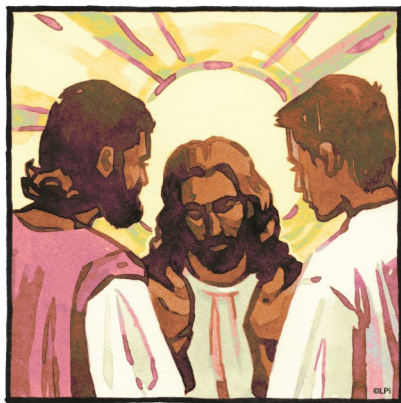

FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

A Word from our Priests

The following column is from Fr. Bryan Ochs, our Pastor.

Last week I introduced myself and promised you that I would write a little bit about some of the challenges we can expect as we begin uniting our parishes into a single parish family. One of the most difficult challenges as we begin is that it is going to take us a little longer than usual to get to know each other.

When I moved to Longview, it took me until October or November before I really felt like I knew the people. The same was true when I moved to St. Edward's. It was a good four months before I felt comfortable with the people, and the people felt comfortable with me, and that was when I saw them every single weekend at Mass.

It is going to take even longer for Fr. Martin and I to get to know you and for you to get to know us, since we won't be at each parish every single weekend. In fact, there might be times when three or four weeks go by without seeing a particular priest.

This is hard on everyone. This is hard on the people, because the people tend to be happier when they know and trust their priests. It is hard on the priest, because we like to feel settled in at our new spots too and be in somewhat of a routine. It is just going to take longer for that to happen. It will take more time than you are used to

develop trust. We just need to be patient and trust that the bond will eventually form.

Another big challenge is communication. Communicating with one parish is hard enough, but communicating with three is even harder. Communication has been made more difficult, in part, because we have so many ways to communicate. Some people receive email. Others get it through Facebook or YouTube, or other social media. Other people read the bulletin. There are so many ways to communicate and using all of these methods takes a lot of time. Sometimes we don't get to all of them, and people feel like they are in the dark.

Communicating with multiple parishes requires a lot of work on the part of our staff, but communicating well also requires more of the people. You can't just wait for information to come your way, because it doesn't always get there. You might need to be a little more proactive in keeping your eyes and ears open for information about our parishes, and what is happening. As time goes on, we will get better at this, but my experience is that this can be an issue.

There will likely be other challenges to address later, but I also want to say that I know God will help us out through this process and there will be a lot of good that comes from it. I'm excited for what God has in store for our local parishes!

Our Lady of Mount Carmel

The origins of this feast reach all the way back to the Old

Testament. In the book of Kings, we read the story of the prophet Elijah. Much of his prayer, fasting, and public ministry occurred from Carmel, a mountain in Israel. Christian hermits -- seeking solitude -- made their homes on the mountain during the first millennium. Over time, the hermits assembled into a community and were given a Rule of Life. They named their church after Mary -- Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Political upheaval forced the Carmelite order out of the Holy Land and into Europe, where they established monasteries for both men and women across the continent. Many great saints and doctors of the Church have come from the Carmelite order, including St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, St. Therese of Lisieux, and St. Edith Stein. Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Pray for us!

Saint of the Week— St. Camillus of Lellis

The early years of Camillus gave no sign of sanctity. At the age of nineteen he took service with his father, an Italian noble, against the Turks, and after four years' hard campaigning found himself, through his violent temper, reckless habits, and inveterate passion for gambling, a discharged soldier, and in such straitened circumstances that he was obliged to work as a laborer on a Capuchin convent which was then building. A few words from a Capuchin friar brought about his conversion, and he resolved to become a religious. Thrice he entered the Capuchin novitiate, but each time an obstinate wound in his leg forced him to leave. He repaired to Rome for medical treatment, and there took St. Philip as his confessor, and entered the hospital of St. Giacomo, of which he became in time the superintendent. The carelessness of the paid chaplains and nurses towards the suffering patients now inspired

