#### A Word from Father Thompson

On occasion, I receive questions from parishioners about why I do some of the things I do, especially at Mass. So, I thought I might explain a few practices and stylistic choices which I have not already explained in prior bulletin articles. Of course, I can't cover everything (indeed I probably won't think of everything you are curious about), but I will try to hit the most common ones based on questions I have received in the past. You may have noticed I have a strong personal interest in liturgy and sacraments, and really enjoy talking about them. Please never hesitate to ask me questions, even if the question is confusion about why I do certain things, I love giving answers and clarifying misconceptions (be

I know, as for most of you your primary experience with me is assisting at the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, wherein I tend to carry a certain persona that is quite unlike my actual personality were you to speak with me elsewhere (or even greet me before or after Mass). So why the, for lack of a better word, stiff persona?

warned, however, I can sometimes get quite excited and respond at length).

The reason is to emphasize the dignity and power of the mysteries we are celebrating, that they are beyond ourselves, and—in a way—to deemphasize myself. I do not mean this in the sense of making myself unremarkable, as obviously you can't help but pay attention to the priest at Mass and I know my approach is perhaps not what you have been accustomed to with other priests you may have known. What I mean by deemphasize myself, is to deemphasize my own personality in the rituals of the Mass. The Mass is a sacrificial encounter with the Living God, not me or any priest as a person. This is why, for example, I lower my eyes when turning to address the congregation or when distributing Holy Communion: to avoid catching your eye so that you can keep your eyes on Christ (you might notice, though, that when I am speaking to God with or on behalf of the congregation, I turn my body and raise my eyes to the Cross with you; historically, virtually the whole Mass was celebrated with the priest facing the cross with the congregation—those who describe it as the priest having his back to you speak from theological and historical ignorance). Yes, this selfdeemphasis is at the cost of perhaps seeming a bit stern or impersonal from a certain point of view, but that impersonality is kind of the point. Within the ritual moments of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, it should not matter whether it is me or any other priest celebrating the liturgy; I am serving a function that is larger than myself. The liturgical persona is just that: a persona, a mask, a part in a mystical drama, and it is quite intentional. It is the behavioral equivalent of wearing vestments.

However, I am not unaware that for those who don't understand or share my approach to our common prayer, I might indeed seem intimidating at Mass. This is the reason, and because I am in fact happy to see you all, that I make such an effort to be present before and after Mass to greet you as you come and go. That time, and perhaps in my homilies (and any asides, announcements, or commentary I might add between ritual moments), are perhaps more obviously the "real me."

Reflect and Respond to the Sunday Readings

First Reading: Forgive your neighbor's injustice; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven. (Sir 28:2)

Sirach teaches that the Lord desires us to be forgiving and merciful to each other. In doing so, the Lord will show us mercy and forgiveness in return. To whom could you show mercy and forgiveness this week?

Second Reading: None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. (Rom 14:7-8)

Paul instructed the Romans that Jesus was the Lord of all — both the living and the dead. How should this reality impact our daily living?

Gospel: "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventyseven times." (Mt 18:21-22)

Jesus tells the parable of the unforgiving servant to teach the disciples the importance of compassion and forgiveness, especially toward those who sin against you. How do you deal with friends or co-workers who have wronged you?

St. Vincent de Paul is much more than a patron saint of thrift shops! Young Vincent became a priest hoping to advance and rise above his modest upbringing. His early ambition amounted to little when he

was assigned to a poor rural parish. Here he experienced a new joy in his vocation. Hearing the profound deathbed confession of a dying servant, Vincent became more convinced of the special attention that must be given to the poor. In 1625, Vincent founded the Congregation of the Mission for the purpose of caring for the poor. Originally priests only, the mission expanded to include groups of laity who provided for spiritual and material needs of the poor in each parish. Nearly 400 hundred years later, his legacy lives on!

#### From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

#### THE ANGELS

The existence of angels - a truth of faith

328 The existence of the spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Sacred Scripture usually calls "angels" is a truth of faith. The witness of Scripture is as clear as the unanimity of Tradition.

#### Who are they?

329 St. Augustine says: "'Angel' is the name of their office, not of their nature. If you seek the name of their nature, it is 'spirit'; if you seek the name of their office, it is 'angel': from what they are, 'spirit', from what they do, 'angel." With their whole beings the angels are servants and messengers of God. Because they "always behold the face of my Father who is in heaven" they are the "mighty ones who do his word, hearkening to the voice of his word".

330 As purely spiritual creatures angels have intelligence and will: they are personal and immortal creatures, surpassing in perfection all visible creatures, as the splendor of their glory bears witness.

#### Christ "with all his angels"

331 Christ is the center of the angelic world. They are his angels: "When the Son of man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him. ." They belong to him because they were created through and for him: "for in him all things were created in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or authorities - all things were created through him and for him." They belong to him still more because he has made them messengers of his saving plan: "Are they not all ministering spirits sent forth to serve, for the sake of those who are to obtain salvation?"



332 Angels have been present since creation and throughout the history of salvation, announcing this salvation from afar or near and serving the accomplishment of the divine plan: they closed the earthly paradise; protected Lot; saved Hagar and her child; stayed Abraham's hand; communicated the law by their ministry; led the People of God; announced births and callings; and assisted the prophets, just to cite a few examples. Finally, the angel Gabriel announced the birth of the Precursor and that of Jesus himself.

