A Word from Father Thompson

Those of you who have already had an opportunity to go to confession this Lent may have noticed a very slight change in the form of Absolution (though maybe not, because the change is during the preamble I tend to say while you are making your Act of Contrition). Much like the correction of the prior, poor, translation of the Missal we benefitted from about a decade ago; and in more recent years the orders of celebrating Confirmation, Matrimony, and Baptism; as of Ash Wednesday we now have a more accurate translation of the official text for celebrating the Sacrament of Penance (incidentally, we are still anticipating the corrected translation of the Liturgy of the Hours and possibly the Lectionary in the next few years).

It's worth remembering that the official prayers of the Roman Rite are in Latin, and vernacular translations are meant to express the content of the official prayers as accurately as possible. Unfortunately, there are elements of languages that do not translate perfectly or well, hence the proverb *omnis traductor traditor* (every translator is a traitor). In the case of Penance, the old translation opted for more prosaic and simple language over the more poetic wording of the Latin original. It was not so insultingly dumbed-down as the Mass's translation used to be, but it was insufficient and is now corrected. As you can see it is really just altering two words and taking out an extraneous phrase:

God, the Father of mercies, Through the Death and Resurrection of his Son has reconciled the world to himself And **poured out** the Holy Spirit among us for the forgiveness of sins; Through the ministry of the Church May God **grant** you pardon and peace.

AND I ABSOLVE YOU FROM YOUR SINS IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, + AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT.

Incidentally, the new Order of Celebrating Penance also includes a new suggested Act of Contrition. Now, the book says the penitent can use "these or similar words," so you—unlike the priest—are free to use your own preferred version of the prayer, but nonetheless, here is the revised Act of Contrition as well:


O my God, I am sorry and repent with all my heart for all the wrong I have done and the good I have failed to do, because by sinning I have offended you, who are all good and worthy to be loved above all things. I firmly resolve, with the help of your grace, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid the occasions of sin. Through the merits of the passion of our Savior Jesus Christ, Lord, have mercy.





Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving



Prayer is how we communicate with God. During Lent, we are called to increase our prayers, to raise our hearts and minds more often to the Lord as we prepare to celebrate His Passion.

Fasting is a practice of giving up something, usually food, as a penance. Latin Catholics ages 18-59 are obligated to fast from food on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Oftentimes, as part of our Lenten practices, we will fast from a particular activi-

ty or treat in addition to fasting from food as a way to draw closer to God and offer a sacrifice to Him.

Almsgiving is the giving of money or goods to those in need. It is an act of fraternal charity directed towards our brothers and sisters in Christ, and a "work of justice pleasing to God"


What the Catholic Church Teaches

1444 In imparting to his apostles his own power to forgive sins the Lord also gives them the authority to reconcile sinners with the Church. This ecclesial dimension of their task is expressed most notably in Christ's solemn words to Simon Peter: "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." 45 "The office of binding and loosing which was given to Peter was also assigned to the college of the apostles united to its head." 46

1445 The words bind and loose mean: whomever you exclude from your communion, will be excluded from communion with God; whomever you receive anew into your communion, God will welcome back into his. Reconciliation with the Church is inseparable from reconciliation with God.



When Adam and Eve committed the "original sin" in the Garden of Eden, they chose something that was not good for them from the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil over something much better from God's Tree of Life.

We face a similar temptation. We live in a world filled with distractions. Some of them bad, others mostly harmless. None of them are as good as what God intends for us.

The first step in a good Lent is making space for God by setting aside distractions. The next step is to let God's Word enter into that space. Use the Make Space for God *Lenten Tabletop Conversation Guid*e to welcome God's Word to your dinner table.

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family.

Tell your children how Lent is a time to clear away distractions so as to let God's Word enter our lives. Then, print out this *Tabletop Conversation Guide* for your family, fold it in three so it can stand upright on your table. You might need to tape it together so it stands properly.

Tell your children that it is a reminder that our family dinner table is a sacred place to grow closer to God and each other. Let them know that, this Lent, we will set aside distractions like mobile phones and other screens, keeping them away from the table when we are there for dinner.

