A Word from Father Thompson

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is not the only liturgical prayer that the church has each day. Throughout the day, the Church prays the Liturgy of the Hours (AKA the Divine Office or Breviary), which punctuate the day with up to 7 times of prayer (I say 5 of them, although in practicality it is really 3 times of prayer as I combine some of them together, as one may do), each consisting of a series of Psalms and canticles that are drawn from the same scriptural sources as the Responsorial at Mass (i.e. hymns/poems in the Bible), short readings, and petitions to God on behalf of and for the Church. The Psalms and canticles, which make up the bulk of the Office, are so chock full of beauty and the full range of human emotion, they are very touching and beautiful.

Clergy and religious are required to pray the Office daily, but the Second Vatican Council earnestly recommended this prayer to each and every Christian. I know that when I have mentioned this in the past, those who did try the Liturgy of the Hours—at least to some degree or at least every once in a while—have enjoyed it. For myself, I started saying Morning and Evening prayer during the Lent of my senior year of high school, and haven't stopped since, adding on the Office of Readings—a slightly longer prayer that can be said any time of day and which includes biblical readings closer to the length to those at Mass as well as writings of saints. I also added Mid-day Prayer and Night Prayer over the course of the years (again, now, as a priest, I must say five of the seven "hours" every day: Office of Readings/Matins, Morning prayer/Lauds, Midday Prayer, Evening Prayer/Vespers, and Night Prayer/Compline). Despite the name, the prayers take nowhere near an hour. Matins, Lauds, and Vespers take five to ten minutes each at most, and Midday and Compline take five minutes or less. They are called "hours" in reference to how they divide the day, not due to length; They help sanctify time and keep God close, as well as inscribing in our memories what are among the most beautiful parts of Scripture: the Psalms and Canticles.

I very much recommend the Liturgy of the Hours to you and your families if you want to grow in your relationship with God this coming liturgical year, as well as embrace the spirit of priestly prayer I mentioned previously. The Hours are Liturgy, the official and public prayer of the Church, even when said on your couch or in your car.

Now, I will admit that he book form of the Hours is pretty bulky, and while there are abbreviated versions which forgo some content (usually the feasts of saints, Matins, Midday, Compline), it is also quite easy just to get a phone or tablet app (which is what I usually use) that give you everything conveniently (iBreviary and DivineOffice.org are two very good ones). Personally, I recommend DivineOffice.org (either the website or their app), as the prayers are available as audio recordings alongside the text (an aid to learning if you are new at it, and/or convenience if you pray while you commute, work, exercise, etc.). I (and the fathers of Vatican II) cannot recommend the Hours enough.



Second Sunday of Advent -Peace-



Here's what your fellow Catholics wrote online during the public consultation phase:


- Hope that the younger people will be motivated to serve the church and answer the call to the priesthood/religious life.

Thank you to everyone who provided input and feedback on the parish families during the recent public consultation phase of Partners in the Gospel.

More than 800 people provided comments online, while nearly 140 parishes and missions hosted in-person sessions in several languages including English, Spanish, Vietnamese and Q'anjob'al, a Mayan language indigenous to Guatemala. In total, the Archdiocese of Seattle received more than 700 input session reports resulting in more than 3,000 pages of input.

Overall, the sessions were fruitful. Staff, lay leaders and parishioners listened to the Holy Spirit and provided their input on their proposed parish families.

Over the past few weeks, all collected input - by notetakers during the in-person sessions and from the online feedback form - was sorted by parish family. Each set of parish family data was read by two people who wrote a synthesis including any proposed changes, concerns and hopes for the new parish family.

This synthesized reports, along with the raw input data, were used by the Oversight Committee, the Presbyteral Council and the Partners in the Gospel team to inform the next draft of proposed parish families. Specifically, of the 61 proposed parish families, 25 were recommended for changes based on this recent consultation.

Public Input Phase results in changes to 25 draft parish families

There will be a second round of consultation with staff and parishioners with these 25 proposed parish families before a final recommendation is submitted to Archbishop Etienne at the end of the year. The final parish families are expected to be announced in early 2024.



