

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#### **Sunday Letter**

**WELCOME TO SAINT COLUMBAN** We proclaim the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

Did you know our front pews are always empty? Be closer to the Lord and sit closer to the altar next Sunday.

#### A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners.

The purpose of the Mass is to draw into communion with Jesus, such that we can see the world as he sees the world, think as he thinks, and live as he lives. It is to allow the life and love of God to plant itself into our hearts. The Mass is beautifully constructed to bring about this conversion of heart and to draw us deeper and deeper into communion.

The first major part of the Mass is the penitential act. This is a moment where we call to mind our sins. It is when we acknowledge that we are in need of God and the merciful healing that he brings. It is important that we take this moment of the liturgy seriously and call those sins and misguided ways of thinking to mind.

After the penitential act on Sundays (except during advent and Lent) we raise our minds with hope by singing the glory. Then comes one of the most important moments of the entire Mass, which is when the priest says, "Let us pray," and pauses for a moment of silence. Many people do nothing at this moment, because they are just waiting for the server to bring the book to the priest. This is unfortunate, because this is one moment when we have an opportunity to bring our prayers privately to God.

During this period of silence, it is important to express your needs to God. Tell Him what you need help with in life. Tell Him how you need to grow in virtue. Tell him about the things that are out of your control that you want him to take care of. If you can pray this well, the rest of the Mass will be much more effective.

Speaking of which, we then turn our ears as well as our hearts and minds to the readings. Expect that God will address some of those concerns you brought to him in that moment of silence. Expect that the readings, and even the homily, God willing, is going to address those very concerns. It might do so directly, or subtly, but I have found that it works. Let God speak to those things.

The readings might shed light on God's presence in a certain way. It might also shed light on some type of sin that is harming the way we handle these situations. It might give us a new way of thinking.

After the readings we say the creed and offer the Universal Prayer in which we express our hopes and needs and anxieties to God as a community. Then comes another moment that we don't always take full advantage of, which is the offertory. Sometimes we treat the offertory like intermission, in which the choir entertains us and we wait patiently for the collection. There is more we should be doing.

The offertory is when we offer to God our entire selves. We offer our joys and our sufferings. We ask him to take our weaknesses and failures as well as our triumphs. In fact, some theologians see the bread as a sign of joy and the cup of wine as a sign of those sufferings. We offer him all those things and then he will take them onto the altar and, along with the bread and wine which represent these things, God will take them and transform them into his very self.

When we partake of communion, God is drawing close to us. Even if for some reason you can't receive sacramental communion, God is drawing close to you and moving you. After communion the priest once again says, "Let us Pray," and we can thank him for all the wisdom that he gave us regarding the prayers that we expressed way at the beginning of Mass, and how he has drawn close to us.

Then, we are sent forth, hopefully, with that way of seeing things like Jesus, thinking about life like Jesus, and able to live like Jesus. And then we do this again the next week! Over time, the Mass has its effect as it converts us to follow Christ even more deeply.

I hope that these reflections will help you to see, think, and live a little more like Jesus this week!

#### Dialogue for Justice: Catholic Advocacy to Reduce Poverty, Deacon Terry Barber, ofs

This Sunday's Gospel (Mk 13:24-32) signals we are very near the end of the Church year. There are key phrases that provide clues to us: "...the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light...and the powers in the heavens will be shaken" (Mk 13:24-25). Ominous is a word that comes to mind. To some degree everyone has events in their lives when the light goes out. A job loss. A devastating car wreck that creates grievous injuries. Drug or alcohol dependency that tears a family apart. Events like this take light from our lives. Until...some



person comes along and by a kind word or action begins to lift our fog of darkness. We might call that person God's living angel who brings Christ's healing into our life. There are people, because of life's many bruising circumstances, who live in constant darkness. Abuse, poverty, addiction...all contribute to a sense of hopelessness. How do the words of Jesus affect us? Do we find it hard to have hearts of compassion for those who make us nervous or scared? Every family or neighborhood has someone who needs us to be God's light. When it is our time to meet death, will we have been known as a person of peace...a person who sought to alleviate some injustice in the world? Will we, like last Sunday's poor widow, have given all we had to part the clouds of darkness so the light of Christ can shine? (Peace, Deacon Terry, ofs)

#### **Sunday Features**

#### From an instruction by St. Columban, Abbot

Man's likeness to God, if preserved, imparts high dignity
Moses wrote in the law: God made man in his image and likeness. Consider, I ask you, the dignity of these words. God is all-powerful. We cannot see or understand him, describe or assess him. Yet he fashioned man from clay and endowed him with the nobility of his own image. What has man in common with God? Or earth with spirit? For God is a spirit. It is a glorious privilege that God should grant men his eternal image and the likeness of his character. Man's likeness to God, if he preserves it, imparts high dignity.

If man applies the virtues planted in his soul to the right purpose, he will be like God. God's commands have taught us to give him back the virtues he sowed in us in our first innocence. The first command is to love our Lord with our whole heart because he loved us first from the beginning, before our existence. Loving God renews his image in us. Anyone who loves God keeps his commandments, for he said: If you love me, keep my commandments. His command is that we love each other. In his own words: This is my command, that you love each other as I also have loved you.

True love is shown not merely in word, but in deed and in truth. So we must turn back our image undefiled and holy to our God and Father, for his is holy; in the words of Scripture: Be holy, for I am holy. We must restore his image with love, for he is love; in John's words: God is love. We must restore it with loyalty and truth, for he is loyal and truthful. The image we depict must not be that of one who is unlike God; for one who is harsh and irascible and proud would display the image of a despot.

Let us not imprint on ourselves the image of a despot, but let Christ paint his image in us with his words: My peace I give you, my peace I leave with you. But the knowledge that peace is good is of no benefit to us if we do not practice it. The most valuable objects are usually the most fragile; costly things require the most careful handling. Particularly fragile is that which is lost by wanton talk and destroyed with the slightest injury of a brother. Men like nothing better than discussing and minding the business of others, passing superfluous comments at random and criticizing people behind their backs. So those who cannot say: The Lord has given me a discerning tongue, that I may with a word support him who is weary should keep silent, or if they do say anything it should promote peace.


# A biker's prayer to Saint Columban by an unknown author:



The HSPT is a standardized test administered to 8th graders that helps schools know where to place students academically when they enter high school. The test takes approximately three hours to complete and an essay will be administered after the standardized portion of the test.

We host a Prospective Parent Information Session during the first hour of the HSPT for parents and guardians. The HSPT can be shared with any school that accepts the HSPT regardless of where it was proctored.

The cost of the test is \$30 which can be paid online for anyone with a JPII FinalSite account, or via cash/check on the day of the test. Registration is required and can be accessed via the QR code or at