Then, each Sunday night, use the tabletop discussion guide to prompt prayer and to facilitate a family discussion. This creates an opportunity for God to enter into our lives this Lent.





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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

The Spirit leads Jesus into the desert to be tempted by the devil, and we hear this: "He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry." Seems like a questionable battle preparation plan. When I fast, I usually feel grouchy at best, and at worst, like I might pass out from longing for a hamburger. Isn't it better to be well-fed and fully hydrated, especially to face spiritual struggles? Why fast?

This might help. The origin of the word "fast" means to "hold firmly." We still use it that way when we say, "I held fast to my original decision." We human beings are a bundle of desires which vie for our attention: food, drink, comfort, safety, sex, laughter, beauty, and so on. If we can't manage to have firm grip on them, in short order they'll have a firm grip on us. By fasting from our lower desires, we learn to firmly grip on to what is greater. Fasting leads to us to a firmer hold on our body and mind.

Jesus fasts for us. He's showing us that his grace can help us regain this firm hold of our lives, which makes it more difficult for the devil to tempt us. But take it one more step. Fasting also teaches us to finally hold fast to Jesus, the Word of God in flesh. "Man does not live by bread alone," he says, "But by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God." Jesus' fasting reveals his fast hold to the Father in everything. May our fasting help us to grasp ourselves more firmly, and then to hold fast to Jesus alone.

Formed and Fallen

There is a version of myself that walks into church on Ash Wednesday and a version of myself that walks into church on Good Friday. Aside from having the same face, these women bear very little resemblance to one another.

Ash Wednesday Me is fired up. She's ready to go. She's got a stomach full of peczki, a forehead full of ashes, an oven full of fasting bread and a whole list of Lenten resolutions. She's got a plan for the next 40 days and she's ready to be transformed.

Good Friday Me is tired. She's lumbering into church dragging six weeks of failure and unfulfilled expectations behind her. Nothing went the way it was supposed to (again). She didn't accomplish what she wanted (again) and she doesn't want to dwell on it (again).

If Satan offered both versions of myself the same deal he offered Christ — submit to me, and you will have the whole world — I have to wonder: which one of these creatures, formed and fallen, would be strong enough to defy him? Would either?

I can't say that the chipper, optimistic woman on Ash Wednesday has more strength than the tired woman on Good Friday. To each of these women Satan offers an easy way out. But to each, too, Christ offers an abundance of grace and the gift of justification.

This Lent, I know that I will be tested, I know that I will fail in many ways. I know that my intentions and my best efforts will not be enough.

But I bring them to the altar anyway, and I leave them there as an offering. And I know that Easter morning will dawn, and the tomb will be empty.

Why do we do that? **Catholic Life Explained**

Question:

Can you recommend some good books for Lenten spiritual reading?

Answer:

On more than one occasion, a coach being interviewed about his team--successful or not--will be asked about the next step. The inevitable response includes something about getting back to basics. Reviewing the fundamentals of the sport strengthens performance and builds confidence.

The best Lenten reading takes us back to the fundamentals. If Lent is the time for the Church to be on retreat, then we should focus on the texts that help us deepen our understanding of our faith. Spend time reading one of the Gospels and use a Scripture commentary to learn all you can about the passion of Jesus. Read about the lives of the saints, especially your patron saint and that of your parish. Perhaps there is some local candidate for sainthood, like Father Walter Ciszek, SJ, who wrote several faithinspiring books. Finally, you can use the Catechism of the Catholic Church to learn more about the church's teachings and beliefs. The sections on prayer and the Mass are really great reflections. Focusing on the basics really helps us take another step forward in our faith. We have not only a better understanding of what we believe and practice, but also why we believe. With that belief comes the confidence we need to be better, more faithful witnesses to Christ.


Gospel Reading

One really good way to fight the devil's tricks is to pray often. Pray in the morning, at noon, and at night.


Sharing the Gospel
