

#### A Word from Father Thompson

Nothing too lofty or (directly) theological this week, but as Christmas approaches I thought I might share something regarding finding a happy and refreshing way of approaching family celebrations of Christmas. When I was a small child, my grandparents had an expectation that their adult children would maintain the Christmas traditions of their youth, an all-night affair requiring the bulk of Christmas Eve though to Christmas morning: Gifts, pepper salad, Midnight Mass, Ravioli feast (my mother's side of the family is of Italian extraction), etc. Then, of course, there were expectations on my Dad's side of the family on Christmas Day... While it was good to spend time with family and enjoying traditions, it left my parents exhausted in a lot of ways. Plus, it meant bundling and transporting kids all around the county to fulfill all those expectations.

At some point, life got in the way and the Christmas Eve routine stopped happening. In retrospect, my mother recognized it was for the best, and we began to keep a similar tradition, but just among my immediate family in our own home. We kept doing that the rest of the time I was growing up.

When my siblings began to marry and started having their children (and I began working on Christmas), my mother decided that while our traditional Italian Ravioli feast and gift exchange was precious, she did not want Christmas to be a stressor for my siblings as it had been for her and her sisters. So, what my family has done for the past several years has been to gather all the siblings and niblings at my parents' house and keep our old family traditions, but a little early, after Sunday Mass on one of the Sundays of Advent. My siblings and their kids are then free to develop and to keep their own traditions in their own families on Christmas itself without feeling like they have to truck the kids around on the day itself to see various grandparents, aunts, and uncles when the kids just want to enjoy their gifts and the parents want to rejoice in their children.

Come to think of it, I think this approach to celebrating Christmas across generations is pretty theologically profound. My parents, in their backing off to leave Christmas free for my siblings and their children reflects that my parents really understand the nature of Matrimony. The very purpose of Matrimony is the creation of a new and autonomous family. Of course, the spouses still are and will always be connected to their family of origin, but the family they have created by the Sacrament of Matrimony deserves priority over even the parent-child bond (...this is why a man leaves his father and mother and clings to his wife...). My mom trying to strike this balance between bringing the extended family together (10 siblings, plus their spouses, plus about a dozen niblings and counting) and allowing each nuclear family to have their own lives was a very wise idea, and very much embodies the Christian theology of Matrimony.

#### Third Sunday of Advent -Joy-Gaudete

Then finally, the other day, it hit me! Advent is a time of joyful expectation- the expectation of a baby! We are nesting for baby Jesus during Advent. So I started thinking about all of the ways that I nest when I'm expecting a baby, and I realized that a lot of them had very similar counterparts that happen during Advent. Here is how: Share this with your children and have them join in the planning.

- Announce the pregnancy to your family / send out Christmas cards
- Go shopping for baby stuff / shop for presents (have the children draw names and they can buy a present for the person who's name they've drawn).
- Family and friends throw baby shower to celebrate baby coming / throw Christmas parties
- Paint and decorate the nursery / tree, lights, other Christmas decorations
- Read books about babies / read Christmas books
- Clean the house for sanitation / clean the house for guests
- Make a baby registry for gifts / make a Christmas Wishlist
- Stocked up on frozen meals / bake ahead of time for Christmas
- Play music on tummy for baby / listen to Christmas music

Keep in mind, all of the baby gifts, extra food, etc., don't actually get *used* until after the baby is born, but they're all set up and ready to go well before the due date.


RCIA classes have been paused for the Christmas Season.

#### **All about Antiphons on Gaudete Sunday**

**Antiphons** are short chants in Christian ritual, sung as a refrain. They are used during Mass: sung at the Entrance (or *Introit*), during the Offertory, and during distribution of Holy Communion. The traditional name given for the Third Sunday of Advent, *Gaudete Sunday*, is from the Entrance Antiphon: *Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete*. This translates to *Rejoice in the Lord always, again I say rejoice*. Did you know these are always printed here in our bulletin and are found in the *Lumen Christi* missals in the pews? In addition to this antiphon, we can also celebrate Advent by becoming familiar with the *Alma Redemptoris Mater* and the "O" Antiphons.



The Alma Redemptoris Mater is the Marian Antiphon sung during the Advent and Christmas Season, which is from first vespers of the First Sunday of Advent until the Feast of the

First Sunday of Advent until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2.

The lyrics in English are as follows:

Loving Mother of the Redeemer, Gate of Heaven, Star of the Sea, Assist your people who have fallen, yet strive to rise again. To the wonderment of nature you bore your creator yet remained a virgin after as before. You who received Gabriel's joyful greeting, have pity on us poor sinners.

Make this a part of your family prayer by reciting or singing it as part of your prayers before bedtime.

