. During World War I he served as a stretcher-bearer and chaplain for the Italian army. Beginning in 1925 he served as a Vatican diplomat, first in Bulgaria, then in Greece and Turkey. From 1935 through the Second World War he helped save thousands of Jewish people. In 1944 he was named papal nuncio to France. He was named cardinal and appointed patriarch of Venice in 1953. A quiet pastoral life passing into retirement, however, was not in God's plan for the saint.

Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was elected Pope in 1958 and took the name John. His papacy was short, but full of action. He transformed the Vatican, calling for openness, a spirit of ecumenism, and the setting aside of politics. He called the Second Vatican Council in the fall of 1962, the first meeting of its kind in almost a century, setting the agenda to work for the spiritual regeneration of the Church. His efforts changed the face of the Catholic Church. At the same time worked diligently and publicly to ease tensions during the Cuban missile crisis, pleading with leaders for the end of the Cold War.

Saint John XXIII's kindness, sense of pastoral care, and works of reconciliation and peacemaking made him beloved not only to Catholics but to people around the world. He died on June 3, 1963. He was beatified in 2000 by St. John Paul II, and canonized by Pope Francis in 2014.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION** Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Ten lepers were cured. Only one returned to give thanks. When we fall victim to entitlement, we diminish our capacity to love. Never satisfied, we walk around with outstretched arms, eagerly searching for the next thing we want so that we can acquire it ourselves. Very rarely do entitled hands hold anything to freely give away to others. Entitled hands also find it challenging to reach toward heaven in a gesture of gratitude and praise. We are often more obsessed with celebrating our victories, securing our assets, safeguarding our futures, and stacking the deck of life in our favor rather than relishing and absorbing the gift of the moment and blessings received.

Entitled people find it difficult to pray properly. When the subject of our prayer is mostly about our needs and wants, we are falling into the trap of deception. We foolishly try to convince God that our tiny worlds are of greater importance than His. In ancient times, people would offer sacrifices to "the gods" to secure protection and favors. Our God desires mercy, not sacrifice, because He is about love and justice, not simply meeting our agendas. Every breath is a gift. Prayer, which is a celebration of that gift, acknowledges the Giver. Prayer strengthens the bond between Giver and receiver, creating a deepening awareness that nothing I am or anything I have can exist apart from His Divine Will. It also reminds us that we have done nothing to merit the unconditional love and mercy God showers upon us. Prayer is not just about getting what I need but celebrating who I am.

For St. Therese of Lisieux prayer is "a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy." When our hearts "surge" toward God, we rush to the Source of our restoration and wholeness, knowing our longing for God's Divine embrace. Prayer is a response to God's graciousness with an act of gratitude returned by us. In prayer, we gaze upon each other in that sacred space where I give myself to God as He is, and God gives Himself to me as I am. We cannot take another step without saying thank you.

#### EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

The Zeal of the Convert

When you work in the Church, professionally or on a volunteer basis, you become familiar with the phenomenon known as "the zeal of the recent convert."

Sometimes, it really seems that the newly baptized are just stronger Catholics than the cradle Catholics. They smile more at Mass. They are awestruck by the Eucharist. They come out of the confessional beaming.

It's not that they are naive. It's not that they are in some honeymoon phase of religion, living outside of reality. It's simply that they remember. They remember what it felt like before the Eucharist or before Confession. They recall before the sacraments and the oil and the grace and the relief. It was more recent for them than for some of us older Catholics — especially those of us who were baptized as infants.

Let's ask ourselves: Have we become too comfortable? Do we receive God's grace with expectation instead of surprise? Have we ceased to marvel and wonder at the goodness of God? If the answer is a resounding yes, don't despair. Look at the Gospel — a literal nine times out of ten, God goes un-thanked and un-noticed.

So many of us have forgotten, or never understood, what it meant when the leprosy was washed from our souls. But when we remind ourselves, we become more keenly aware of the extraordinariness of the gift we have received.

#### WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

#### Question:

What are the servant songs of Isaiah? How do they relate to Jesus' life and ministry?

#### Answer:

The four servant songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-9, and 52:13—53:12) are strategically placed in Second Isaiah to offer hope and consolation to a suffering Israel during its Babylonian Exile.

Israel had been defeated by the Babylonians, who destroyed their temple, killed the last of the kings in David's lineage, exiled them from their land, and transported them to Babylon. This is the context in which Second Isaiah composes his powerfully poetic book of hope and consolation. A significant part of that message is the portrait of God's servant, who is called to be a source of hope and encouragement for the people.

Each of the four poems emphasizes God's choice and election of the servant. The last poem stresses the suffering and rejection of God's servant, along with his eventual death. Isaiah is certain that God will use the servant's innocent suffering as a way to redeem and remove the guilt and sin of others. Thus, the servant becomes a source of salvation for himself and for others.

Who is this servant? Many suggest that Isaiah was referring to Israel herself, as she underwent exilic suffering which would ultimately prove to be redemptive. Jesus' followers, including those for whom Mark wrote his Gospel, understood Jesus' ministry in terms of Isaiah's suffering servant whose innocent suffering and death became the means of salvation for all.

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Jesus said in reply, "Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?" Then he said to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."


In the healing of Naaman from leprosy, we hear how Naaman became a believer in the one God of Israel. How have you experienced God's presence in your life?




