### A Word from Father Thompson

A few years ago, the Vatican released a document entitled *Male and Female He Created them*, discussing the issue that we have been seeing in world society in the past few years with regard to some foundational errors about humanity that have come into popularity of late. Most

notably, these errors include the notion that there is a reality of gender that can vary independently from biological sex, that either or both gender and sex are qualities that an individual can choose or define for oneself, and that all this rests upon the subjective feelings of the individual. This is all, of course, absolute nonsense.

As Christians, we should see these errors as not only patently wrong, but also very tragic. Pressure to accept or treat as valid the claims the plurality (i.e. beyond the two) or mutability of gender—or that it is not objectively tied to biological reality--is not merely just one more way in which modern culture, to its peril and ruin, is abandoning its Judeo-Christian roots, but also in a very particular way strikes at the core of our very humanity and being, a being that is created in the Image and Likeness of God. What is more, it is real people's humanity, real people's being that is disrespected and deformed by these errors. These people are in danger of real painful consequences when these false lights and false promises inevitably fail to address the real sources of unhappiness in these peoples' lives.


This is especially true of young people, who so often when trying to think through and discover what it means to be men or women and live it out in their own particular lives and with their own particular gifts and personalities, would find the task difficult and confusing enough in a sane and healthy culture; the other deformations of ourselves and our world due to sin, and now all this gender theory garbage, does not make it any easier, either. We should be ready and willing to guide and help our young people through this inner drama, especially those who experience disharmony or disintegration between their body, mind, and spirit. As Christians and as people of good will, we must hold firm to the fact that it does not help a confused child in any way to mutilate him or her, physically or psychologically. The ideology of gender being a subjective reality and independently variable from bodily sex is a lie from the Devil of Hell. Yet so many otherwise rational Christians have been led astray because advocates of this wicked ideology have appealed to our sense of compassion. Beware those who try to manipulate your compassion, they are so often selling the worst kind of evils.

We are not ghosts riding in puppets made of meat. Together with our souls, our bodies **are** us. The body has purpose, the body has meaning, the body is good. When people struggle to love and accept their bodies (and it need not only be something as extreme as gender dysphoria. Kids and adults in their millions suffer body-image disorders and other mental issues to one degree or another), we always need to respond with love, but also always love shaped by truth (even when that truth, given in love, is hard for the person to receive). It is important for us, even while rejecting this vile ideology, not to do so in a way that harms or denigrates people who have been ensnared by these lies.



### Did you know?

This month is commemorated as the Month of the Seven Sorrows of Mary. This is because the memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows falls on September 15, which always follows the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. This Marian devotion includes meditating on each of the Seven Sorrows. The sorrows are particular events in the life of Mary which are representative of the sufferings she endured as the Mother of Christ. This should not be confused with the five Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary. Do you remember each of the Seven Sorrows? See the answer on page 6.

### **Elementary Faith Formation**

### Things to know:

<u>Arrival</u>: Please walk your student into the RE building. At the desk is our volunteer that will ask for grade and name and direct you to the location of your class.

#### Dismissal:

K-3rd grade must be picked up in their classroom by a parent. If you would like your child released to a sibling or a different adult. Please fill out our purple permission slip.

4th and 5th grade. These students also have to wait for a parent to pick them up unless write us a note with specific instructions. Exp. Meet at car, Church or Parish Hall. Each student must have a note in their file.

In Case of Emergency: Please be sure to have a secondary phone number and contact info on file just in case we cannot reach you.

### **Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA)/Adult Faith Formation**

All are invited to Classes for RCIA, which start next week, Tuesday, Sept 19th from 6:30-8pm. Classes are open to all adults in the parish seeking to learn more about their Catholic faith and to those seeking Sacraments. If you have not registered it is not too late to do so.



### **Confirmation Preparation**

In the Archdiocese of Seattle, Confirmation is given in the 7th grade. Preparation for Confirmation is a two year program. Our program is structured with preparation beginning in the 6th Grade. Older teens are welcome to enroll and prepare for Confirmation.

A main part of the journey towards the Sacrament of Confirmation is establishing a sense of community among the youth. They will be expected to attend and/or volunteer for various ministries and participate in Youth Ministry activities over the course of the two years of Confirmation prep. Confirmation classes are scheduled the same time as Elementary Faith Formation, 9am on Sundays in the Youth Space.

Second Reading: Love does no evil to the neighbor; hence, love is the fulfillment of the law. (Rom 13:10)


Paul taught that love (loving one's neighbor) is the fulfillment of the law God gave to Israel. What do you think is most challenging to this seemingly simple command to love one another?

