Welcome to our Parish Family

St. Columban Parish proclaims the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

Since July 2024, Sacred Heart Parish in Lacey, St. Columban Parish, and St. Peter Mission formed into Parish Family 40 under our pastor, Very Rev. Bryan Ochs.

A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

I can't believe it is 2025. We are a quarter of the way through the 21st Century and it feels like we are behind schedule on a few things. Flying cars, for example. How



has this not happened yet? I thought I'd own a spaceship by now.

Being serious though for a moment though, 2025 is bringing a lot of reasons to feel optimistic about the future of the Church. Several years ago I started watching a YouTube channel of an atheist who had argued repeatedly about the danger of believing in God and being religious. The reason that I started to watch him was because he didn't like the direction that the world was heading in as religion declined. He had argued for years that if religion died it would be replaced by science, and logical thought. But this isn't what he saw happening. In fact, he lamented that people seemed less logical and less interested in truth as religion waned.

Rather than considering that Christianity might actually be something that steers people to truth and, therefore, logic and opening his mind to the possibility of God, this youtuber doubled down and has embraced the philosophy of Nihilism completely, which is a philosophy that nothing has any meaning whatsoever. It is depressing as it sounds and, sadly, he seems to experiencing that as well.

But I bring it up because I recently checked in on his channel for the first time in several years and saw a video about the end of the "New Atheists." The "New Atheists" are people like Richard Dawkins, Christopher Hitchens, Sam Harris and others who sought to spread Atheism the way others spread religious faith. In the video, he admitted that this movement was basically over. Most of the people either died, renounced atheism to become Christian, or became "Cultural Christians" who don't believe in God but have come to prefer the world with Christianity to the world without it and have thus stopped spending their time opposing it.

I found it interesting because I remember how threatening this "New Atheism" movement felt at first. Bishop Robert Barron launched his Word on Fire ministry practically in response to these personalities. Word on Fire is stronger than ever, but the New Atheist movement is being declared over. It turned out that it was just kind of a fad. It opened with a bang, but now it has just slowly dwindled.

Not only are people not turning into the New Atheists, but many people are exploring Christianity and our Catholic Faith. This is certainly true in our parishes, as we have seen many young people (and especially young men) explore our faith through OCIA. It isn't just our parishes either. Parishes across the Archdiocese are seeing a positive trend.

The thing is that we can't forget that even when things seem bleak that God is still knocking on the door of the hearts and minds of many people. Yeah, things have gotten bleak, but this only makes what we are offering look more attractive to many. People have seen a world without Jesus, and they don't like it. God is working in the hearts and minds of many, which is why Christianity will never just be a fad. We aren't on an unending downward trend of faithlessness. It seems, to me, like we hit bottom and are on the rise again.

This won't be automatic though. We still need to provide good pastoral care, and form people to be strong disciples who others, faithful and non-faithful alike, can rely on in difficult times. I'm already seeing this in our parishes, and I'm excited to see it continue into the future.

So, Happy New Year! I hope 2025 will bring you and our entire parish joy and hope for the future.

precious position. There can be no competition for his throne. It will lead him to do horrible things when he orders his soldiers to slay all boys under the age of two. (On December 28, the Feast of the Holy Innocents honored those first martyrs.) How mothers and fathers must have grieved over the loss of their children. Today as in years gone by, it is with deep sadness that mothers and fathers lose their children to violence and to other circumstances beyond their control. The number of people migrating worldwide due to extreme poverty is staggering. How many children become separated from their parents? What happens to them? How painful it must be to be forced to give up your child/ren because you are so desperate. January is Poverty Awareness Month. Pope Francis challenges us "to make a serious examination of conscience, to see if we are truly capable of hearing the cry of the poor." To learn more about poverty in the United States visit povertyusa.org. Lord, open my eyes to see you in the face of those in poverty. Open my ears to hear you in the cries of those exploited. Open my mouth to defend you in the public square as well as in my private deeds. I recall that what I do to the least I do to you. Amen. (Being Neighbor, USCCB, 1998)

Epiphany Blessing, Explained

The Epiphany household blessing is a centuries-old tradition that invokes God's blessing on all who enter one's home.

