WELCOME TO SAINT COLUMBAN We proclaim the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Several weeks ago I went with a group of my former parishioners from Longview and Shelton to Tijuana Mexico for a brief Service Trip. There have been a handful of questions, and I thought it appropriate to explain a little bit about the trip, in the event that we are able to go as a family of parishes one day.

We worked with a foundation in Tijuana called Esperanza International. Esperanza is not officially Catholic, nor is it affiliated with any religion or political party, however, the program is flexible enough that we can tailor the experience to our spiritual needs. We attend Mass the days that we are there, and we also set aside some time for prayer and reflection.

While not affiliated with the Church now, Esperanza was begun by some Catholic deacons in San Diego and the underlying philosophies are very consistent with principles mentioned in our Catholic Social teaching, including the principle of subsidiarity.

The principle of subsidiarity acknowledges that society is organized in different sizes of community. The most basic community is the family. The next layer is groups of families living in neighborhoods. The next size up is groups of neighborhoods making up a city, followed by groups of cities making up a state, then a nation, etc. Well, part of our Catholic social teaching reveals to us that problems are best solved at the smallest level of community possible.

This means if a family has an issue, they should work it out as a family. If, however, the solution is beyond their abilities, they should turn to their neighbors for help. If the neighbors cannot find a solution to their challenge, then they should ask for assistance from the city, and so on. Helping small communities maintain as much responsibility for their own lives as possible is part of our teaching. When a higher level of organization needlessly

intervenes in that of a lower level, it can unwittingly extinguish a sense of responsibility and closeness for local communities.


Esperanza seeks to develop the city of Tijuana by building up these most basic layers of community. They seek to help families by building safe and affordable homes, and they do so by helping families in neighborhoods help each other. Esperanza does not give homes away to poor people. Families have to own their own land and they have to pay for all the building materials. The only thing they don't pay for is labor, which consists of local contractors paid for by the foundation and volunteer groups from the USA. Families also participate in every stage of the construction of the home. The volunteers help with what they aren't able to do on their own.

Before Esperanza builds a home for a family, the families must help their neighbors in their projects for at least a year. This sometimes means that they are doing the construction, but it is also common that the family will provide a meal for the American volunteers who help with the construction. This brings the neighbors together to share their resources and assist each other.

Esperanza knows from experience that this is important. The families who build through Esperanza are investing in their own communities. When charities go in and build free homes, the family will often just sell it and relocate. Esperanza wants to help people form bonds with their community, because this is what is needed to develop the city and the country.

The work is very hard, but I love it. Its not all I love though. Yes, the food we have is amazing, but I also like the opportunity to spend a little extra time with parishioners. I hope if we have an opportunity to organize a trip through our parish family you'll support our efforts!


Saint of the Week St. Gregory the Great, Pope (Sep. 3)

Saint Gregory the Great lived in a most turbulent time. There were devastating episodes of plague, the sacking of Rome and the breakdown of strong Roman rule, invasions by Lombards and Franks, floods, and a widening gap between imperial

Byzantium and the Roman Church.

Born around 540 into a noble Roman family, Saint Gregory was probably trained in law, and started his public service as a Prefect of Rome. However, upon the death of his father, he converted his family home to monastery, where he resided as a monk. He built six more monasteries in Sicily and one in Rome.

Often called the father of the medieval papacy and Apostle of the English, Saint Gregory was named Pope by acclamation in 590. Although he was reluctant to assume this post, preferring the cloistered life, his accomplishments were many. He was an extremely capable manager of Church estates and tenants and is known for his reform of the liturgy. He was instrumental in the consolidation of papal power and led



the fight against the many heresies promoted by small Christian groups at the time. Through his prolific correspondence he oversaw monastic life, curtailing the power of grasping bishops, correcting abuses, and enforcing discipline. He was particularly concerned with the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his monastery to evangelize there.

Saint Gregory died in 604 and was sainted immediately. He is one of four key doctors of the Western Church. Among the miracles attributed to him is a Eucharistic miracle in which the woman who prepared the bread for communion laughed at the consecration, denying the transformation of the bread to the real presence of Jesus. Saint Gregory prayed for the Lord to show the congregation the truth and confirm their belief. The piece of bread transformed into a piece of flesh and then returned to bread, reforming the woman, and strengthening the faith of all. St. Gregory the Great, pray for us! As we celebrate Labor Day, can you tell me about Catholic teaching regarding labor?







We are thus formed to share in God's continuing creative activity by partnering with God in finishing the world and helping bring it to completion and fulfillment. From this perspective, work can be spiritually understood in terms of sharing in God's ongoing activity to build, create, and transform the world. Human beings are co-creators with God. This vocation demands self-discipline.

Besides an exercise in self-discipline, work is also the means by which we develop and fulfill ourselves. In work, we shape the world and our environment. Through work, we also shape ourselves. Pope John Paul II summarized this point in *Laborem Exercens* #6, "the value of work is not primarily the kind of work being done, but the fact that the one who is doing it is a person."

Labor Day offers an excellent opportunity to reflect on how we view work in light of our Catholic social teaching.

Labor Day

A section from the Catechism of the Catholic Church outlining the importance of work:

2402 In the beginning God entrusted the earth and its resources to the common stewardship of mankind to take care of them, master them by labor, and enjoy their fruits. The goods of creation are destined for the whole human race. However, the earth is divided up among men to assure the security of their lives, endangered by poverty and threatened by violence. The appropriation of property is legitimate for guaranteeing the freedom and dignity of persons and for helping each of them to meet his basic needs and the needs of those in his charge. It should allow for a natural solidarity to develop between men.

2427 Human work proceeds directly from persons created in the image of God and called to prolong the work of creation by subduing the earth, both with and for one another. Hence work is a duty: "If any one will not work, let him not eat." Work honors the Creator's gifts and the talents received from him

2428 In work, the person exercises and fulfills in part the potential inscribed in his nature. The primordial value of labor stems from man himself, its author and its beneficiary. Work is for man, not man for work. Everyone should be able to draw from work the means of providing for his life and that of his family, and of serving the human community.

If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected — the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative.






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
