About the Solemnity of the **Immaculate Conception**

"The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin."



John Carroll, the first bishop in the United States, had a great devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and in 1792 placed the diocese of Baltimore, then encompassing all thirteen states, under her protection. The U.S. bishops subsequently in 1846 unanimously named Mary, under her title of the Immaculate Conception as the patroness of the nation, feeling the need for a protectress for the new republic. This declaration was approved by Bl. Pius IX in 1847 and the Dogma of the Immaculate Conception was promulgated in 1854. Since this is our "National Feast Day", it is a Holy Day of Obligation, wherein we thank God for his blessings and ask Mary, under her title the Immaculate Conception for her prayers in protecting our nation.

A Word from Father Thompson

A lot of the time when people disagree about the way in which a community worships it so often devolves into matters of personal taste. I am perhaps guilty of this as well at times, though I am conscious of it and try very hard to keep an objective attitude towards matters of worship. The reason that it is important to keep such objectivity if possible is because the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is not my private prayer or your private prayer, or even our given community's prayer. Indeed, it is not a matter of how many people are sharing the prayer but rather an issue of the prayer being not one of a private nature at all. The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is a priestly prayer. I do not mean that it is my special possession as an ordained priest either and you are merely spectators or secondary participants. What I mean by priestly prayer is a prayer that is offered on behalf of the World in an official way by the Church: The priestly nature of this prayer actually refers to our baptismal priesthood, Even though it does require the presence and Ministry of an ordained priest to be carried out. This is what Liturgy means: work—in this case the work of God—done for the sake of the public—in this case the people of our parish and the world. Consequently, we are called to do this work in accord with the Sacred Tradition contained in the Deposit of Faith, and to conform our tastes and expectations to it, rather than it to ourselves.

There are plenty of prayers and devotions that are of a private nature that might still be prayed together in a community. The Rosary is one example of this; No matter how many people are reciting it together, it still by nature remains a private prayer of the participants each and altogether as a body. People will sometimes ask with regard to the rosary what additional prayers or practices are OK (Usually this is brought to me as a stealthy way of complaining about this or that rosary leader). The fact of the matter is though that other than I suppose the general outline of what a rosary is with the certain mysteries numbers of Hail Mary's and our fathers and such, there isn't really an authoritative way to say the Rosary, merely the force of custom and common agreement.

The Mass on the other hand, even if I am literally saying it alone in the rectory, the entire Church is mystically brought into and participating in that sacrifice. I may not be explaining myself well, but it is an important distinction because it reminds us of a proper sense of responsibility to carrying out our worship in reference to its nature and purpose apart from our preferences. Unlike private devotions, there is a proper spirit the liturgy, and thus some ways are superior to other ways, not for reason of preference but for reason of adherence to the Truth.

I would encourage us in this new liturgical year to foster a greater liturgical spirit that recognizes that the sacred mysteries of the Mass and other Sacraments have a nature to which we are called to conform ourselves for the sake of the World we are serving through them, and try to root out the attitude that sometimes approaches priestly prayer as if it were our private prayer.

Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA)/Adult Faith Formation



Advent Family Traditions

Advent, the liturgical season before Christmas, is a great opportunity for families to enjoy joyful, faith-based traditions that keep the focus of the season on the anticipation of Jesus. This isn't easy when retailers start Christmas the day after Halloween. Even if you didn't grow up with many Advent traditions, are there one or two traditions on this list that you can try this year?

Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is rich with the symbolism of the season: four candles for the four weeks of Advent and the flames representing the light of Christ to come. The lighting of each candle is an opportunity for the family to gather in prayer and read the daily scripture or reflection from an Advent book. Try turning off the lights and sing a song like, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" or "Light the Advent Candle" as the candles are lit.

Advent Calendar

The point of an Advent calendar is to inspire hopeful anticipation of the coming of Jesus and to emphasize the spirit of waiting over the spirit of receiving. Although the chocolate and Lego calendars are fun, try a faith inspired Advent calendar this year, which are easy to purchase online. Many have daily scripture quotes from Advent to keep you in the Advent frame of mind.

First Sunday of Advent

Christmas Anticipation Prayer

Also known as the St. Andrew Christmas Novena (not a typical 9-day novena), this beautiful, short daily prayer is traditionally prayed 15 times a day during Advent, starting on the Feast of St. Andrew on November 30. But for most busy families, praying it together once a day is a win. The words of the prayer are a reminder of the humble and historical event of the incarnation. Try saying the prayer after lighting the Advent wreath or as part of your prayers before dinner.

Straw for Baby Jesus

This tradition is when you put out a "manger" (a small cardboard box will do) and a bowl of "straw" in a common area (such as the kitchen table), and the idea is to create a full bed of straw for baby Jesus by Christmas Eve by adding a piece of straw when a good deed or small sacrifice is done for Jesus. Everyone can participate, even parents! On Christmas Eve, you lay baby Jesus (or a doll to symbolize) on the (hopefully) full bed of straw and sing "Away in a Manger" or "Silent Night."

Blessings for the Advent Wreath, Nativity set and Christmas Tree

You can find blessings for the Advent Wreath, Nativity set and Christmas Tree in many Catholic prayer books or online (such as archseattle.org/advent). Taking a moment to pause and pray a blessing is a great way to reflect on the meaning of these traditions. These blessings invite us to enjoy them with intention and gratitude.

Jesse Tree

This tradition traces salvation history from the Old Testament through the birth of Christ. Much like the Advent calendar but more involved with longer daily readings and song, it's a daily activity rich with symbolism and a great way for all ages to participate.

Decorating in stages

Instead of putting up all the Christmas decorations the morning after Thanksgiving, consider putting them up in stages to emphasize the season of waiting for the light of Christ. This will help put more focus on your Advent traditions. One idea is to wait to light and decorate the Christmas tree until Guadete (Rejoice) Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent. Remember, the Christmas season starts on Christmas and lasts all the way through January 9.

"O" Antiphons

The "O" Antiphons are beautiful, short chants used at vespers (evening prayers) for the last seven days of Advent from December 18-24, each starting with "O" and each highlighting a title for the Messiah (O Wisdom, O Lord,...), which increases the anticipation of Christ's coming. You can add these to your evening prayers around the Advent wreath or in front of the Nativity set.

In prayer, the prophet Isaiah grieves over our sins that separates us from God. What sorrow or distress have you experienced over the past week?



Gospel: "Watch, therefore; you do not know when the lord of the house is coming." (Mk 13:35)


