



We are a Catholic faith community that seeks to place God first, to know Him, and to grow in holiness together. We strive to live the Gospel through the Eucharist, in our teaching and way of life.



#### **Conversion from Anger**

A few years ago, I saw a documentary on Clarence Thomas, one of the justices on the US Supreme Court. He grew up a poor black boy during the age of racial segregation in this country, had his discernment for the Priesthood dashed by the racial bigotry of a fellow seminarian, and as a young adult in the late 1960s was drawn to Marxist and race-oriented political extremism. After taking part in a political demonstration that turned violent, he realized that he was becoming a monster in the name of his ideals. He had a conversion moment, praying to God to heal him of the resentment and viciousness which had infected his soul. He prayed, "If you take anger out of my heart, I'll never hate again." After that turning point in his life, he continued to focus his career on racial equality in law, even to the point of working for politicians of the opposing political party to his.

I know, like anyone in the public eye, some of us may experience a temptation to like or dislike him merely on account of what we believe his political leanings to be. Indeed, case in point, I once shared with someone this interesting story that the (supposedly) arch-conservative judge was once a far-left race-obsessed Marxist, and the person responded with a very condescending, simplistic, and rote political opinion, seemingly almost by reflex. However, Thomas' role in the last few decades of political events or his judicial philosophy are not really my point (though his conversion moment was at the root of both, in his mind). What is interesting to me was that his realization that hatred, resentment, and prejudice corrupts and destroys hearts; Clarence Thomas was saved from going (further) down that violent and wicked path by that moment of God's grace leading him to honest self-reflection.

How much of the strife and division in our world today is driven by unreflective resentment and anger, jealousy and grievance, entitlement and narcissism (even if couched in pseudo-intellectual buzzwords)? What do we think any of the radical ideologies infesting our world today will accomplish? Marxism (and all its wretched derivatives), racism (regardless of target or the fancy words people use to deny they are doing it: "classic" or "anti-" it is the same evil), and so many other extreme ideologies have accomplished nothing good before, sow no good fruit now, and will continue to yield only poison tomorrow and forever and ever. More injustice will never rectify an unjust present or past situation.

Like Clarence Thomas (even, perhaps especially, if you don't like his judicial philosophy), we need to have the honesty and self -reflection necessary to see how lies like hatred and resentment and wrathful anger accomplish nothing good and have no place in a Christian heart; we need to recognize as literally satanic many of the extreme forms of any number of political bents in our world today, and so refuse to have any part in them (even, and especially, when we are tempted to sympathize with a given ideology or defend its adherents' misbehaviors), and resolve—even though we might disagree with one another—to remember that all men are created equal, in the image and likeness of God.



### Our Patron St. Columban

Dear parishioners, throughout the Sundays of November leading up to St. Columban's feast day on November 23 we will publish informational inserts about our parish patron saint to help you learn more about him.

#### How to identify St. Columban

The following are some characteristics that may be found in physical portrayals of St. Columban:

*Crozier*—the symbol of a Bishop or Abbot. St. Columban founded abbeys throughout Europe after leaving Ireland; the leader of an abbey is an abbot. The crozier resembles a shepherd's crook, symbolizing leadership among others Good Shepherd, the Lord.

*Habit*—Long single-colored robe marked austere simplicity of a religious

**Book**—Book of the Gospels, Bible, or Rule of St. Columban, may have motto "CHRISTI SIMUS NON NOSTRI"

*Haircut*—He may have had a tonsure haircut and was known to have had an "handsome appearance"

White Dove—His name is Latin for little white dove, which symbolizes the guidance of the Holy Spirit throughout his life

*Boat and companions*—St. Columban sailed with twelve others from Ireland

**Presence Woodland animals**—Wolves or bears. His faith was legendary, to the point where he tamed animals into prayer.

#### His name

He is known as St. Columban or Columbanus and is sometimes attributed to being of Mt. Leinster, of Bangor, of Luxeuil, of Bregenz or of Bobbio. These are names of settlements where he established monasteries in mainland Europe. He is not to be confused with St. Columba (no "n"), also know as St. Columkille (+597). In contrast, St. Columkille left Ireland to go to Scotland.







## THE STORY OF ST. COLUMBAN

#### From a General Audience of Pope Benedict XVI given on Wednesday, June 11, 2008 about Saint Columban

#### Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today I would like to speak about the holy Abbot Columban, the best known Irishman of the early Middle Ages. Since he worked as a monk, missionary and writer in various countries of Western Europe with good reason he can be called a "European" Saint. With the Irish of his time, he had a sense of Europe's cultural unity. The expression *"totius Europae -* of all Europe", with reference to the Church's presence on the Continent, is found for the first time in one of his letters, written around the year 600, addressed to Pope Gregory the Great (cf. *Epistula* I, 1).