him with the thought of founding a congregation to minister to their wants. With this end he was ordained priest, and in 1586 his community of the Servants of the Sick was confirmed by the Pope. Its usefulness was soon felt, not only in hospitals, but in private houses. Summoned at every hour of the day and night, the devotion of Camillus never grew cold. With a woman's tenderness he attended to the needs of his patients. He wept with them, consoled them, and prayed with them. He knew miraculously the state of their souls; and St. Philip saw angels whispering to two Servants of the Sick who were consoling a dying person. One day a sick man said to the Saint, "Father, may I beg you to make up my bed? it is very hard." Camillus replied, "God forgive you, brother! You beg me! Don't you know yet that you are to command me, for I am your servant and slave." "Would to God," he would cry, "that in the hour of my death one sigh or one blessing of these poor creatures might fall upon me!" His prayer was heard. He was granted the same consolations in his last hour which he had so often procured for others. In the year 1614 he died with the full use of his faculties, after two weeks' saintly preparation, as the priest was reciting the words of the ritual, "May Jesus Christ appear to thee with a mild and joyful countenance!"



Reflection.—St. Camillus venerated the sick as living images of Christ, and by ministering to them in this spirit did penance for the sins of his youth, led a life precious in merit, and from a violent and quarrelsome soldier became a gentle and tender Saint.

Q&A

Our Catholic grade school is doing a penance service this Lent. Do young children really need to go to Confession? How much sin can they really have?

Answer:

Ask any mom about her children and see how many would say she has a brood of perfect angels! Parents know that kids do things that are wrong ... and they often know they're doing it! Even toddlers have a sense of right and wrong. The Church recognizes that their minds and consciences are not yet fully developed, however, and typically waits until age seven to offer the sacrament of Confession. Around that age and beyond, most young people, when asked, can easily explain why something is wrong.

Confession for children is an excellent way to help them reflect on their actions and accept responsibility for their behavior. It helps them to grow in their understanding of sin and how it affects others. This helps them to form their consciences and make better choices in the future. Most importantly, they learn the value of forgiveness, both given and received. Rather than singling out what's wrong, Confession offers hope and a new start! Children can grow in understanding God's unconditional love and develop a sense of inner dignity that transcends their failings. Not bad for five minutes and an "Our Father" or two!

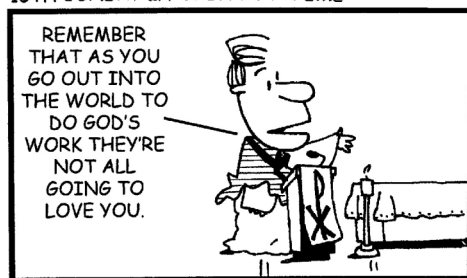

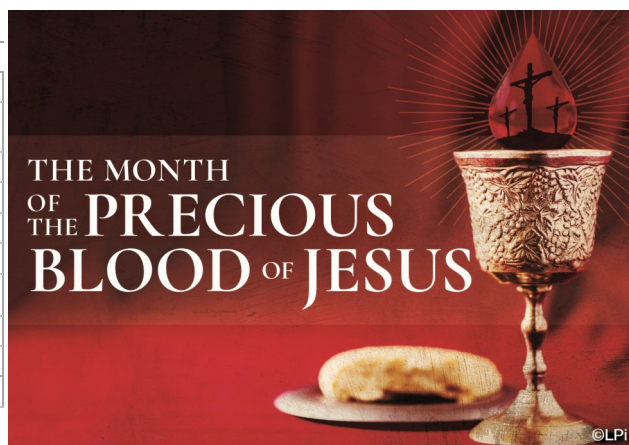

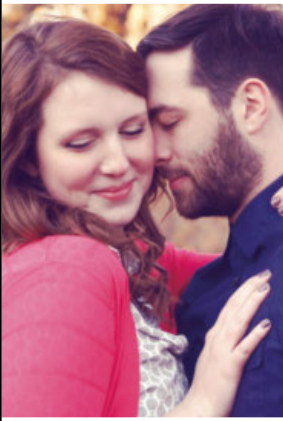
