

A Word from Father Thompson

This weekend I had the opportunity to attend the ordination to the Priesthood of Father John Paul
Thomassi, a man from the parish I grew up in down in Vancouver. Indeed, our families have been friends
for years and years and various of our parents and siblings have been each other's students and teachers and
participants in ministries and any number of other connections. I myself remember learning to serve Mass with
John Paul: I had never been an altar boy growing up ad so had to learn how the summer before starting seminary,
and John Paul was a little kid learning to serve at the same time. I am so happy and proud for Fr Thomassi and
especially joyful that he and I are now brothers in the Priesthood.

Priests do not appear out of nowhere, we come from strong and faithful parishes comprised of strong and faithful families. It is important for us to pray for vocations and encourage them in our children, not as a status symbol for the family, nor a pious but unrealistic aspiration, but as a realistic possibility. Yes, a religious vocation is a call to be distinct among the faithful of Christ, and in that way it is a very special thing, but it is not arrogant to aspire to it nor is it a call to be some unlivable caricature of sanctity (or at least any more than we are all called to be saints). Yes, a religious vocation entails sacrifices and living in a way different than many other people in our world, but if one is made for it and called to it, it is where one's greatest joy and life-giving purpose can be found. I could go on with the bad input and examples we set for our young people and then we wonder why so many set aside interest in considering a religious vocation, but I think you get the point: don't balk or ask discouraging questions when a child expresses interest in a religious vocation, or any good vocation, but rather ask what is attractive to him about that calling. If it is a real call, God will continue to affirm it, if it is not it will pass like any other infatuation toward a vocation.

Warts and all, joys and sorrows, excitement and frustrations, I very much enjoy being a priest. I can imagine and did at times while I was in formation and even before game out such scenarios, what my life might look like following another path, but I realized and realize still that such a path is simply not mine. I recall as a younger man recognizing women who would be excellent wives and companions, and who I would have been glad in turn to support and accompany through life, the only problem was that I was not called to be that for them nor they for me. Marriage and family and a secular career and all other such things are indeed great and good and blessed things, and I could imagine being happy with them, but they are not my vocation, they are not what God made me for, and thus they are not capable of giving me the fullest happiness in this life and eternity that God has in store. This is my vocation. This is who I am. I am a priest. I was meant to be a priest.

A far better question for kids than "what do you want to be?" is "what is God calling you to be?"

In my experience, one of the peculiarities of being a man is the somewhat unlikely ability to look into the mirror, no matter how out of shape he may be, and declare with full confidence: "Looking good, buddy!" Ask a man. He'll probably confirm it.


Therein lies a mystery. You might think I refer to man's ability to deceive himself or his propensity toward vainglory. But in this case, I refer to the mystery of a healthy and proper sense of self-love. We human beings (both men and women) have the utterly weird ability to look at ourselves as if we were another. Then we tend to love this "other." Then, somehow, that love becomes a bond between the two. We are three and yet one.

This Sunday is Trinity Sunday. We ponder anew that God in His unity is a play of multiplicity: Lover, Beloved, and shared Love. Or, as we also proclaim, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. If we allow it, this mystery heals our temptation toward self-hatred and destruction. We all know how awful it is to look into the mirror and not know the person we see, or, equally bad, to know and hate who we see. Jesus, the Son of God, draws us into the dynamics of authentic self-knowledge and self-love. Perhaps we could ask the Holy Trinity this Sunday to teach us to truly look at ourselves and to properly love who we see looking back.



The Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

In 1899 Pope Leo XIII approved this Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus for public use. This litany is actually a synthesis of several other litanies dating back to the 17th century. After the final invocations were added by the Sacred Congregation for Rites, it was approved for public use in 1899. This makes a total of 33 invocations, one for each year of life of our Lord Jesus Christ. A partial indulgence is attached to this litany.