Columban was born c. 543 in the Province of Leinster in southeast Ireland. He was educated at home by excellent tutors who introduced him to the study of liberal arts. He was then entrusted to the guidance of Abbot Sinell of the community of Cleenish in Northern Ireland, where he was able to deepen his study of Sacred Scripture. At the age of about 20 he entered the monastery of Bangor, in the northeast of the island, whose abbot, Comgall, was a monk well known for his virtue and ascetic rigour. In full agreement with his abbot, Columban zealously practiced the severe discipline of the monastery, leading a life of prayer, ascesis and study. While there, he was also ordained a priest. His life at Bangor and the Abbot's example influenced the conception of monasticism that developed in Columban over time and that he subsequently spread in the course of his life.

When he was approximately 50 years old, following the characteristically Irish ascetic ideal of the "peregrinatio pro Christo", namely, making oneself a pilgrim for the sake of Christ, Columban left his island with 12 companions to engage in missionary work on the European Continent. We should in fact bear in mind that the migration of people from the North and the East had caused whole areas, previously Christianized, to revert to paganism. Around the year 590, the small group of missionaries landed on the Breton coast. Welcomed kindly by the King of the Franks of Austrasia (present-day France), they asked only for a small piece of uncultivated land. They were given the ancient Roman for-

tress of Annegray, totally ruined and abandoned and covered by forest. Accustomed to a life of extreme hardship, in the span of a few months the monks managed to build the first hermitage on the ruins. Thus their reevangelization began, in the first place, through the witness of their lives. With the new cultivation of the land, they also began a new cultivation of souls. The fame of those foreign religious who, living on prayer and in great austerity, built houses and worked the land spread rapidly, attracting pilgrims and penitents. In particular, many young men asked to be accepted by the monastic community in order to live, like them, this exemplary life which was renewing the cultivation of the land and of souls. It was not long before the foundation of a second monastery was required. It was built a few kilometres away on the ruins of an ancient spa, Luxeuil. This monastery was to become the centre of the traditional Irish monastic and missionary outreach on the European Continent. A third monastery was erected at Fontaine, an hour's walk further north.


## **Blessed Duns Scotus**

Take time to read and reflect on the Scriptures for this day.

#### Don't have access to a Bible?

Visit <u>www.usccb.org/bible/readings</u> or download an app such as *Laudate* or *iBreviary* to access the Mass readings. Faith in the resurrection has inspired many people to become martyrs. Originally, the word martyr was Greek for a witness who gave testimony in a court of law. People who sacrifice their lives for their faith, like the seven brothers in our first reading, are witnessing to faith in the resurrection. Regrettably, in many countries around the world, Christians have to make this ultimate sacrifice with startling frequency.

But we can also witness to the faith with our day to day lives by making small sacrifices to do the right thing even when it is hard, because we trust in the promise of heaven. This means keeping the faith in a joyful and gentle way even when those around us ignore or dismiss it.


# Talk

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family.

# Tell your family the story of someone who sacrificed for the faith and was glad they did:

One way to help our children prepare to make the small sacrifices that faith demands is to offer a story that lets them see the before and after of a sacrifice. Share about a time that you, or someone you know well, had to make a sacrifice because of faith. Maybe you had a teacher who didn't appreciate the faith and made arguments against it in class, and you spoke up for the faith even though you knew it would lower your grade. Maybe you were the one who spoke up for the unpopular kid in school when other kids were picking on him. Maybe you made an ethical choice at work and lost a promotion or commission.

Whatever the experience, share how you were ultimately glad you did the right thing and encourage your child to do the same.



#### LIVE THE LITURGY

#### Inspiration for the week

Every believer wonders about what the experience of heaven will be like. Popular images of people walking around in white robes, becoming like angels, and reunions with those who have gone before us all tickle human imagination. Jesus never got too specific about what heaven actually looks like. But he assures us that it exists and that all are alive in God. Clinging to the traditions of our faith, we persevere through life's challenges confident that God's promise of eternal life will come to be. We are told that we shall become like God and see God as He is. As God has made us, He also loves us and sustains us. Desiring to be with God above all other desires gives us the hope that when we close our eyes in death, we will fall into the arms of the One who will gently bring us where we need to be. Knowing ahead of time what we find when we arrive changes little.



#### SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Martin of Tours was born a pagan in what is now Hungary around 316, but he was raised in Italy where his father, a tribune, was posted. At 15 he was compelled to serve in the Roman military, though he was already a catechumen. There is a popular legend that while on campaign the saint cut his cloak in half to share with a cold beggar. That night he dreamed of Jesus and his cloak was restored. He was baptized at 18. Only two years after his baptism, he was released from the military, he had refused his battle pay and to fight saying he was a soldier for Christ. He is the first recognized conscientious objector.