The "O" Antiphons accompany the Magnificat canticle of Vespers (Evening Prayer) from December 17-23. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present hopes as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah. These antiphons form the basis of the verses of the Advent hymn O Come O Come Emmanuel.

**Dec. 17 - O Sapientia:** O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.

**Dec. 18** *O Adonai:* O sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

**Dec. 19** *O Radix Jesse:* O Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

**Dec. 20** *O Clavis David:* O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel, controlling at your will the gate of heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.


**Dec. 21 - O Oriens:** O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.


**Dec. 22 - O Rex Gentium:** O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust.



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# **Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

Why do we believe in Jesus and the Catholic Church? Why should we continue to do so? We've never seen him face-to-face (at least not most of us, I assume). Most of us have never had mystical visions of angels or saints. We live in the same world as our atheist and secularists friends. Why do we believe in Christ if we've never seen him?

The simple, symbolic answer the Gospel presents to us this week might surprise us: we believe because of John the Baptist. Early in John's Gospel we hear: "There was a man sent from God, his name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him." The Baptist powerfully announces Jesus. This is a historical fact, and it is also now a pattern at work in our lives.

John the Baptist stands for the entirety of the old covenant, everything entrusted to the Jewish people. And yet he prophetically opens the door to something entirely new in Jesus, to the revival and fulfillment of God's promises. In every generation, and in every human life, God continues to do this. He has done it through people named Augustine, Francis, Catherine, Theresa, and countless others. In my life, the Baptist's spirit has come through persons named Eric, Paul, Mary, and Ron. I challenge you to name at least three people through whom God has announced the coming of Jesus in your life. Consciously thank God for their testimony. And let's commit ourselves to listening to the spirit of John the Baptist testify again this week so that we might more strongly believe in the light.

#### **Testimony**

When my grandmother heard the news that my cousin had fallen from a second-story window, she immediately went and washed her hair.

Grandma had been sitting alone in her house, listening to the morning radio when the announcer shared a news bulletin stating that the previous night, a little boy with the same name as her grandson, living in the same community and of the same age, had fallen onto the pavement from a window on the second floor of his house. He had been rushed to the hospital but miraculously survived his injuries.

She thought she was hallucinating and wanted to look pretty when the "men in white coats" came to take her away. Thus, the hair-washing.

As it happens, the whole story was true — it was her grandson, but this was before the age of mobile phones and had happened so late at night that his parents had been unable to notify any family members before the whole thing showed up on the news.

It wasn't until my grandmother received a phone call from another relative corroborating the story that she realized it hadn't been a figment of her imagination. What a waste of styled hair, no hospital committal for her that day.

There are certain truths that we cannot accept unless they are supported by the testimony of others. We find them to be unbelievable without the reassurance of another person whispering, "It's okay. I see it, too."

This is the value of testimony, and the purpose of John the Baptist and every saint who ever died with the name of Jesus Christ on their lips. And this is the sacred duty of all the baptized, to give testimony with our words and our actions.

#### Why do we do that?

Catholic Life Explained

#### **Question:**

Why do Catholics give the sign of peace to one another at Mass?

#### **Answer:**

The sign of peace is a part of the Mass that takes place immediately after we offer the Lord's Prayer. Inspired by the Jesus' words to his first followers, we stand together in a spirit of communion to pray as Jesus taught us: "Our Father who art in heaven..." In this prayer, we call for the coming of God's kingdom in all its fullness and ask that God provides for our needs — "Give us, this day, our daily bread" — to forgive our sins and to bring us to the joy of heaven.

It is almost natural, then, that the rite of peace would follow. As the celebrant prays that Christ's peace will fill our hearts, our communities, the Church, and the whole world, we extend to those around us a sign of peace (usually a hug or a handshake) as a symbol of the communion that we experience now and will experience forever in the fullness of the reign of God.

We are also reminded of Jesus' teachings that if we are at prayer and remember that a brother or sister is holding something against us, then we are to go and seek reconciliation with them before we continue our prayer (see Matthew 5:23). And so, the sign of peace also reminds us of the need to truly be in communion — united in love and peace — with God and one another before we approach the altar to receive the Eucharist.

So, the next time you're at Mass and the time comes for the sign of peace, remember that this is a moment to celebrate the gift of Christ's peace that each of us has received from God and to pass that peace along to those around us. We need this moment to practice, because this is also the same peace of Christ that we are instructed to carry out into the world at the end of Mass when the priest or deacon says to us, "Go, in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life."

Paul encourages the Thessalonians to be people of prayer and joy, open to the work of the Holy Spirt in their lives. Is there anything recently that has brought you joy?


#### **Gospel Reading**

Ask a friend if he or she is ready to meet Jesus.


## **Sharing the Gospel**