2023 CCS/CHS SOUTHWEST PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- The Family Housing Network partnered with the City of Tacoma to create 20 Safe Parking spaces on the former Holy Rosary campus. Guests who live in their vehicles are invited to use the hygiene facilities, laundry, and 24/7 case management on the pathway to stability and permanent housing. Area parishes provide meals and other support.
- In Olympia, a partnership with Providence St. Peter Hospital allows CCS to convert two **Drexel House** shelter beds to medical respite care for medically fragile elderly and disabled guests.
- CCSWW received \$2.7 million from **USDA's Farm Worker Relief Program** through **Catholic Charities USA**, one of 14 nonprofit organizations and one tribal entity selected nationwide to provide direct grants to help agricultural households impacted by COVID-19, including residents at CHS housing in Lewis, Clark, and Cowlitz Counties.
- Network Builder Isabel Cisneros Rueda, a member of the Archdiocesan Mental Health Committee, was the first to receive and subsequently provide "safeTALK" suicide prevention training in Spanish to the Latino community in our region.
- CCS SW now provides **Housing and Essential Needs** (HEN), a housing stability program funded by the state, in Thurston County under the seasoned leadership of the HEN team in Kitsap County.
- In its first year of operation, **Bertha's I and Bertha's II**, 88 new shelter units serving veterans and older people experiencing homelessness in Vancouver, helped more than 80 residents move on to permanent housing.
- **Supportive Services for Veteran Families** (SSVF) program has helped over 400 veterans and veteran families at risk for homelessness find housing stability through **Rapid Rehousing** and other CCS homelessness prevention programs in Cowlitz, Grays Harbor, Kitsap, Lewis, Mason, Pacific, Pierce, Thurston, and Wahkiakum counties.

COMMUNITIES OF CONCERN

CCS/CHS actively participates in the **Communities of Concern Commission**, a statewide coalition of Black, Indigenous, and Communities of Color in urban and rural areas disproportionally affected by poverty.

FAMILY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

CCS FBH is a recognized leader and pioneer among state behavioral agencies. This year, FBH hosted child welfare experts and agency leaders from Japan seeking to learn how to better address and prevent child abuse and neglect using programs like our **Wraparound with Intensive Services (WISe)**. 95% of the thousands of children and youth we served last year with intensive mental health treatment, integrated pediatric outpatient services, crisis response, and de-escalation remained safely with their families.

IMMIGRATION

Catholic Charities USA awarded CCSWW two grants in 2023 to provide asylum-seekers in our region with help and support. A \$25,000 grant provided direct financial assistance to clients of CCS' Catholic Immigration Legal Services (CILS). CCSWW divided the second grant of \$350,000 between CILS and 41 parishes providing emergency services and supplies to refugees in their communities.

LONG TERM CARE (LTC)


CCS Long Term Care (LTC). Last year, we served 4,600 homebound elders and others with disabilities, helping to keep people in their homes in all 19 counties of western Washington. This year, thanks in part to CCS LTC advocacy, more low-income clients are benefiting from "the most significant anti-poverty change in Long Term Care in many years:" the increase of their personal needs allowance from 100% to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).


NETWORK BUILDERS

Every year, **CCS Network Builders** work regionally to support service ministries in our deaneries and parishes, connecting the faithful to the people we serve. This year, CCS Network Builders are finding ways to support parish service ministries as they discern the path ahead through the Partners in the Gospel process.

PREPARES (PREGNANCY AND PARENTING SUPPORT)

One hundred four parish partners have joined the CCSWW **Pregnancy and Parenting Support Program**, offering vulnerable families the promise of support and assistance from pregnancy to their child's fifth birthday, including food, clothing, diapers, parenting classes, and referrals to social services. This year, parish volunteers offered special events including community baby showers for high school Teen Parent programs, and participation in Welcome Circle Family Days for refugees.