After his release from the military, he became a disciple of Hilary of Poitiers. He worked diligently against the Arian heresy, which denies the divinity of Jesus Christ, and established a community of hermits near Poitiers in 361, the first French monastery.

In 371 he reluctantly became bishop of Tours. Nearby, he founded a second monastery, Marmoutier, because he preferred the life of a monk he retreated often. In 384 there was a popular heresy infecting the Church in Spain, led by the bishop Priscillian and his followers. The emperor Magnus Maximus became involved, ordering the execution of the heretics. Saint Martin opposed the executions and protested the emperor's involvement in Church matters. Unfortunately, the Priscillians were executed anyway.

Saint Martin died in Candes-Saint-Martin, Gaul in 397. He is notably one of the first saints who was not martyred. He is the patron saint of France.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION** Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Facing her 50th birthday and recently diagnosed with Type-2 Diabetes, Rebecca was at a crossroads. Realizing that she had neglected her health and fitness over the years and allowed herself to gain significant weight, she felt poorly about who she had become. While it was easier to give in to temptation and the gratification received from food, her family needed her, and she desired a long life. She had an image of the person she could become. She wanted to be more trim, focused, disciplined, and healthy. She liked what she saw in her mind and set out on a journey to create it. With great effort, she succeeded and accomplished her goals. When we have a goal ahead of us, we are more apt to do whatever is necessary to get it.

Is heaven a goal you want to achieve? Our popular images and metaphors to describe heaven can leave some people wondering if this is something they want for all eternity. Living like an angel, wearing white robes, meeting St. Peter, and reconnecting with loved ones are all welcome notions to some extent. But do they really inspire and captivate us enough to want to dramatically change how we live our lives? Heaven's reality is more profound than any human image or idea can fathom. Even though we believe in a bodily resurrection, heaven is more about attaining union with God. To achieve heaven is to attain eternal happiness and fulfill all desire. How do we awaken within us an ardent and passionate desire for heaven?

St. Isaac of Ninevah counsels, "Enter eagerly into the treasure house that lies within you, and so you will see the treasure house of heaven, for the two are one and the same, and there is but one single entry into them both. The ladder that leads to the kingdom is hidden with you, and is found in your own soul. Dive into yourself and in your soul you will discover the rungs by which to ascend." Our souls are made to be eternal. Once we discover our true selves and are captivated by the wonder of who we really are, we will unleash our unwavering desire for a lasting union with our Creator. Heaven is about who we are. "For seeing you, our God, as you are, we shall be like you for all the ages."

#### EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments The God of the Living

"Sic transit gloria mundi," is what they used to say at papal coronations. "So passes earthly glory." Everything is fleeting. Nothing is here to stay. But in reality, some things are forever. Our actions on earth do have the potential to reverberate in eternity.

Everyday Stewardship is a lifestyle that embraces what will last. It is being aware of how our choices and our actions can be received by God, and through His grace, amplified to showcase His glory.

Your great-grandparents were married for 60 years. Maybe they shared the greatest love anyone in your family has ever seen, and maybe they raised up a whole family of kids. But they've been gone for a generation now, and no one living remembers the softness in their eyes when they looked at each other. And to read today's Gospel, you might even get the impression that their marriage was nothing more than an earthly whim. Gone. Fleeting. Temporal.

This week's readings invite us to contemplate the question: what exactly is immortal? What lasts beyond our earthly sojourn?

The seven brothers and their mothers whose martyrdom is told this weekend in Maccabees didn't die for the letter of the law, they died for the One who gave the law. In the same way, a marriage contract does not extend into eternity, but the fruits of a sacrificial love will live forever.

Good works, devotion, gratitude, selflessness, graciousness, accountability — these are all of God. He is not God of the dead; He is God of the living — and these are the things that last an eternity.

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#### WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

#### Question:

November 9 is the feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome. What is the significance of this feast?

#### Answer:

Every diocese has a mother church, the bishop's cathedral where the diocesan church gathers and celebrates. The cathedral is the seat of the bishop's authority over the diocese. That authority is intended to be one of service to God's people, shepherding and guiding them in a truly pastoral mode.

The pope is first and foremost the Bishop of Rome, as well as the head of the Roman Catholic Church. St. John Lateran is his cathedral, and its prominence derives from that reality. St. John Lateran cathedral traces its origins to Emperor Constantine who converted a portion of the Laterani family palace into a church, and gave it to Pope Sylvester (314-335) as the papal church and residence; St. John refers to the two saints in whose honor the church is dedicated, John the Baptist and John the Evangelist. It became known as the cathedral of the pope, and its facade's inscription refers to it as "the Mother and Head of all Churches, in the City and of the World." The universal celebration of this feast stresses the unity among Roman Catholics, as they unite themselves with the chair of Peter.


#### Second Reading