# Saint of the Week Ora pro nobis! Pray for us!



### ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM, BISHOP & DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH September 13

Born in Antioch in the 4th century, and raised by his widowed mother, Saint John received a rigorous classical education. He was first called to the ascetic life, even spending time as an anchorite living in a cave near Antioch. However, this life of extreme mortification was hard on his physical body, and he eventually returned to the city to recover.

Saint John was ordained in 298. He spent the next 12 years preaching in the Cathedral of Antioch, and it was most likely during this time that he earned the name Chrysostom which means "goldenmouthed."

In 397 or 398 he was made archbishop of Constantinople against his will. This post placed Saint John in the midst of imperial politics. But he would not be drawn in. He kept a modest household without extravagance and refused to serve the sumptuous suppers for political supplicants that predecessors in the position had. He preached against corruption and decadence and fought for the reform of clergy even deposing corrupt bishops.

Unfortunately, this high moral stance made enemies of powerful people at court and in the Church. They conspired against him and eventually Saint John was exiled to Armenia. He died in exile in 407. He was made a Father of the Church at the Council of Chalcedon in 451 and declared a Doctor of the Church in 1568.

### From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

TO CHOOSE IN ACCORD WITH CONSCIENCE

1786 Faced with a moral choice, conscience can make either a right judgment in accordance with reason and the divine law or, on the contrary, an erroneous judgment that departs from them.

1787 Man is sometimes confronted by situations that make moral judgments less assured and decision difficult. But he must always seriously seek what is right and good and discern the will of God expressed in divine law.

1788 To this purpose, man strives to interpret the data of experience and the signs of the times assisted by the virtue of prudence, by the advice of competent people, and by the help of the Holy Spirit and his gifts.

1789 Some rules apply in every case:


- One may never do evil so that good may result from it;
- the Golden Rule: "Whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them."
- charity always proceeds by way of respect for one's neighbor and his conscience: "Thus sinning against your brethren and wounding their conscience . . . you sin against Christ." Therefore "it is right not to . . . do anything that makes your brother stumble."

#### On the Cover Filippo Lippi (1406-1469) Vision of St Augustine c. 1460

St. Augustine on today's Gospel reading: "If someone has done you injury and you have suffered, what should be done? You have heard the answer already in this scripture: "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone." If you fail to do so, you are worse than he is. He has done someone harm, and by doing harm he has stricken himself with a grievous wound. Will you then completely disregard your brother's wound? Will you simply watch him stumble and fall down? Will you disregard his predicament? If so, you are worse in your silence than he in his abuse. Therefore, when any one sins against us, let us take great care, but not merely for ourselves. For it is a glorious thing to forget injuries. Just set aside your own injury, but do not neglect your brother's wound. Therefore, "go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone," intent upon his amendment but sparing his sense of shame. For it might happen that through defensiveness he will begin to justify his sin, and so you will have inadvertently nudged him still closer toward the very behavior you desire to amend. Therefore, "tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother," because he might have been lost, had you not spoken with him." [Sermon 82.7]

# What's the latest with the Synod? Synod 2021 2024 For a synodal Church communical participation; mission

Initiated by Pope Francis, the Synod on Synodality is a process of listening and dialogue which began in 2021 with a worldwide consultation of the People of God. The Synod continues with gatherings of delegates in Rome in October 2023 and is expected to conclude in 2024. What is a Synod? The Church is in synod! The word "synod" means "on the way together" and refers to a gathering of the Church for discernment or decision-making.

Who is part of the Synod? This Synod is unprecedented in the breadth of participation. In fall of 2021 and winter and spring of 2022, millions of people all over the world participated in listening sessions — the widest consultation of the people of God, and indeed of the human family, in history. In the Archdiocese of Seattle, 11,000 people took part in listening sessions in their parishes or online.

In October 2023, laypeople as well as bishops will serve as official delegates to the Synod — a first. Archbishop Paul D. Etienne was named a delegate by Pope Francis, making him one of about 20 Americans participating in the Synod.

### What happens next?

All the work that has happened to this point has prepared the way for the gathering of delegates in Rome in October 2023. The work of the delegates will be guided by the *Instrumentum Laboris* for the Synod. What happens next depends on their deliberations. We know that the Synod will continue into a second session in October 2024.