Questions of the Week, Reflect and Respond to the Sunday Readings

First Reading: "The LORD, the LORD, a merciful and gracious God, slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity." (Ex 34:6)



It is difficult to explain and fully grasp the mystery of the Holy Trinity. But this much we know for certain:

God so loved the world that he gave us his only Son, Jesus Christ.

And Jesus, in his love for us, sent us the Holy Spirit to be our advocate.

Like the Trinity, there are things in life that are difficult for us to understand or accept. This Sunday's scripture readings remind us to keep believing in the Lord and calling on him, through trials and triumphs alike. We are also called to mend our ways, encourage each other, and live in peace. In doing all of this, we can be living witnesses to the Holy Trinity – the love of the Father, the grace of his Son, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

Below is a prayer that you can recite on your own or with your family as you reflect on the Most Holy Trinity.


AN ACT OF PRAISE



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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In my experience, one of the peculiarities of being a man is the somewhat unlikely ability to look into the mirror, no matter how out of shape he may be, and declare with full confidence: "Looking good, buddy!" Ask a man. He'll probably confirm it.

Therein lies a mystery. You might think I refer to man's ability to deceive himself or his propensity toward vainglory. But in this case, I refer to the mystery of a healthy and proper sense of self-love. We human beings (both men and women) have the utterly weird ability to look at ourselves as if we were another. Then we tend to love this "other." Then, somehow, that love becomes a bond between the two. We are three and yet one.

This Sunday is Trinity Sunday. We ponder anew that God in His unity is a play of multiplicity: Lover, Beloved, and shared Love. Or, as we also proclaim, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. If we allow it, this mystery heals our temptation toward self-hatred and destruction. We all know how awful it is to look into the mirror and not know the person we see, or, equally bad, to know and hate who we see. Jesus, the Son of God, draws us into the dynamics of authentic self-knowledge and self-love. Perhaps we could ask the Holy Trinity this Sunday to teach us to truly look at ourselves and to properly love who we see looking back.

We Bear the Name of the Lord

The name of the Lord is a curiously powerful thing. Say it deliberately, even in a group of people who are not particularly religious, and you'll know what I mean. There is a shift in the mood, a change in the atmosphere. When we utter the name of the Lord, He turns His head.

Once, in confession, I admitted to the sin of using the Lord's name in vain. "When you do that, tell God that you love him," advised the priest, who was wise enough to know that I would repeat this sin at some point. "You've said His name, after all. You have His attention."

We hear the name of the Lord, and we think of what it represents — John 3:16, salvation history summed up in a neat little sentence, the why and the how and the who of it all laid out before us. The Lord, so slow to anger that He offers us a million chances. The Lord, so rich in kindness and fidelity that He literally gave Himself to us that we might be saved.

But the name of the Lord is more than that. It is not just a symbol, it is an invitation. I think of Moses clutching the commandments, beseeching the Lord: "Come with us. Forgive us. Receive us as your own." The Lord accompanies us down the mountain. We bear the name of the Lord into the world with us wherever we go.

I have to ask myself: do I do that name justice?

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

We live in a country that upholds the separation of Church and state. What is the role of Catholics in society?

Answer:

The role of the Church in the world has taken different forms over time, but the theme is the same. Be disciples in it! As the lay faithful — that is, not vowed priest or religious — we are called to live and love in the circumstances of our daily lives. St. John Paul II wrote a document about the laity. In it he wrote, "In their situation in the world God manifests His plan and communicates to them their particular vocation of seeking the Kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God" (On the Lay Members of Christ's Faithful, 15).

God wants us in the hospitals, the board rooms, the law offices, the food pantries, and the little league games! We are to engage in the affairs of the world. But when we're there, we should live the plan of God. We need to respect those around us, engage in just business and legal practices, and love our children. We should care for the earth, use our money wisely, and get to know our neighbors. We must advocate for social policies that respect human dignity and human freedom. No matter our state in life, we are invited to build the kingdom of God!


Gospel Reading
