A Word from Father Thompson

The penultimate deadly sin is Envy. Envy compares ourselves to others, blinding us to the blessings we have received from God and the goodness other people have shown to us. Envy is the impulse to see that someone has more or different blessings than us and to consider that an injustice per se (or the fruit of past injustice), even if we ourselves do have enough (and even if we don't). Envy is also the impulse to think that we deserve good things from God, the world, or others; it is a failure of its contrary virtue, which is gratitude.

This deadly sin runs rampant in our world, and is perhaps one of the deepest flaws of some of the most unhelpful, and even evil, ideologies that are doing so much damage as they proclaim that they are establishing justice and peace. One can use noble-sounding words like "justice" and "equity" until one is blue in the face, but if what one means is Envy, one is not pursuing anything remotely good (and indeed, one would sow only evil, as we can see in our culture right now).

To give a big-picture example, I remember back in the late 2000s and early 2010s the Occupy Wall Street protests. Political and social commenters had any number of ideological reasons for or against those "movements," but in my estimation the inanity and evil of that and other movements (especially those involving Marxism, which is pure evil in every syllable of every word) before or since wasn't fundamentally a political or social problem, but a moral one: it ran on pure Envy. Even if they may have had some valid complaints about some concrete problems in our world, the Envy at the heart of that movement guaranteed that they could sow no solutions, only further sin and chaos. As John the Baptist said, a bad tree cannot bear good fruit. So many political and ideological movements across the spectrum, but especially those that have seduced my generation and younger, have this exact same problem: whatever good impulse they may have, Envy (and other deadly sins, but Envy in particular) corrupted them utterly.

Like the division and anger in our world that led me to begin this series on deadly sins, the Catholic response to these sorts of false promises and false solutions to the problems of our world is not to rush toward a polar opposite political or ideological extreme in response: Decrying Envy is not to embrace Greed, opposing Wrath is not to tolerate injustice; one can never do evil to accomplish a perceived good, nor should one want to. Instead, we must free ourselves from simplistic worldly ideological categories and begin confronting the problems in the world by first attending to our own hearts and temptations. With Envy in particular, we need to let go entirely from the diabolical lie that inequality is inherently inequitable, beginning in our own lives and experiences; we have no right to another person's blessings (although, they do have a duty to generosity), nor—in general—is their fortune or blessing depriving us of what we have or deserve. Instead, in gratitude, we should literally count our blessings and rejoice in what we do have (and take responsibility for the blessings we have in some way refused). That done, we might at that point be able to soberly identify and deal with the real injustices in our lives and the world around us.

Faith Formation

REGISTER FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

All classes for K-12 Faith Formation begin September 10. Gaby will be in the narthex after Sunday Mass 13 for any families that would like to register.

At St. Columban, we provide an opportunity for children and youth to learn about their Catholic faith and grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ through study, prayer, and community service.

We have Faith Formation classes available for every grade level!

Children ~ Grades K-5 Youth ~ Grades 6-12

Our curriculum, developed by the Archdiocese of Seattle, is built upon the four pillars of the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

Recent revisions place an intentional focus on all dimensions of faith formation: knowledge of faith, liturgical life, moral formation, prayer, belonging to a community and the formation of a missionary spirit. The curriculum is very comprehensive.

Combined with the love and guidance of dedicated volunteer catechists, the children and youth learn to See as a Catholic, Celebrate as a Catholic and Live as a Catholic.

The sacraments are efficacious signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, by which divine life is dispensed to us.^[2]

- † In **Confirmation** the baptized Christian is sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit and is strengthened for service to the Body of Christ
- **Reconciliation** is the sacrament by which sins committed after Baptism are forgiven.
- Holy Communion is the receiving of Jesus Christ body, blood, soul, and divinity in the Holy Eucharist.

Catechesis for these sacraments first begins in the family...

- Where love and forgiveness are modeled daily.
- And as participants in the Sunday Eucharist (Holy Mass) and in the life of the parish.

First Reconciliation & First Holy Communion

Formal catechesis is a two year program.

- Formation begins in first grade.
- Must complete a full first year in first grade before advancing to year two.

<u>Second Graders:</u> Immediate preparation for First Communion normally occurs in the second grade after fulfilling year one in first grade.

<u>Pre-teens and older teens</u> are also invited to simultaneously prepare for Confirmation. Reception of the sacraments would be during the second full year of preparation.



Christian Initiation (RCIA), adapted for Children & Youth (Ages 7+)

RCIA adapted for children ages 7+

The Christian Initiation of these children requires both a conversion that is both personal and adapted to their age, education or degree of social development. The process of initiation must also be adapted to both spiritual progress, that is to the children's growth in faith and the catechetical instruction they receive.

This program requires two years of formation here at St. Columban.

Confirmation

Strengthening our youth with the gifts of The Holy Spirit!

In the Archdiocese of Seattle, Confirmation is given in the 7th grade. Preparation for Confirmation is a **two year program**. Our program is structured with preparation beginning in the 6th Grade. Older teens are welcome to enroll and prepare for Confirmation.

A main part of the journey towards the Sacrament of Confirmation is establishing a sense of community among the youth. They will be expected to attend and/or volunteer for various ministries and participate in Youth Ministry activities over the course of the **two years of Confirmation prep.**

RCIA (Christian Initiation for Adults)

Non-Christians and other non-Catholics seeking full communion into the Catholic Church are invited to discern through the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA) program. Classes resume Fall 2023 and meet weekly. Contact Gaby for more information and how to sign-up.

Saint of the Week: St. Maximilian Kolbe, OFM Conv.