Instructions on blessing your home with Epiphany Chalk:

Take the blessed chalk and first write the initials of the three Wise Men, connected with Crosses, over the inside of your front door (on the lintel, if possible). Then write the year, breaking up the numbers and the year so that they fall on both sides of the initials. It should look like this, for example



20+C+M+B+25

with the "20 "being the millennium and century, the "C" standing for the first Wise Man, Caspar, the "M" standing for Melchior, the "B" standing for Balthasar, and the "25" standing for the decade and year. It is also popularly believed that the Kings' initials stand for "*Christus mansionem benedicat*" ("Christ bless this house").

While you do this, or after, you may say the following prayers:

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is your incarnate Word, now and forever. Amen.

God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten One to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Savior. Amen.

Loving God, bless this household. May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness and abiding in your will. We ask this through Christ our Savior. Amen.



High School Placement Test offered at Pope John Paul II High School

The HSPT is a standardized test administered to 8th graders that helps schools know where to place students academically when they enter high school. The test takes approximately three hours to complete and an essay will be administered after the standardized portion of the test.


We host a Prospective Parent Information Session during the first hour of the HSPT for parents and guardians. The HSPT can be shared with any school that accepts the HSPT regardless of where it was proctored.

The cost of the test is \$30 which can be paid online for anyone with a JPII FinalSite account, or via cash/ check on the day of the test. Registration is required and can be accessed via the QR code or at: popejp2hs.org/high-school-placement-test-hspt/



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Blessing of Chalk on Epiphany



What is Blessed Chalk:

It is traditional for parish priests to bless chalk for each family so that they may mark the names of the three Magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar) over their doors. In the blessing of homes this serves as a witness of their faith to follow the Star and protection against evil in obeying the warning not to return to Herod. We as Catholics are called to always to follow the light of Christ and to resist the temptations of the enemy. Marking the initials of these three Magi and the current year is a way of dedicating ones household to remain faithful to Christ and serves as a symbol of that promise as you go to a from your house each day.

The chalk is a type of memento ("*Remember, man, you are dust and to dust you will return.*"), a reminder of the dust of the earth from which man was made. See Genesis 3:19.

Note that any color of chalk is valid for this blessing.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

WSCC Washington State Catholic Conference

May the peace of our Lord be with you this Christmas season.

We, the Bishops of Washington State, stand with our brothers and sisters who are immigrants and refugees. The threats of mass deportations and forced separation of families have caused great fear for refugees and migrants and their families – documented and undocumented. These threats are contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the dignity of every human person that is central to the teachings of our Catholic faith.

In his encyclical letter *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis reminds us, "If every human being possesses an inalienable dignity, if all people are my brothers and sisters, and if the world truly belongs to everyone, then it matters little whether my neighbor was born in my country or elsewhere" (#55).

While we uphold that we are a nation of laws, as we've stated in the past, we also know that the U.S. immigration system is severely flawed and in need of a comprehensive overhaul. As Christians we know our love for God is measured by our love of neighbor, particularly the most vulnerable. Rooted in Scripture, the Catholic Church has a long tradition of standing with those forced to migrate, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:35). Therefore, we cannot separate our love for God from our love for others, as we echo Pope Francis' call to welcome, protect, promote and integrate immigrants (*Fratelli Tutti* 129).

Even the Statue of Liberty reminds us that migration is part of the fabric of our nation, with a line from Emma Lazarus, a Jewish-American immigrant author, engraved on its pedestal: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free."

During this time of uncertainty and fear, we stand with our immigrant and refugee brothers and sisters. May all our brothers and sisters on the margins, especially migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, know that our parishes are open for prayer, comfort and solace. May each of us embrace the Gospel teaching and Pope Francis' call to recognize the dignity of others as we welcome the stranger. As pilgrims of hope entering into a Jubilee year, we journey together through these uncertain times knowing Our Lady of Guadalupe walks with us.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, pray for us!
