A Word from Father Thompson

Nothing too lofty or (directly) theological this week, but as we continue to celebrate Christmas I thought I might share something regarding finding a happy and refreshing way of approaching family celebrations of Christmas. When I was a small child, my grandparents had an expectation that their adult children would maintain the Christmas traditions of their youth, an all-night affair

requiring the bulk of Christmas Eve though to Christmas morning: Gifts, pepper salad, Midnight Mass, Ravioli feast (my mother's side of the family is of Italian extraction), etc. Then, of course, there were expectations on my Dad's side of the family on Christmas Day... While It was good to spend time with family and enjoying traditions, it left my parents exhausted in a lot of ways. Plus, it meant bundling and transporting kids all around the county to fulfill all those expectations.

At some point, life got in the way and the Christmas Eve routine stopped happening. In retrospect, my mother recognized it was for the best, and we began to keep a similar tradition, but just among my immediate family in our own home. We kept doing that the rest of the time I was growing up.

When my siblings began to marry and started having their children (and I began working on Christmas), my mother decided that while our traditional Italian Ravioli feast and gift exchange was precious, she did not want Christmas to be a stressor for my siblings as it had been for her and her sisters. So, what my family has done for the past several years has been to gather all the siblings and niblings at my parents' house and keep our old family traditions, usually on the 4th Sunday of Advent, but this year we are doing it today, on Mother of God. This frees my siblings and their kids to develop and to keep their own traditions in their own families on Christmas itself without feeling like they have to truck the kids around on the day itself to see various grandparents, aunts, and uncles when the kids just want to enjoy their gifts and the parents want to rejoice in their children.

Come to think of it, I think this approach to celebrating Christmas across generations is pretty theologically profound. My parents, in their backing off to leave Christmas free for my siblings and their children reflects that my parents really understand the nature of Matrimony. The very purpose of Matrimony is the creation of a new and autonomous family. Of course, the spouses still are and will always be connected to their family of origin, but the family they have created by the Sacrament of Matrimony deserves priority over even the parent-child bond (...this is why a man leaves his father and mother and clings to his wife...). My mom trying to strike this balance between bringing the extended family together (10 siblings, plus their spouses, plus about a dozen niblings and counting) and allowing each nuclear family to have their own lives was a very wise idea, and very much embodies the Christian theology of Matrimony.





She was also contemplative; pausing to reflect on her encounter with Jesus and then letting that reflection bear fruit within her. As we prepare for the new year, let's dedicate ourselves to taking time to reflect on our encounter with Jesus and let that reflection influence our actions.

At Home with Faith

Talk

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family.

Ask your children to imagine that they lived in Bethlehem at the time of Jesus' birth. They heard about his birth from the shepherds and went to see him. Then ask them to imagine watching the Holy Family at the birth of Jesus, without knowing anything about these people or the meaning of this event. Would they have understood what was happening at the time? Probably not.

Then let them know that Mary did a really good job of understanding what was happening, even though she did not know exactly what was in store for her or her son. Let them know that they can ask Mary to pray for us that we might get to know Jesus better.





WORSHIP & MEDITATION



GOSPEL MEDITATION

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

We hide ourselves and our secrets from God because we are afraid. Even Mary can seem too perfect to approach. The shepherds find the strength to speak to Mary and Joseph at the moment they see the child in the manger. They open their hearts and share what they've experienced. Saint Luke writes of the shepherds, "When they saw this, they made known the message that had been told them about this child."

When I was a college student, I visited Rome. Beggars often approached and said, "Mangia? Mangia?" I didn't speak Italian and thought, "Why are they speaking about the Christmas nativity scene?" My friend said, "Mangia means eat. They're hungry." That's when I realized more deeply than ever before that Mary puts her baby in a place designed for hungry animals to eat.

This week that same manger opens our hearts to tell Mary about our lives, too.

"What was my first word? Who was there when I was born? When did I start to walk? Which toys did I play with? What made me cry when I was a baby?"

My oldest has reached the age where she has started to ask questions like this. As she grows up, she is realizing that, in order to understand the world around her, she must first understand herself. This makes her insatiably curious about her own identity, her history — her "origin story," as they say in the movies.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

What is the history of the rosary? Where did this prayer come from?

Answer:

Although a longstanding tradition attributed the rosary to Saint Dominic and the Dominican Order, the practice of using beads to count prayers predates the Dominicans by a few hundred years. In fact, it seems that what we now think of as the rosary (which means "garland of roses") was first developed by illiterate peasants and religious brothers and sisters as a way of offering 150 "Our Fathers" to replace the praying of the 150 psalms in the Divine Office.

The practice of reciting 150 Hail Marys (which was later subdivided into 15 decades of 10 Hail Marys) arose during the late Middle Ages. Devotion to the rosary began to flourish in the nineteenth century, especially as new devotions to Mary began to spread throughout Europe and the New World. An annual liturgical celebration of Our Lady of the Rosary was introduced into the Church calendar in 1573 and it has been observed on the date of October 7 since 1913. In the apostolic letter On the Most Holy Rosary, Pope Saint John Paul II not only added five new mysteries to the traditional fifteen, but he also reminded Catholics that the rosary is, at its core, an opportunity to go deeper into the life of Jesus: "The rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer ... It has all the depth of the Gospel message in its entirety, of which it can be said to be a compendium. It is an echo of Mary's prayer, her perennial Magnificat ... With the rosary, the Christian people sit at the school of Mary and are led to contemplate the beauty of the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love" (no. 1).


Gospel Reading

Dear God, thank you for letting everyone know that Jesus was more than a special baby. He was the Savior. In Jesus' name, Amen.


