

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A Word from Father Thompson

One of the small but fascinating details about the accounts of Jesus's Resurrection is the state of the burial cloths found in the empty tomb. They are rolled and folded, but not just that, the cloth that covered his face was folded up and placed elsewhere. This may seem like an inconsequential detail, but there is not one syllable in sacred scripture, much less the Gospels, which is superfluous. Other than these small details in the Gospels demonstrating they were drawn from accounts of real people with memories of what they saw and experienced, rather than some mythological account or invented story, I think the orderliness of the empty tomb suggests something profound. God did it for a reason.

The neatly rolled up burial cloths, and the head-wrap folded up and set in a separate place remind me a bit of the account of Creation in Genesis. The ancient pagans believed the world was created in the midst of struggle and conflict between cosmic forces. The nearby Mesopotamians believed the world was made from the broken corpse of a great dragon, slain by the all-seeing god -king Marduk; In contrast, the Jews believed that God spoke the world into being from nothing. Creation comes to be completely in accord with the will of God, without struggle and without resistance and with no more effort than God willing it to be so. Genesis presents God as being in complete control of the situation.

So too the shroud and head-wrap in the empty tomb. Thieves trying to perpetuate a hoax by stealing Christ's body would have just torn off the burial bands and ran off with the body before anyone (the Roman guards in particular) noticed or intervened.

However most profoundly: Had God accomplished the Resurrection in some violent and chaotic event, there would have been more of a mess, true, but such a raw display of divine power might have given the impression that death still had some power that had to be overthrown. No. Instead, Jesus Christ, victor over death, took up his life again without struggle or resistance and raised himself in glory as easily as one wakes from sleep. He even took the time to fold up the covers, if only to demonstrate how in control of the situation he was.

Sometimes, it is some of the simplest and easilyoverlooked details that can express the most profound things.

Gospel Meditation

Father John Muir, LPi

The famous "Road to Emmaus" story recounts, on that first Sunday of the Resurrection, the basic two-fold structure of the Mass: Word, followed by Eucharist. Jesus spends a significant period of time with two dismayed disciples, as he connects a wide swath of the Hebrew scriptures with his own suffering, death, and resurrection. They would later report that this Liturgy of the Word touched their hearts with an inexplicable fire. This Word-induced flame alone is what leads the two disciples to discover Jesus' presence in the "breaking of the bread."

With this in mind, how can we possibly think that the Liturgy of the Word is unnecessary or incidental? The two disciples needed the Scriptures explained to them in order to experience Jesus alive in the eucharistic breaking of bread. Sure, we say, but they had the Risen Jesus. But that's precisely the point: Jesus is risen and accompanies us in both parts of the Mass. Imagine how much our experience of Jesus in the Eucharist would deepen if we (preachers and listeners) took even more seriously that Jesus himself sets our hearts ablaze with his Word so that we know him in the Eucharist. That Wordinduced fire counts, too!


Saint of the Week


St. Bernadette Soubirous (Feast day April 16)

At the age of 14 St. Bernadette (1844-1879) was living in abject poverty with her family in a one-room basement which had previously been used as a jail, in the town of Lourdes in southern France. She was a sickly child, having fallen victim to Cholera in 1854 and would battle asthma and tuberculosis for the rest of her short life. Bernadette was illiterate and is characterized in many accounts as slow or ignorant. It was in her 14th year that Bernadette was granted 18 visions of a 'Lady' at a grotto in Massabielle. The Lady instructed Bernadette to come daily to the grotto to receive the visions, eventually proclaiming 'I am the Immaculate Conception'. A spring at the grotto, which appeared where Bernadette was instructed to dig, has been a site of miraculous healing. The Lady also asked that a chapel be built in the grotto for pilgrims. Today the Marian shrine at Lourdes is one of the world's most popular.

During and following the period of visions, the saint was examined rigorously by Church and local authorities. The popular excitement around the visions left her subject to persistent questioning and attention. Eventually she sought protection by retiring to a home for the poor in a nunnery. She took her vows







in 1866 with the Sisters of Charity at Nevers. She worked as an infirmary assistant, and later a sacristan, but by the end of her life she was too sick to participate in convent life. She died at the age of 35, humble and penitent until the end.

The Precepts of the Church, continued

Third Precept - "You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season." While you must attend Mass every Sunday and on holy days of obligation, you are not required to receive the Eucharist. The Church places as a minimum that the faithful receive Our Lord's Body and Blood (while in a state of grace) during the Easter season, which the Catechism calls "the origin and center of the Christian liturgy" (CCC 2042).

This reception of the Eucharist can take place within or outside of Mass. For Catholics in the United States, the period for satisfying this precept has been extended beyond what, liturgically speaking, is the Easter season, to run from the First Sunday of Lent to Trinity Sunday (after Pentecost). By canon law, though, any just cause allows the precept to be fulfilled at any time of the year (1983 CIC 920).




