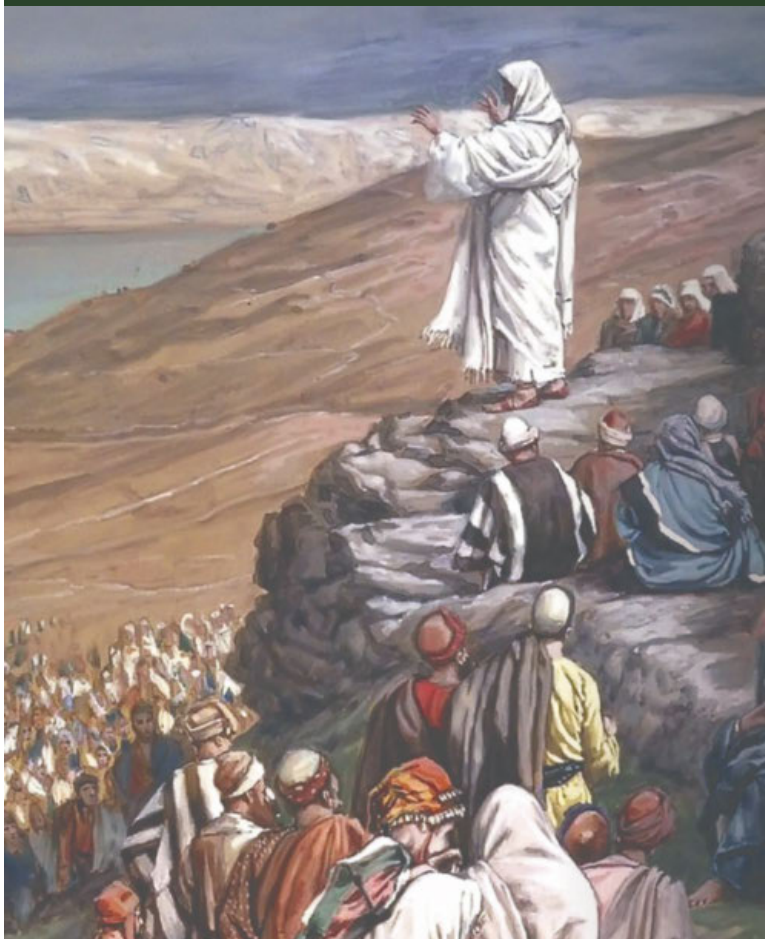

WELCOME TO SAINT COLUMBAN *We proclaim the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.*

A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

While it has been a smooth transition into three new parishes, the reality of change is just now starting to hit me. All the busyness of moving and getting used to a whole lot of new surroundings is mostly over, but reality is setting in. I'm sure you are feeling this too. You're really stuck with me!

Not only are you getting used to a new set of priests to serve you, but Partners in the Gospel is going to change parish life. Yelm and Tenino haven't noticed any staffing changes, but Sacred Heart has had several staff members retire, and we are hoping to bring some new staff aboard soon. All this can be a source of anxiety. I can say with a fairly high degree of certainty that I don't like change very much, and try to minimize it as much as possible.

Change usually feels bad because it is unsettling, but I have learned a lot by seeing other people adapt to change. Times of change are times of growth. I see this in many older people, who have endured many changes as they enter into old age. Today, they seem very peaceful when change happens.

I have also already learned a lot from many of our military families who endure a lot of change throughout life. But there is one couple from my home parish in Bellingham that I think of a lot in these moments. The couple has been active in the parish I grew up in for over fifty years now. They have seen huge amounts of change over the years. Some of the changes they liked, but most they didn't. Even though they didn't like changes, they remained faithful. They continued to attend, even when they didn't like certain things. Now, I see the fruits of that faith. They are some of the most peaceful, patient, and generous people I know. This is not because they always liked things the way they were. It is actually the opposite. They became peaceful and generous and patient because they stayed close to God and the Church even when they didn't like things.

I still don't like change, but I believe some change is necessary for our growth. If there was never any change in the world, then we would not grow faithful. If everything was always exactly the way we like them to be, then we would never have to expand our ideas. If we were always comfortable, then we would never actually learn to trust in God, and we would be very weak people.

When things change, it doesn't mean that the best decisions are always made. I am sure I will make some bad decisions as your pastor. Our staff will too. So will other parishioners that serve as volunteers. You might think that there are better ways to do things and, you are probably right. But this doesn't mean that we need to get frustrated and give up. We have a lot to learn when we endure those times.