### What will be talked about?

The *Instrumentum Laboris* guiding the work of the delegates this fall asks a wide range of questions focused on how the Church can foster communion, strengthen participation, and carry out its mission. Topics considered include

caring for creation, ecumenism, the participation of the baptized in the life of the Church, the role of women, and the inclusion of marginalized groups, as well as considerations around leadership and decision-making at the local, national, and global levels. Ultimately, the focus of the Synod is synodality itself: How can we walk together more effectively? How can our decision-making processes engage the whole people of God? How can we listen to one another and to the Holy Spirit more intentionally? How can we overcome polarization and divisions and walk together without erasing differences, but holding them in creative tension?

### Where can I find out what's happening at the Synod this October?

The Synod assembly is likely to be widely covered in the media. It is important to choose reliable sources because many popular media outlets will likely focus on any controversial topics that are discussed, possibly losing sight of the big picture: The Synod is not about a single topic, but rather about how we walk together as Church in every aspect of life and ministry.

This is a good time to read, reflect on, and discuss the *Instrumentum Laboris* and the other documents the Synod has produced so far. Above all, let us pray for the Synod, that the delegates in Rome may listen deeply to one another and, most especially, to the Holy Spirit!

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### **Gospel Meditation**

### **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

What are you supposed to do about the bad behavior of the people around you? You know who I'm talking about. That family member, friend, coworker, or acquaintance who is quite immoral. On this front there are two lively options in our culture: bash the person to others (probably online) or pretend everything's fine. The former damages the person. The latter ignores reality. What to do?

Jesus' strategy in the Gospel of Matthew is as wise as it is difficult: go directly to the person, and then gradually expand the circle of intervention. Simple, often effective, and hard. But what we often miss is the context of the Lord's strategy, "If your brother sins against you..." Notice the italicized words. Is the person in a Christian familial bond with you? And was the action in question against you? If so, proceed with the plan. Fine. But how often we fret over the sins of those who either aren't our spiritual siblings or have done nothing directly to us. This is not an invitation to ignore injustice in the world. Rather, we should build bonds of fraternal love, and carefully discern when and how others' sins are indeed our concern. Sometimes they are. Other times — frequently, perhaps — they simply are not.

### **Love and Truth**

I think even the most devout, the most pious Catholic reading this could summon to mind, if asked, one or even two examples of Catholic teaching for which they have desperately looked for a loophole.

Don't worry, I won't make you share with the group. But bring it to your mind now: the doctrine you once resented, or perhaps still do. The commandment you don't fully understand, the one you bristle against. The rule you find the hardest to follow. The belief you hate explaining to your friends.

If it disappeared from scripture or dropped out of the catechism, would your life really be easier? Would you be happier?

I am thinking of mine. For a long time, I searched high and low for a way around this particular teaching. I read books and Scripture and tradition, I prayed and reflected and tried to argue with myself. For a time, I gave up complying with it entirely. I threw it to the wind, with a shoulder shrug and a self-satisfied assurance to myself that God, being a loving father, does not want his child to be unhappy.

But reader: I was miserable. I was so, so miserable, and I stayed that way until I finally accepted that God is, indeed, a loving father, and desires nothing less than the unhappiness of his children. And so, to ward it off, he has given us the truth, and asked us to share it amongst ourselves like a cherished heirloom, a priceless inheritance.

To share truth, you must show love. To show love, you must share truth. One demands the other. Because this is what Christ does for us, and this is the mission of the Church in this world. Loosening and binding. Bearing witness. Giving testimony. Speaking truth, and in speaking truth, showing love.

### Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

### **Question:**

After a civil divorce, is a Catholic obligated to pursue an annulment?

### **Answer:**

Many Catholics are not exactly sure what an annulment does. An annulment does not deny that a marriage took place, nor does it deny that there once was love. It does not mean that people say anything untrue, such as they never loved each other or that everything in their marriage was wrong. An annulment does not negate children, nor make them illegitimate. An annulment addresses the spiritual aspect of marriage. In effect, an annulment says that at the time of the wedding, there was either something present or something absent that prevented the sacrament from taking place. It is a spiritual determination that. if granted in the affirmative, allows a person to marry in the Church.

Annulments have no legal standing and are unable to be used in a civil court. Therefore, a Catholic has no moral obligation to pursue an annulment. However, when the tragedy of divorce occurs, and there is no hope for reconciliation, annulments may help bring some spiritual closure to a person's life. Some people have found the process to be healing and others have found it to be difficult. Speak to your priest or a member of the Diocesan Tribunal staff to decide what is best for you.




