

WELCOME TO SAINT COLUMBAN We proclaim the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

Did you know our front pews are always empty? Be closer to the Lord and sit closer to the altar next Sunday.

A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

One of the joys of priesthood is helping people through spiritual struggles. One of the most common struggles people share is when they lose some of their zeal for prayer. People who once felt great comfort and peace in attending Mass or in other devotions, such as the rosary, simply lose the feelings of consolation, and don't know why.



Many people presume that it is because they have done something wrong, but that isn't the case, and it is actually more common than people might realize. In fact, many saints have made sense of why this happens and what to do when it does.

The Carmelites often spoke of dark nights of the senses and dark nights of the soul. St. Ignatius of Loyola wrote about Spiritual Desolation. St. Josemaria Escriva wrote about spiritual dryness. These are very distinct spiritual realities, but there are enough similarities between them that we can say some general things about the experiences that can apply to many situations.

One of these meanings is that the dryness actually allows our prayer to be more loving, because we are not deriving some benefit from it. The absence of consolation actually is a grace that allows us to express our love in a deeper way. It is an opportunity to be faithful not because it makes us feel good, but because it is the right thing to do.

Another purpose for this dryness is an invitation to go deeper. If we never experienced any obstacle in our prayer, then we would never really grow. It's like a

person playing hard to get, who distances themselves from the other person so that the other person must learn to love in a deeper way. Experiencing dryness in the rosary might be a call to meditate more deeply on the mysteries, or understand how the mystery impacts the modern world or one's personal experiences.

Sometimes, this might even be an opportunity to explore a completely different devotion altogether. If you have grown dry in praying the rosary, you might instead turn to Lectio Divina, which is way of prayerfully reading the scriptures. You might consider the Liturgy of the Hours, which is a systematic way of praying the Psalms. You might then go back to the original devotion with increased insight and renewed joy.

One thing to remember if you are going through one of these experiences in which you have lost your zeal for prayer is that these experiences are temporary. They really don't last forever. They come and go, and when we endure them, we find that we are stronger than we were before. We can love God and our neighbor in ways that were previously beyond our abilities. This also makes us more able to help others who endure times of trial.

So if you find yourself losing that zeal for your prayer, do not despair. Even this too might be a gift from God that can help to make you a better disciple. There is something to learn in these times of dryness, and if you can remain faithful to prayer in the midst of these times you will be rewarded with greater insight into the love of God. Don't give up!

This Sunday's Gospel (Mk 13:24-32) signals we are very near the end of the Church year. There are key phrases that provide clues to us: "...the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light...and the powers in the heavens will be shaken" (Mk 13:24-25). Ominous is a word that comes to mind. To some degree everyone has events in their lives when the light goes out. A job loss. A devastating car wreck that creates grievous injuries. Drug or alcohol dependency that tears a family apart. Events like this take light from our lives. Until...some person comes along and by a kind word or action begins to lift our fog of darkness. We might call that person

God's living angel who brings Christ's healing into our life. There are people, because of life's many bruising circumstances, who live in constant darkness. Abuse, poverty, addiction...all contribute to a sense of hopelessness. How do the words of Jesus affect us? Do we find it hard to have hearts of compassion for those who make us nervous or scared? Every family or neighborhood has someone who needs us to be God's light. When it is our time to meet death, will we have been known as a person of peace...a person who sought to alleviate some injustice in the world? Will we, like last Sunday's poor widow, have given all we had to part the clouds of darkness so the light of Christ can shine? (Peace, Deacon Terry, ofs)

Question: How can we pray for the dead throughout the year?

Answer: We commemorate the faithful departed on November 2nd each year. However, we can and should continue to pray for the dead. Our growth in Christian perfection takes a long time. At the time of our death, many of us might not be saints yet. But God, in His mercy, allows for those who love Him to experience purification after death. Our word for that state is Purgatory. It's the antechamber of heaven, so to speak. We know we're getting in the house, but we're not quite ready to go all the way in. There's rain to shake off our coats and dirt that's clogging our shoes.


Here on earth, we can pray for the souls in Purgatory. One way is to request that your parish offer a Mass for the intention of a specific loved one. We can also remember the departed in our daily prayers. Just as we have special intentions for family and friends here on earth, we can pray for those who have died. It's also a good act of Christian charity to pray for the forgotten, those who have no one else to pray for them. God knows who they are!

Saint of the Week Nov. 4—St. Charles Borromeo, Bishop

St. Charles Borromeo (1538 - 1584) is most known for living during the time of the Protestant Reformation and helped influence reform of the whole Church during the final years of the Council of Trent.

Although St. Charles Borromeo belonged to nobility, he greatly desired to serve the Church. In 1559, his uncle was elected Pope Pius IV. He made Charles cardinal-deacon and administrator of the Archdiocese of Milan. At the time, Charles was a simple student, but because of his intellectual qualities, he was assigned several important offices con-



nected with the Vatican. After the death of his brother, he decided to become a priest and was ordained at age 25. Soon after he became bishop of Milan.

Quietly working behind the scenes, St. Charles Borromeo is credited with keeping the Council of Trent in session and encouraging the pope to renew the Council in 1562, after its 10-year suspension. Afterwards, he devoted his time to serving in the Archdiocese of Milan.

Among his most important actions during his life, St. Charles Borromeo established seminaries, colleges, and communities for the education of candidates for holy orders. His emphasis on Catholic learning greatly increased the preparation of men for the priesthood and benefited their congregations. He died at the age of 46.


