

A Word from Father Thompson

I think we sometimes get a little confused with regard to the nature of morality, especially when we as Christians hold to certain tenets of morality that many of our contemporaries have unfortunately abandoned (or perhaps never



recognized in the first place). While there do exist some obligations that particularly bind us as Christians: the Sunday obligation to participate in Mass, marrying in a sacramental manner, bringing our children to the Sacraments in a timely manner, keeping the days of fast and abstinence, and so forth. Violating those would be immoral for us, but not those outside of our faith per se. However, the vast majority of moral issues are not based on the fact that we are Christians, but because we are human. That is to say, a stance that "I can't do X because I'm Catholic, but 'you do you..." or "I am personally opposed, but publicly, who am I to impose my values?" is complete nonsense.

Most of the moral issues in our world apply to every single human being as much as they do to us as Christians. For example, the Commandment "you shall not kill" means things like abortion, active euthanasia, or assisted suicide are immoral and to be rejected by all people, not just Christians and Jews. One might not be culpable of sin if he is ignorant of the immorality of an action, but his ignorance does not mean the immoral choice itself is not objectively evil and to be rejected by anyone of good will. Now, what we may do about it (Vocally object? Physically prevent? Simply not participate? Tolerate but disapprove? Attempt to convince? Etc.) may depend on the harm done, the situation, and our relationship to the person unwittingly or unknowingly doing evil, but the moral state of the other person's act is an objective fact (at least for acts that are in themselves wrong. Cases where intention or circumstance change the calculus are still ultimately objective, albeit also more complicated, to judge). If something is morally wrong, it is so in the same way that 2 + 2 = 4 or the laws of physics: as an inherent feature of the universe or even reason itself.

Of course, in all this we should resist the temptation to judge or to feel superior because we are "in the know," nor should we forget that ideas and acts may be wrong, but it does not make the person who does wrong less worthy of love. Yet, as Christians, we cannot approve of immoral actions by those who do not know or do not believe. Rather, as Christians we are bound to proclaim joyfully that mercy and conversion are always available. The goodness that all human beings are called to cannot be met except by God's grace. Our standing absolutely firm in the truth is an act of love for our fellow men.

The Good Shepherd and the Wolf

I remember very clearly the first movie I watched during my pregnancy with my eldest child. In this film, there is a scene where a young boy is kidnapped and shoved into the back of a van guarded by vicious dogs. His mother persists in trying to free him, even as the dogs snap at her. Their bared teeth and full-throated snarls don't slow her efforts in the slightest.

It wasn't a great movie or even a particularly great scene, but I'll never forget this scene. I'll never forget those dogs.

I had just learned that I was a mother a few days ago. The life growing deep within seemed to me as frail as a whispered secret, but I loved it powerfully. I worried constantly if the baby was safe and healthy. I agonized over signs — real or imagined — that could tell me if the poppyseed-sized child was thriving or failing.

I understood, for the first time in my life, why a woman would charge a pack of attack dogs without hesitation — not because she should, but because she has to.

She could choose not to fight, certainly. She could walk away. But why would she? A future without her son is so much more painful than any physical wound. She may fear for her life, but she fears a life without her child so much more. The Good Shepherd discourse reveals to us the motivation behind God's actions throughout all of salvation history. From Adam to Noah to Abraham, all the way down to the time of the Messiah and beyond, He keeps trying to get us back. He keeps braving the attack dogs, time after time. He never stops. He never grows weary. And it baffles us: what's in it for Him? we wonder, because we are quicker to give up on ourselves than He is. Why does He keep trying?

He could choose not to fight, sure. But why would He? He doesn't want a future without us.

"I will lay down my life for the sheep." — John 10:11



Saint of the Week

St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen (Feast day April 24)

Fidlelis was born at Sigmaringen in 1577, of noble parents. In his youth he frequently approached the sacraments, visited the sick and the poor, and spent moreover many hours before the altar. For a time he followed the legal profession, and was remarkable for his advocacy of the poor and his respectful language towards his opponents. Finding it difficult to become both a rich lawyer and a good Christian, Fidelis entered the Capuchin. Order, and embraced a life of austerity and prayer. Hair shirts, iron-pointed girdles, and disciplines were penances too light for his fervor; and being filled with a desire of martyrdom, he rejoiced at being sent to Switzerland by the newlyfounded Congregation of Propaganda, and braved every peril to





rescue souls from the diabolical heresy of Calvin. When preaching at Sevis he was fired at by a Calvinist, but the fear of death could not deter him from proclaiming divine truth. After his sermon he was waylaid by a body of Protestants headed by a minister, who attacked him and tried to force him to embrace their socalled. reform. But he said, "I came to refute your errors, not to embrace them; I will never renounce Catholic doctrine, which is the truth of all ages, and I fear not death." On this they fell upon him with their poignards, and the first martyr of Propaganda went to receive his palm.

Reflection.—We delight in decorating the altars of God with flowers, lights, and jewels, and it is right to do so; but if we wish to offer to God gifts of higher value, let us, in imitation of St. Fidelis, save the souls who but for us would be lost; for so we shall offer Him, as it were, the jewels of paradise.

The Precepts of the Church, continued

Fourth Precept – "The fourth precept of the Church is "You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church." Fasting and abstinence, along with prayer and almsgiving, are powerful tools in developing our spiritual life. Today, the Church requires Catholics to fast only on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and to abstain from meat on the Fridays during Lent. On all other Fridays of the year, we may perform some other penance in place of abstinence. (CCC2043)


The Church's laws of fast and abstinence have probably never been lighter. Most Fridays throughout the year and the season of Lent are penitential times (1983 CIC 1250), but since shortly after the Second Vatican Council, the external discipline of abstaining from meat on Fridays has been abrogated in favor of the recommendation to perform some other self-imposed penance (1983 CIC 1253). Only on Fridays in Lent are Catholics, aged 14 and older, bound to abstain from meat. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, moreover, Catholics aged 18 to 59 inclusive, are also bound to fast, by which discipline, however, they may still take one full meal during that day, and two smaller meals (1983 CIC 1252).

FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

553 Jesus entrusted a specific authority to Peter: "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." The "power of the keys" designates authority to govern the house of God, which is the Church. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, confirmed this mandate after his Resurrection: "Feed my sheep." The power to "bind and loose" connotes the authority to absolve sins, to pronounce doctrinal judgments, and to make disciplinary decisions in the Church. Jesus entrusted this authority to the Church through the ministry of the apostles and in particular through the ministry of Peter, the only one to whom he specifically entrusted the keys of the kingdom.


Novena Prayer to Our Lady of Guadalupe