## Q&A (updated July 2023) provided by the Archdiocese of Seattle

#### Q: What is Partners in the Gospel?

A: Partners in Gospel is a strategic pastoral planning effort taking place across the Archdiocese of Seattle to re-invigorate and renew our local Catholic Church.

#### Q: Why the focus on strategic pastoral planning?

A: The mission of the Catholic Church – which is to encounter Jesus, accompany others and live the joy of the Gospel – is at the heart of strategic pastoral planning. To achieve our mission, we must reinvigorate our parish communities, which includes adapting to the needs of the faithful and to our current reality. As part of strategic pastoral planning, we continually examine our resources and how we can best use them to support vibrant, sustainable, mission-focused parish communities across the entire Archdiocese of Seattle.

#### Q: Why now?

A: Today we face many realities that are impacting parish life and making it difficult to fully live out our mission. We face an urgent — yet exciting — opportunity to transform parish life. Over the past few decades our local Catholic Church has experienced a decrease of engaged parishioners, fewer priests, dwindling finances, deteriorating campus conditions and more. Here are just a few statistics:

- Today the archdiocese has 80 diocesan pastors for 174 locations; by 2036, we estimate we will only have 66 diocesan pastors, an 18% decrease. (We also have fewer seminarians and fewer lay ministry leaders.)
- While the overall population the Archdiocese of Seattle is growing, registered households are declining, along with Mass attendance, baptisms, first communions, marriages in the Church and parish giving:
  - o From 2010 to 2019, Mass attendance declined 11%. o Between 2010 and 2019, baptisms declined 32% and weddings declined nearly 19%.
- Currently, 67% of parishes operate with a financial deficit (excluding extraordinary income, which is income from sources such as leasing properties and endowments).

#### Q: What will be the outcome with Partners in the Gospel?

A: There is no predetermined outcome for this strategic pastoral planning effort. Together we will pray to the Holy Spirit to guide our efforts so that we can support our mission to encounter Jesus, accompany others and live the joy of the Gospel.

What we do know is that Partners in the Gospel will bring most parishes together into a new family structure with two or more other parishes. This parish family will be under the leadership of one pastor and have

about three years to join together to become one canonical parish. The pastor, parish leaders and parishioners will determine how this new family will best join together to carry out the mission of the Church as one parish.

## Q: Can you define what you mean by "parish" and "parish family"?

A: A parish is defined as a certain community of the faithful stably constituted within the archdiocese, whose pastoral care is entrusted to a priest as its proper pastor under the authority of the Archbishop of Seattle. (c. 515§1)

Note that the term parish refers to the community of people and not the sacred building designated for divine worship — the church (with a lowercase "c").

A parish family is a group of two or more neighboring parishes under the leadership of one pastor and one or more parochial vicars. Over time, the parish family will determine its own consultative leadership team(s) and how they may share resources such as staff, ministries and outreach.

#### Q: Will all parishes be in families?

A: The majority of parishes will be placed in a family. However, there will be some parishes, due to size, geographic location, unique cultural communities or other factors, that will not join a family. These parishes will still be part of the Partners of the Gospel renewal effort to plan for how to best carry out the mission of the Church.

#### Q: What are the benefits of this approach?

A: This highly consultative approach gives parishioners the ability to provide input and take an active role in building and renewing their local Church. The process allows communities time to truly journey together and accompany one another in a synodal manner, while forming one new vibrant parish community. It is intended to give priests more time for pastoral care while also ensuring no parish community is left out. The new parish family will benefit from the shared gifts, talents, finances, resources and more from each of the joining parishes. This consolidation means that the new parish family may have more resources to carry out the mission, which could include benefits like a larger active youth group and fuller Masses in one location — and a larger outreach ministry at another location. It really comes down to the creativity and engagement of the parishioners and parish leaders to determine how the family will

collaborate to carry out the mission. Please know that the Archdiocese is committing significant resources to support parishes throughout this journey.

#### Q: Does this mean churches/parishes are closing?

- A: Yes and no. First, it is important to note the parish is not the church building. The parish is the community of the faithful and all that comes with it.
- The parish community of faithful will not be closing, but instead will join together to form one new community of faith.
- It is likely that some Church buildings will close or be repurposed as part of this process.

#### Further explanation:

A parish family is comprised of different parish communities that will eventually become one canonical parish. Decisions will be made at the local level to reflect the needs of each parish community. The parish leadership, with input from parishioners and guidance from the Holy Spirit through a synodal process, will make decisions about how to best carry out the mission locally. This means that the new parish will determine many things, such as what ministries to provide, what outreach to the community is possible, what Mass times to offer and what and how properties and buildings will be used.

#### Q: Is this simply expanded clustering?

A: No. This is not expanded clustering. Further explanation:

To enable and support parishes in this renewal effort, Partners in the Gospel uses a fundamentally different approach to the historical clustering model. The parish family is a temporary step on the way to becoming one parish. A comprehensive parish support plan is in development as part of this process. This support plan will include a newly formed group of liaison staff, employed and funded by the Chancery, who will accompany the pastor in guiding the parish family through the process of becoming one parish. In addition, many tools and resources are in development that will help support parishes every step of the way, including detailed handbooks for navigating prayer and worship, community, discipleship, mission and evangelization, governance and leadership, and administration, infrastructure and finance.