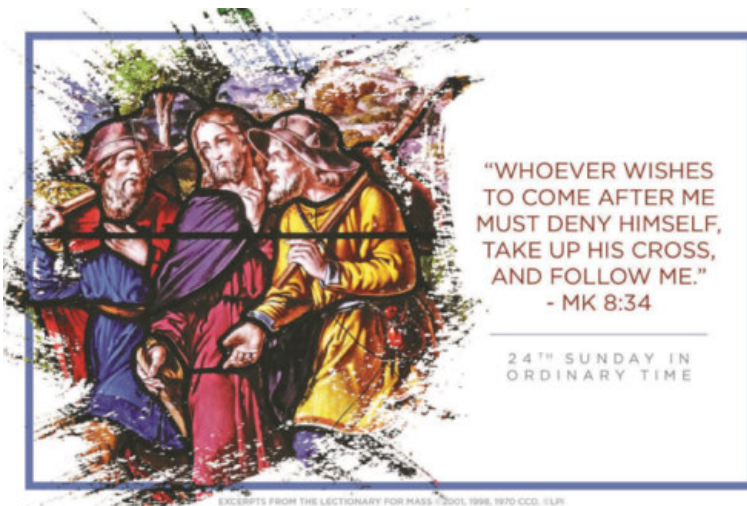
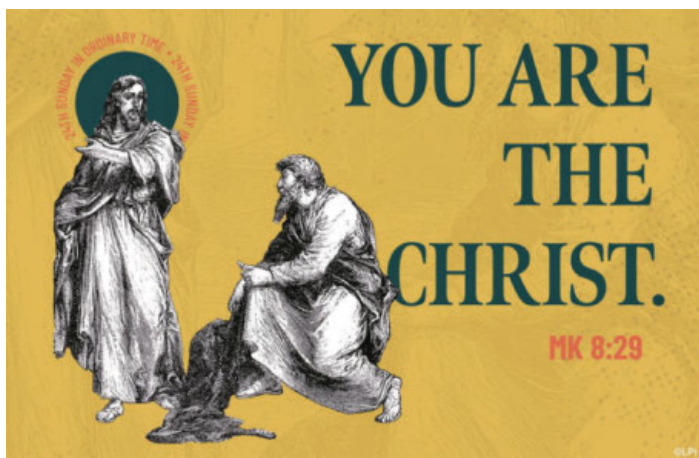
Sometimes when we are critical of decisions, we actually find out that things worked out well or, at least, they didn't go as bad as we thought. When that happens, we can learn to relax the next time things don't go the way we think they should. Other times, our instincts are confirmed to have been right and this can be a blessing too. We now have life experience to draw from to make a better decision next time.

This doesn't change the fact that change is stressful, and that I'm going to try my best to minimize changes in our parishes, but seeing the growth opportunities we have in the midst of change can reassure us that God is always at work among his people, in good times and in bad, in stable times and times of change.

I pray that no matter what you are feeling today, that you will experience the closeness of God and grow in your trust in him.

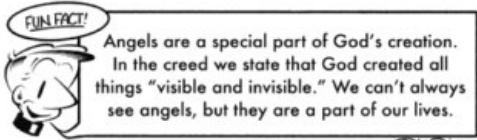

Q&A

What is holy water and how do I explain the reason that it is placed at the entrances of churches to my non-Catholic friends?

Answer: Holy water is a sacramental, a reminder of the life of the Church expressed and celebrated through the sacraments. God's grace is mediated through word and gesture (the outward signs). This comes to us through Jesus (instituted by Christ) as he entrusts to the Church his saving mission (to give grace). In turn the Church, through the sacraments, shares that grace and mission with us.

On Ash Wednesday, we receive ashes on our foreheads to remind us of our origins, humbly created from the dust. But by blessing ourselves with holy water, we are reminded of our destiny! We are baptized sons and daughters of God. This is also a call to conversion, to live more fully our baptismal call to live as disciples of Jesus. We see holy water whenever we renew our baptismal promises. This will occur during the Easter liturgy as well, reminding us that we are indeed on a journey of faith and renewed in Christ. Blessing ourselves with holy water reminds us that we are baptized into a community faith, and always in need of turning from sin and toward God. Saint of the Week

St. Catherine of Genoa (1447-1510, Feast Sep. 15)

"NOBLE in birth, rich, and exceedingly beautiful, Catherine had as a child rejected the solicitations of the world, and begged her divine Master for some share in His sufferings. At sixteen years of age she found herself promised in marriage to a young nobleman of dissolute habits, who treated her with such harshness that, after five years, wearied out by his cruelty, she somewhat relaxed the strictness of her life and entered into the worldly society of Genoa. At length, enlightened by divine grace as to the danger of her state, she resolutely broke with the world and gave herself up to a life of rigorous penance and prayer. The charity with which she devoted herself to the service of the hospitals, undertaking the vilest of offices with joy, induced her husband to amend his evil ways and he died penitent. Her heroic fortitude was sustained by the constant thought of the Holy Souls, whose sufferings were revealed to her, and whose state she has described in a treatise full of heavenly wisdom. A long and grievous malady during the last years of her life only served to perfect her union with God, till, worn out in body and purified in soul, she breathed her last on September 14, 1510.

Reflection.—The constant thought of purgatory will help us not only to escape its dreadful pains, but also to avoid the least imperfection which hinders our approach to God.

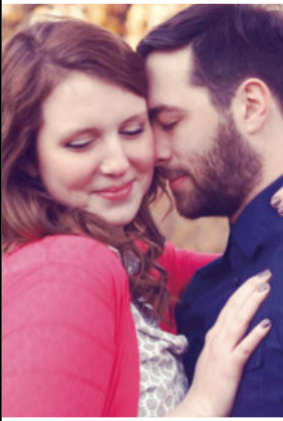