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Why do we believe in Jesus and the Catholic Church? Why should we continue to do so? We've never seen him face-to-face (at least not most of us, I assume). Most of us have never had mystical visions of angels or saints. We live in the same world as our atheist and secularists friends. Why do we believe in Christ if we've never seen him?

The simple, symbolic answer the Gospel presents to us this week might surprise us: we believe because of John the Baptist. Early in John's Gospel we hear: "There was a man sent from God, his name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him." The Baptist powerfully announces Jesus. This is a historical fact, and it is also now a pattern at work in our lives.

John the Baptist stands for the entirety of the old covenant, everything entrusted to the Jewish people. And yet he prophetically opens the door to something entirely new in Jesus, to the revival and fulfillment of God's promises. In every generation, and in every human life, God continues to do this. He has done it through people named Augustine, Francis, Catherine, Theresa, and countless others. In my life, the Baptist's spirit has come through persons named Eric, Paul, Mary, and Ron. I challenge you to name at least three people through whom God has announced the coming of Jesus in your life. Consciously thank God for their testimony. And let's commit ourselves to listening to the spirit of John the Baptist testify again this week so that we might more strongly believe in the light.

Testimony

When my grandmother heard the news that my cousin had fallen from a second-story window, she immediately went and washed her hair.

Grandma had been sitting alone in her house, listening to the morning radio when the announcer shared a news bulletin stating that the previous night, a little boy with the same name as her grandson, living in the same community and of the same age, had fallen onto the pavement from a window on the second floor of his house. He had been rushed to the hospital but miraculously survived his injuries.

She thought she was hallucinating and wanted to look pretty when the "men in white coats" came to take her away. Thus, the hair-washing.

As it happens, the whole story was true — it was her grandson, but this was before the age of mobile phones and had happened so late at night that his parents had been unable to notify any family members before the whole thing showed up on the news.

It wasn't until my grandmother received a phone call from another relative corroborating the story that she realized it hadn't been a figment of her imagination. What a waste of styled hair, no hospital committal for her that day.

There are certain truths that we cannot accept unless they are supported by the testimony of others. We find them to be unbelievable without the reassurance of another person whispering, "It's okay. I see it, too."

This is the value of testimony, and the purpose of John the Baptist and every saint who ever died with the name of Jesus Christ on their lips. And this is the sacred duty of all the baptized, to give testimony with our words and our actions.

Why do we do that?

Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do Catholics give the sign of peace to one another at Mass?

Answer:

The sign of peace is a part of the Mass that takes place immediately after we offer the Lord's Prayer. Inspired by the Jesus' words to his first followers, we stand together in a spirit of communion to pray as Jesus taught us: "Our Father who art in heaven..." In this prayer, we call for the coming of God's kingdom in all its fullness and ask that God provides for our needs — "Give us, this day, our daily bread" — to forgive our sins and to bring us to the joy of heaven.

It is almost natural, then, that the rite of peace would follow. As the celebrant prays that Christ's peace will fill our hearts, our communities, the Church, and the whole world, we extend to those around us a sign of peace (usually a hug or a handshake) as a symbol of the communion that we experience now and will experience forever in the fullness of the reign of God.

We are also reminded of Jesus' teachings that if we are at prayer and remember that a brother or sister is holding something against us, then we are to go and seek reconciliation with them before we continue our prayer (see Matthew 5:23). And so, the sign of peace also reminds us of the need to truly be in communion — united in love and peace — with God and one another before we approach the altar to receive the Eucharist.

So, the next time you're at Mass and the time comes for the sign of peace, remember that this is a moment to celebrate the gift of Christ's peace that each of us has received from God and to pass that peace along to those around us. We need this moment to practice, because this is also the same peace of Christ that we are instructed to carry out into the world at the end of Mass when the priest or deacon says to us, "Go, in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life."

Paul encourages the Thessalonians to be people of prayer and joy, open to the work of the Holy Spirt in their lives. Is there anything recently that has brought you joy?


Gospel Reading


Sharing the Gospel
