

Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

Did you know our front pews are always empty? Be closer to the Lord and sit closer to the altar next Sunday.

A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Time to change things up a bit and move to some less important subjects. It's getting pretty cold and dark outside which, for me, is movie watching weather. As a bit of a movie buff, I wanted to recommend a couple good ones that you might not have seen. These came out a while ago, though, which is necessary because they don't make good movies anymore.

Wind River: More people need to know about this movie. It is about a man who lives on a native reservation in Wyoming. He hunts predatory animals, such as wolves and wildcats, that kill sheep and cattle being farmed. One day, he finds the body of a young native woman in the middle of a field, and the FBI is called into investigate and the hunt for a different predator begins.

I really can't believe this movie didn't get more publicity because it is quite good. Aside from one or two exceptions, the acting is really good and the grief of the family who has lost their daughter is hauntingly portrayed. Jeremy Renner is fantastic. For those who like action, it has one of my favorite gunfights I've ever seen. It does have a very graphic sexual assault scene, so discretion is certainly advise. The last scene of this film really stands out. Renner shows us exactly what it means to be a friend to one who is grieving. There are some lines in that final scene that strike pretty deep, and the words that

scroll across the screen at the end haunted me. Highly recommended.

The Big Short: Even though this movie came out way back in 2015 I only recently saw it and I loved it. It is very similar to the movie Moneyball, which was also based on a book written by Michael Lewis. The best thing about both of these movies is that they take very complex ideas and make them quite simple. While Moneyball focused on baseball statistics, The Big Short was about economics and the housing market crash in 2008.

I remember a few years ago when the Gamestop stock incident happened, and heard about the world of shorting stocks. I tried to figure out what was happening, but didn't get it. Well, I get it now thanks to this movie. It really did a great job of educating the audience on what happened. The script is sensational, and I loved how often they broke the "Fourth Wall," and talked directly to the audience. The acting in this is great, but I found Christian Bale's performance the most interesting. I also appreciate it when you know how something ends, but still find yourself invested in the story. This is definitely one to watch to entertain and to learn, although it will end up ticking you off a great deal. Also highly recommended.

Still, be careful, since there is some foul language and some other objectionable content. That's it for today! If you check either of these out, let me know what you think!

Keep in mind donations should be of good, re-usable quality; something you would wear. Items such as boots, gloves, hats, scarves, coats, blankets, etc. are needed; rather than summer apparel such as swimsuits, shorts, & flipflops which are not particularly useful for keeping warm during the winter months.



This Advent, use this guide to help you and your family enter into the hope and joy of the season.

Advent Family Traditions

Advent, the liturgical season before Christmas, is a great opportunity for families to enjoy joyful, faith-based traditions that keep the focus of the season on the anticipation of Jesus. This isn't easy when retailers start Christmas the day after Halloween. Even if you didn't grow up with many Advent traditions, are there one or two traditions on this list that you can try this year?

Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is rich with the symbolism of the season: four candles for the four weeks of Advent and the flames representing the light of Christ to come. The lighting of each candle is an opportunity for the family to gather in prayer and read the daily scripture or reflection from an Advent book. Try turning off the lights and sing a song like, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" or "Light the Advent Candle" as the candles are lit.

Advent Calendar

The point of an Advent calendar is to inspire hopeful anticipation of the coming of Jesus and to emphasize the spirit of waiting over the spirit of receiving. Although the chocolate and Lego calendars are fun, try a faith inspired Advent calendar this year, which are easy to purchase online. Many have daily scripture quotes from Advent to keep you in the Advent frame of mind.

Christmas Anticipation Prayer

Also known as the St. Andrew Christmas Novena (not a typical 9-day novena), this beautiful, short daily prayer is traditionally prayed 15 times a day during Advent, starting on the Feast of St. Andrew on November 30. But for most busy families, praying it together once a day is a win. The words of the prayer are a reminder of the humble and historical event of the incarnation. Try saying the prayer after lighting the Advent wreath or as part of your prayers before dinner.

Straw for Baby Jesus

This tradition is when you put out a "manger" (a small cardboard box will do) and a bowl of "straw" in a common area (such as the kitchen table), and the idea is to create a full bed of straw for baby Jesus by Christmas Eve by adding a piece of straw when a good deed or small sacrifice is done for Jesus. Everyone can participate, even parents! On Christmas Eve, you lay baby Jesus (or a doll to symbolize) on the (hopefully) full bed of straw and sing "Away in a Manger" or "Silent Night."

Blessings for the Advent Wreath, Nativity set and Christmas Tree

You can find blessings for the Advent Wreath, Nativity set and Christmas Tree in many Catholic prayer books or online (such as archseattle.org/advent). Taking a moment to pause and pray a blessing is a great way to reflect on the meaning of these traditions. These blessings invite us to enjoy them with intention and gratitude.

Jesse Tree

This tradition traces salvation history from the Old Testament through the birth of Christ. Much like the Advent calendar but more involved with longer daily readings and song, it's a daily activity rich with symbolism and a great way for all ages to participate.

Decorating in stages

Instead of putting up all the Christmas decorations the morning after Thanksgiving, consider putting them up in stages to emphasize the season of waiting for the light of Christ. This will help put more focus on your Advent traditions. One idea is to wait to light and decorate the Christmas tree until Guadete (Rejoice) Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent. Remember, the Christmas season starts on Christmas and lasts all the way through January 12.

"O" Antiphons

The "O" Antiphons are beautiful, short chants used at vespers (evening prayers) for the last seven days of Advent from December 18-24, each starting with "O" and each highlighting a title for the Messiah (O Wisdom, O Lord,...), which increases the anticipation of Christ's coming. You can add these to your evening prayers around the Advent wreath or in front of the Nativity set.

St. Andrew Christmas Novena

Traditionally prayed November 30 to Christmas Eve.

Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in the piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech Thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His Blessed Mother. Amen
