**WELCOME TO SAINT COLUMBAN** We proclaim the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

## A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

At some point in your educational history you likely learned of several types of stories that have shaped Western Civilization. This includes comedies and tragedies, and both of these important types of stories are sadly out of style in our current times, and this is having a very negative effect on our entire civilization.

Let's consider tragedies for a moment. Tragedies have been part of Western story telling for centuries and the Greeks in particular found interest in this type of story. I was talking with a friend who is an English teacher about this, and we came up with some interesting insights as to why some of the famous tragedies from our history are so important.

First and foremost, tragedies teach us that life doesn't always go as planned. So many of these stories featured characters who wanted something and never got it because they made bad decisions among many other things. Contrast this with the stories Hollywood tells. There is almost always a happy ending and things almost always work out for the characters involved.

It is dangerous to give people the impression that things always work out, and that every story has a happy ending because real life stories don't always have happy endings. We need to make a lot of good decisions in order to have a happy life, and even then things happen that are beyond our control. Tragedies kept that reality at the forefront of our minds, but today I'm not sure we have that so deeply embedded in our consciousness.

OThe friend I mentioned above has a particular interest in Shakespeare. She educated me on a particular element of Shakespearean tragedy I found fascinating, in that the tragic character always has a fatal flaw that leads to their doom. In the case of the famous Shakespeare character


Romeo, it is that he acts impulsively without much reflection.

This is another dynamic we would do well to remember. When bad things happen, we are often taught by today's wisdom to blame external forces on these outcomes. If young people get into trouble, we often blame parents, and educational opportunities, and economic realities. While I don't want to dismiss those because they really do factor into these situations, the truth is that there are ways of thinking and acting by these individuals that are not good. Tragedies, like those of Shakespeare, often teach us to start with ourselves and recognize that our own flaws can sometimes lead to our destruction.

As for comedies, you might have noticed that comedy is in a terrible place right now as a genre, although it is improving a bit. Comedians like Jerry Seinfeld, Chris Rock, and Dave Chappell will no longer perform on college campuses, because the students take offense at their jokes and protest their performances. Furthermore, what is being passed as comedy is not actually all that funny. There are some good articles and videos about this you can find on the internet if you don't believe me.

Comedy has an important purpose in a healthy society. It teaches us not to take ourselves too seriously, and reels in extreme ideologies. It has a moderating effect on society. It helps us realize that we do stupid things from time to time and prevents us from feeling a false sense of superiority to others. Aside from the psychological benefits of laughter, being able to laugh at ourselves keeps us humble as individuals and as a community.

If Western Civilization as we know it has a future, it will be because we once again begin to value the important contributions tragedy and comedy have in the stories we tell, whether those stories are on paper or on the screen. Fr. Bryan



## Saint of the Week St. Peter Claver, Priest (Sep. 9)

"Who is my neighbor?" Jesus' answer to this question was the parable of the Good Samaritan. In short, the person you least expect. Peter Claver was born in 16th century Spain. Peter became a Jesuit and was deeply influenced by the missionary call. At age 30, he set out for modern-day Colombia. At the time, Cartagena was one of the largest slave markets in the New World. As a priest, Peter knew his role was spiritual service. He



quickly dedicated his ministry to these "neighbors" whom the world rejected. When a slave ship entered the harbor, Peter would rush on board with food, water, and a human touch. He introduced some slaves to Christ in a more formal way. As these new converts were moved to plantations, he would visit them, stay in their quarters, and advocate with the masters to act humanely. St. Peter Claver called himself "the slave of the slaves forever." May we, too, have a powerful sense of our neighbor.

#### Q&A

We celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross every year on September 14. What is the history behind feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross?



**Answer:** Emperor Constantine's mother, Helena, is credited with having discovered the true cross around 330. She traveled to the Holy Land and uncovered the places associated with Jesus' life. Legend has it that Helena uncovered three crosses but was not able to detect the true cross until each of them was laid on a leper. Only one of them cured the leper, proving it to be the true cross. A great church was built at the site, and soon various portions of the cross were sent to other churches as relics to be venerated.

The day after the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, September 14, 335, the actual cross was displayed for veneration. Egeria, a women traveler to Jerusalem around the year 386, kept






