A Word from Father Thompson



A few years ago, a friend of mine (a faithful Catholic) posted something to Facebook. It was a quote from a politician in Europe calling for swift and disproportionate retribution for the latest atrocity committed by the so-

called Islamic State (ISIS). The quote advocated that the world begin to target the families of terrorists with tactics of terror in kind, such as kidnapping and maiming and public murder. I rebuked my friend, telling him that while it is understandable that he feel anger and a desire for justice after someone commits such an evil act, supporting such a response was EVIL and un-Christian, even sinful. He apologized and removed the post.

A few weeks later, there was a terrorist attack in San Bernardino, California and I heard other people expressing wishes that the dead terrorists were burning in Hell. In innumerable cases since as well, I will hear people echoing these sentiments and others like them. I don't know how many times I have heard people express a hope that perverts be abused in prison, those who harm police be mistreated in custody, that criminals be killed by police in standoffs, that murderers be executed swiftly (i.e. setting due process aside). Responses like this to evil are perhaps understandable, but are nonetheless wrong and signs of our fallen human nature. That does not excuse the initial atrocity, of course, and I am not saying that justice should not be meted out in response to great evil, only that the Christian heart should reject the impulse toward revenge for the sake of revenge. Wishing evil on sinners is the exact opposite of what Jesus Christ taught us.

Like I told my friend, I understand the hunger for swift and exact justice. The desire for justice is a good thing, it is a reflection of the Image of God (who is the just judge), in us. However, like so much of humanity, that desire for the scales of justice to balance is wounded by sin, and we all have a dark impulse to go beyond the bounds of virtuous justice and to resort to vicious vengeance. God gave the Israelites the Iaw "an eye for an eye" not to demand retribution but to temper the impulse to excessive retribution by setting a limit: no more than the original harm. However, Jesus taught us the more perfect way of mercy. We are to forgive as we wish to be forgiven, we are to pray for our enemies, we are to prefer being struck twice than strike back once. The abominable evils perpetrated by Russia against in Ukraine in past weeks, as well as the ongoing wickedness of dictators and terrorists throughout the world, and the ever-present cancer of society which is Marxism (no matter how slight) all serve as an opportunity to remember and actually practice this command of Jesus Christ.

That is not to say we do not believe in the need for justice. Those who do evil need to be opposed and their ability to threaten the innocent must be definitively ended. Christians may be called to turn the other cheek, but we do not have the option of turning other people's cheeks; we have an obligation to defend, or at least aid, the innocent. However, even as we hope and perhaps even act to cause the schemes of the wicked to fail, we should not wish additional evil on the evildoers, or to treat them as less than human, or to pretend a personal vendetta or hunger for revenge is justice.

So when the next terrible thing happens in the world or in our community, pray for the victims, of course, and hunger for justice, but I would ask you to add a prayer for the perpetrators (and mean it!): Lord Have Mercy, Christ Have Mercy, Lord Have Mercy.

The Feast of Corpus Christi is Today!

Have a family discussion about the Eucharist and Mass

"Corpus Christi" literally means "The Body of Christ." Corpus Christi is a day when we honor Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament and thank Him for His sacrifice on the Cross.

Spend some time this Sunday talking as a family about the gift of the Eucharist and the Holy Mass. Look at pictures of your children's First Communion celebrations and ask them what they remember about that day. Ask younger children what they are looking forward to and how they are preparing for their First Communions. Brainstorm some ways that you can grow closer to Jesus in the Eucharist as a family.

1. Participate in a procession: If you came to St. Columban's 10:30 mass, there will be a procession right after. It is a wonderful experience.

2. Put on a play! In the past, Corpus Christi processions would be followed by a play performance! These shows, called "Miracle Plays," would be about a saint's life or a story from the Bible.

Encourage your kids to put on their own play about a saint or a Bible story! Let them use their imaginations and gather objects and costumes from around the house. Perhaps they can get inspiration for their play from a new saint who loved the Eucharist! Blessed Carlo Acutis loved the Blessed Sacrament very much...he even made a website all about Eucharistic miracles that you can still visit today!

3. Go to Adoration. Make some time to visit Jesus in the Eucharist this week. Even just saying hello for a few minutes will make Him so happy! See if your parish will offer Benediction this week-this is a beautiful praver and has lots of smells and bells to interest kids! If you can, bring some flowers to the monstrance! Even flowers picked from your backyard will do. Place them at the foot of the altar as a family and remind your kids that we bring our prayers to Jesus and lay them at the altar, too!

4. Finally, start a new annual family tradition: Learn a Eucharistic hymn: These are the two we sing the most during first Friday here at Saint Columban. Tantum Ergo (Down in Adoration Falling) and O Salutaris Hostia (O Saving Sacrifice)



Saint of the Week: St. Anthony of Padua/Lisbon, Priest and Doctor of the Church "Hammer of Heretics" (d. 1231, feast day June 13)

From the website of the Friars of St. Anthony in Padua:

One day, a heretic told Anthony that he would believe that Christ was truly present in the Eucharist only if his mule bowed down to it.

They established that the test should take place in three days. The heretic starved his mule for the next three days. When the appointed time had arrived, Anthony stood off to one side with the consecrated host in his hands, while the heretic stood to the other holding some fodder for the mule to eat. The mule, ignoring its own extreme hunger, went before the Eucharist and knelt down to adore the Blessed Sacrament.

Questions of the Week, Reflect and Respond to the Sunday Readings

First Reading: "He therefore let you be afflicted with hunger, and then fed you with manna, a food unknown to you and your fathers." (Dt 8:3)

At the end of their forty-year journey in the desert, Moses instructs the Israelites not to forget how God taught them to depend on Him alone. How might you remind yourself of this important lesson in life?

Second Reading: "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf." (1 Cor 10:17)

Paul teaches the Corinthians that through the body and blood of Christ, the community of believers are "one body." Who in your life needs to hear this unifying message?



Take time to read and reflect on the Scriptures for this day.

Visit <u>www.usccb.org/bible/readings</u> or download an app such as *Laudate* or *iBreviary* to access the Mass readings. "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him." (John 6:56) When Jesus spoke these words to the crowds in today's gospel reading, it wasn't easy for them to understand. Even now, we might find it difficult to fully grasp how the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ at Mass. But there is one message that we can take away with certainty:

Jesus wants to remain in us, and for us to remain in him.

As humans, we know the longing to be near to those we love. We know what it means to love someone so much that we want to be with them and hold them close. This is what Jesus offers us in the Eucharist – a way to remain in him and become united with each other.



Talk

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family. Jesus said, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him." (John 6:56) Think of a time in your life when you were comforted or encouraged by God's presence. Share this story with your family and reflect on the way that Jesus offers us a way to remain in him through the Eucharist.

In the second reading, it is written, "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf." (1 Corinthians 10:17) Think of a time when you felt disconnected or far away from others. Perhaps it was a time when you struggled to find common ground with another person. It might have also been a time when you were physically distanced from your friends or loved ones. The second reading reminds us that although we are many, we are one body because we share in the Body and Blood of Christ. How does this shift the way you see your relationships with others, whether they are close by or far away?

ANIMA CHRISTI


