

WELCOME TO SAINT COLUMBAN

We proclaim the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.



A Word from Father Thompson

One of the most distinctive positions of the Catholic Church in our age is our refusal not only of obvious atrocities against life that cry to heaven like abortion, but also of the "merely" grave and mortal sin of contraception. So much of the world has folded to pressure on this issue, even Christian groups. Even despite the pressures put on the Church from within and without, the Catholic Church has consistently continued to proclaim that separating the unitive and procreative aspects of marital sexual activity is objectively and gravely immoral, and—If done willingly and knowingly—a mortal sin. This truth is drawn from considering the natural law and the very purpose of human sexuality and God's design for marriage; The immorality of artificial contraception (or, in reverse, sexual activity devoid of spousal and unitive love) is unchanging and unchangeable, it is immoral always and everywhere for all human beings, not merely a "Catholic thing." However, many think of it as a merely religious rule; even some Catholics who abide by this teaching perhaps do so with the preconceptions and language of the world regarding this issue. E.g. that contraception is a good solution, the only problem is that "the Church stubbornly says

Needless to say, a new child in the family will always radically change how life is lived. The fear this can cause and the siren call of contraception "solution" are not new to humanity. Every generation has wrestled with this temptation in its own way, but the convenience of modern artificial methods (not to mention their ubiquitousness) makes it a far more profound temptation in our age. That does not change its moral status, however. It remains wrong.

We all know this is an extremely hard thing to live out for a lot of people, even those who want to be faithful to the Christian faith, especially because the world's rationale (although immoral) is so present and so tempting to embrace or even rationalize. However, the effect of embracing the world's attitude is not freedom but rather injecting fear and distrust into an aspect of life that by its nature calls the spouses to extreme personal trust and vulnerability? Letting a cloud of fear hang over spousal love is an unhealthy way to live. Not to mention, morality aside, the practical biological consequences, especially to women using artificial hormones; so too teenage girls: messing with hormone levels in puberty to suppress fertility has numerous long-term effects down the line. Indeed that is one more evil of contraception: it is degrading to women to treat fertility as if it were a disease.

Now, of course, we know that not every sexual encounter will result in a child, and married couples can prudently take advantage of biological signs and symptoms that indicate it is more or less likely at a given moment. However, even for those who are using natural methods of family planning, it is important to make sure it is lived out with a Christian spirit that is open to life, and not merely as "Catholic contraception," as if the dimension of begetting children is an optional extra to spousal intimacy. So many people live these days live have a general expectation that contraception is the default. Perhaps a big way to do this well would be to reject the "have you cake and

eat it too" attitude that underlies the modern approach to contracepted sex, and rather truly embrace the sacrifices practicing NFP entails. Indeed, a professor of mine in seminary—who was a young married man—suggested this very thing to us: The cost of Natural Family Planning is that it requires a lot of mutual communication and work; sacrifices a certain dimension of spontaneity in the relationship; and it is also rather challenging because libidos tend naturally to spike during the most fertile times. He said that perhaps the degree to which spouses are willing to embrace and live the sacrifices required might be a good test of a couple's intentions and how important spacing out or delaying, even indefinitely, the next child.

About the Crowning of Mary in May

The May crowning is an act of popular devotion in honor of our Blessed Mother that is repeated every year. As the name indicates, it is usually done during the month of May, but in some countries, especially in the Southern Hemisphere, it is performed in other months especially in November.

The custom of the May crowning fell out of favor in many places during the 1970s and '80s. Recently it has made a comeback along with Eucharistic adoration, the rosary, and many other traditional Catholic practices that serve to nurture the faith and devotion of the faithful.

There is a lot of flexibility regarding the rite, and it can be adapted to many different circumstances and situations depending on whether the crowning is done in a parish, a school or classroom, or even in the family.

If the statue of Mary to be crowned is not already in a fixed place, an image may be set up on some suitable support.

The area may already be decorated with flowers, but those participating in the crowning may also process to the image carrying flowers and singing appropriate Marian hymns before placing their bouquets at Mary's feet.

The rite may consist of hymns, prayers, and maybe an act of consecration to Our Lady.

The climax of the celebration is the moment when the one of those present places a crown of flowers on Mary's head accompanied by a traditional hymn to the Blessed Mother.

After the crowning, the person leading the event concludes with a suitable prayer. If he is a priest or deacon, he may impart a blessing.



Saint of the Week—St. Damien de Veuster of Moloka'I "Father Damien" (Feast Day May 10)

People may be familiar with leprosy from Biblical times, but not so much in the 1800s. However, St. Damien de Veuster of Moloka'i' (January 3, 1840 – April 15, 1889) would eventually shed a light on the effects of this devastating disease and allow people to see those afflicted with it with more compassion and love.

Born Joseph de Veuster in Tremelo, Belgium, he quit school at 13 so he could work on the family farm. Feeling called for more, however, he entered the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary six years later, where he took the name of a fourth-century physician and martyr. His brother, a priest from the same congregation, fell ill and was unable to go to his assigned location. Damien quickly volunteered in his place and found himself on the Hawaiian Islands in 1864. Two months after arriving, he was ordained a priest of Honolulu and

assigned to the Island of Hawaii.

In 1873, he visited the Hawaiian government's leper colony on the island of Moloka'i, where he petitioned to stay permanently to care for their physical, medical, and spiritual needs. After years of working to improve their location and those who lived there, he contracted Hansen's disease and died of its complications. He found strength to endure isolation and disease in Eucharistic adoration and the celebration of the Mass. St. Damien was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on October 11, 2009. Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question: My neighbor is just beginning to explore the Catholic faith but was raised agnostic. I grew up believing in God, praying, and attending Mass. How does one start from scratch as an adult to develop a relationship with God?

Answer: Start on a personal level! How did you and your neighbor become friends? How did you begin to discuss such a personal topic as faith? Communication, spending time together, and getting to know each other are essential to forming the bonds of a relationship. Personal prayer is essential to our relationship with God. We can't be close to someone we don't know! Invite your friend to explore the stories of Jesus in the Bible. Introduce them to the lives of the saints, especially ones you think they might be interested in.

Your neighbor might also have questions about the Catholic faith that you don't know how to answer. If your friend hasn't yet enrolled in RCIA classes, invite them to Mass at your parish. Introduce your friend to the faith formation director to make a connection. Personal support can be helpful as well, especially if few of your neighbor's current friends are practicing their faith. Connect your neighbor to other people in your parish living their faith well. The good examples of other faithful people could help your neighbor to feel welcomed and supported. Our Church is vibrant and alive!







Holy Mother Church attaches a grave obligation for all Catholics of age to make a confession of all mortal sins (since the last worthy confession) and receive Holy Communion at least once during the Easter season, which lasts until Trinity Sunday.