1894-1941 Poland. Feast Aug. 14. Priest . Courage and sacrificial love mark the life of St. Maximilian Kolbe. He became a priest of the Franciscan order. Dedicated with evangelization, he published a magazine to teach the Catholic faith and encourage devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

During the Nazi occupation of Poland, Fr. Kolbe was arrested and sent to Auschwitz. One day a prisoner escaped from the camp. The Nazi punishment was harsh. For one escapee, 10 must die in his place. The guards picked 10 men at random. One began to beg for his life on behalf of his family, and another man stepped forward and offered to take his place. Fr. Kolbe was sentenced, along with the other nine men, to death by starvation. For this "martyr of Auschwitz," a life of devotion culminated in one heroic, Christlike

Straight out of the Catechism

CCC 966 "Finally the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death." The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians:

In giving birth you kept your virginity; in your Dormition you did not leave the world, O Mother of God, but were joined to the source of Life. You conceived the living God and, by your prayers, will deliver our souls from death.



Daughters of Mary

In the spirit of Mary our Mother, we strive to be attentive to the spiritual and corporal needs of our pastor, parish, and community through service and prayer.

Open to all women of the parish, we assist with parish activities and provide outreach in a variety of ways. Current initiatives include Cards of Comfort, where letters and notes of encouragement are collected and delivered to residents of various retirement homes and the most vulnerable in our community, and the Seven Sisters prayer apostolate.

Daughters of Mary members meet inperson or over Zoom on the last Tuesday of every month at 6PM in the Parish Hall and host a monthly fellowship after Sunday Mass.

Faith Formation

Volunteer parishioners help teach all grades of students as well as sacramental preparation classes for First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion, Confirmation, and for Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA). Training and support for new and returning catechists is provided.

Homebound Ministry

Ministers are trained to bring Holy Communion to those who cannot physically attend Mass due to health constraints, servicing local care facilities and private residences in our area.

Liturgical Ministries

The laity assist with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass through various roles. Ordinarily, attendance of Sunday Mass and union of one's prayers to that of

the priest and the Church during the Mass fulfills this role. Parishioners with certain talents also can volunteer as Greeters, Ushers, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, and members of the Choir (Music Ministry) to assist our community in our Sunday worship. Additionally, boys who have already received their First Holy Communion are trained to become Altar Servers. All these roles help the greater Body of Christ at our church.

Knights of Columbus Council 17152 & Assembly 3947

We are Catholic gentlemen committed to the exemplification of charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism and to the defense of the priesthood.

Council 17152 hosts the annual Coats for Kids Car Show every summer, which raises money for winter coats. The Council also spearheads several social dinners and monthly breakfasts happening throughout the year. All men of the parish are welcome to join! Council meetings are held every third Wednesday of the month. The Assembly meets the Monday preceding the council meeting.

Society of St. Vincent de Paul

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded in 1833 to help impoverished people living in the slums of Paris, France. Our chapter is


Prayer Groups

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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A man at my parish was struggling to overcome a habitual sin. He said to me, "Father, I know the chance that I will commit sin again is really high. Why should I keep confessing my sins? Isn't that dishonest?" Anyone who has felt the tyrannical power of sin — and who hasn't? — has pondered this kind of question.

I responded to him, "What was the probability Peter would walk on the stormy water?" After some silence, he said, "Zero. But when Jesus called, he did it." I could tell my penitent friend was re-framing the question from his own weakness to the greatness of the Lord's love for him. The question for us should not be one of human probabilities about our sin, but rather whether or not we will trust the Lord's grace in our lives.

This week the Lord is calling you and me to do the impossible: overcome sin with love. The only way to do that is to trust he is calling, and then to walk with the eyes of faith locked on him. And if we sink, he will raise us up again and again. Of that, we can be 100% sure.

God and the Good Strong Wind

My only real memory of the Mackinac Island ferry was the physical sensation of the wind against my face. I remember, distinctly, that it hurt.

It surprised and confused me because wind had never felt painful before. Looking back now, I realize that it wasn't just the wind but the spray from the waves that crashed against the side of the ferry — that was what produced the sharp, biting sensation on my skin. But I couldn't have known that then, because my eyes were clamped shut. I refused to open them, even if I had, I would not have seen much, because my long hair was blown straight across my face.

I was four years old, and it was, in the immortal words of Winnie-the-Pooh, a very blustery day as my family made our way to Mackinac Island. I remember thinking I was going to die. I'm positive now that it wasn't really all that dramatic, but at four years old, you're awfully scared of a good strong wind.

Deep inside, aren't we all, really?

I think of the apostles who cannot recognize Christ—their friend—because he is doing something new. Something impossible. They are so sure he is a ghost, a sinister thing—children are always frightened of what they cannot understand.

And even when he reassures them, still Peter is not convinced. He demands, essentially, a miracle. He demands that Christ make him do what only Christ can do.

And even when the miracle takes place — he walks on water, he defies physics — still he is human. Scared, doubtful, distractible. No match for a good strong wind.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

If we have a separation of church and state, how should faith influence the way we act in society, especially for those who have a role in the government?

Answer:

No matter who we are, our inner lives affect the way we interact with the world. In the United States, we have freedom of religion. That means there is no official state-sanctioned religion. This does not mean that our faith is a private affair with no impact on public life! We have the ability to freely exercise our religious beliefs in accord with our conscience. Not only do we have the option to do so, but we also have the responsibility.

We're called to imitate Christ in every area of our life, not compartmentalize our faith. This means acting with respect and honoring the common humanity all we encounter. It means recognizing the person behind the politics. It also means standing up for the truth of human life and dignity and advocating for just policies that serve the common good. The Vatican has produced a "Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church." It contains more detailed exposition of how our Catholic faith relates to various aspects of public life.


Gospel Reading




Sharing the Gospel
