



Welcome to our Parish Family

St. Columban Parish proclaims the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

Since July 2024, Sacred Heart Parish in Lacey, St. Columban Parish, and St. Peter Mission formed into Parish Family 40 under our pastor, Very Rev. Bryan Ochs.

A Word from our Pastor

Hello Everyone,

People seemed to like it last time I reviewed some books that I've read, so here you go. Here are a few more.

<u>I'll Push You</u>: This is the true story of two best friends who



decided to walk the Camino de Santiago in Spain together. For those who don't know, the Camino de Santiago is a walking pilgrimage across Spain. While there are several different routes, the most common is from France and passes through cities like Burgos and León . What made this story interesting, however, was the fact that one of the friends was confined to a wheelchair.

Having walked about 200 miles of the Camino myself a couple years ago, I enjoyed the book. There were some spiritual insights they picked up along the way, and I enjoyed the stories of the people they met and the challenges they overcame. I enjoyed it because I've done the Camino, but I'm not sure I would have as much if I hadn't. It kind of made me want to go back, to be honest. If you have walked the Camino, I highly recommend it and if you have not, I suggest you walk the Camino and then read it! (stay... tuned for more on this... hint, hint...;)

I'm Starting to Worry About This Black Box of Doom: This was my vacation book. I just wanted something easy and relatively mindless to read and in that sense, it delivered. But other than that it was up and down. I almost didn't want to admit that I read this because there is a lot of objectionable, shallow and immature material in it, but it had its good moments too.

Basically, a young man gets offered a couple hundred

thousand dollars to drive a young woman and a big black box across the country. They have no idea what's inside the box. Some evidence suggests it's a bomb. Other evidence suggests it's nothing. But the internet gets ahold of the story and starts wildly speculating on what is happening.

This, in my opinion, made the book enjoyable. It was like all the scientific data you've ever read about Gen Z and how the internet and social media has wrecked their brains in literary form. The wild speculation of people who knew nothing about what was happening but spoke authoritatively of what was in the box and the relationship between the young man and woman was excellent, and there were some great lines from the characters about friendship and trust, but there were some negative things too about the material, making it so I can't widely recommend it. Sad too, because it was a good idea for a story.

Humility Rules: Saint Benedict's 12 Step Guide to Genuine Self-Esteem: I read this book a couple years ago, but I still regularly pick it up to reflect on from time to time. Seeing as how our parishes have such a history of Benedictine spirituality, I think this is a good one for people to read. It takes one of the great works of Western Civilization, The Rule of St. Benedict, and makes it very easily understandable for a modern reader. I found it very easy to read, thought provoking, but also very practical. If you are looking for a little spiritual reading on the simple side to jumpstart your prayer life and spark some reflection, this is a book I totally recommend, especially if you are unfamiliar with the rule of St. Benedict.

That's it for now! I know that some of you expected <u>All</u> the <u>Light We Cannot See</u>, and it's coming, I promise. I'm hoping to finish it by Christmas.

BAPTISM OF THE LORD







Q&A

Question: At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

Answer: When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers and this is symbolized by the white garment. (Text ©LPi, our bulletin publisher)

Sprinkling Rite, Explained

The rite of sprinkling, also called the Asperges rite, describes the act of sprinkling the congregation with holy water, an action which recalls the new life we received in the waters of our baptism.

If this rite is performed during Mass, it takes the place of the penitential act.

The sprinkling rite usually takes place on Sundays during the Easter season but is permitted on any Sunday. When it is completed, the congregation sings the Gloria.

The name "asperges" comes from the first line of Psalm 51, a penitential psalm that begins with the words "Have mercy on me." In the Extraordinary Form of the Mass, the Asperges rite is done before each principal Mass, except on Palm Sunday.

The tool used by the priest to sprinkle the congregation is called the aspergillum, and the bucket containing the water is called the aspersorium.

Jubilee 2025 Pilgrims of Hope

What is a Jubilee?

A Jubilee is a special year of prayer. Jubilees are times for forgiveness, reconciliation, and pilgrimage and are a part of the Catholic tradition. Jubilees ordinarily take place every twenty-five years.

When does this Jubilee begin and end?

Pope Francis will formally open the Holy Doors at St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024 and close them on January 6, 2026. Locally, our observance of the Jubilee will begin on December 29, 2024, and conclude on December 28, 2025.

What is the theme of Jubilee 2025?

The theme of Jubilee 2025 is Pilgrims of Hope.

"Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring....For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope."

-Pope Francis

What are ways to observe the Jubilee?

During the Jubilee, millions of people are expected to make a pilgrimage to Rome to walk through the Holy Doors at one of the four major basilicas. For those unable to travel to Rome, there are many other ways to participate in the Jubilee, through pilgrimage, prayer, and service.

What is the Jubilee indulgence?

The Jubilee indulgence is a traditional part of a Jubilee year. It is a plenary indulgence which can be applied either to yourself or to your deceased loved ones. The ordinary conditions for obtaining the Jubilee indulgence are to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist, to pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, and to make a pilgrimage locally or to Rome. You can also obtain the Jubilee indulgence by participating in one of the spiritual or corporal works of mercy. Learn more on the USCCB website.

What if you can't make it to Rome?

You can make a Jubilee pilgrimage closer to home by visiting St. James Cathedral in Seattle or one of the other designated pilgrimage places in the archdiocese. In each location, you will find a self-guided pilgrimage brochure including special prayers for the Jubilee. Learn more at archseattle.org/Jubilee2025.

Safe Parking Program at Holy Rosary

This year, we were excited to open our Safe Parking program at the Holy Rosary campus in Tacoma. With on-site office space, a kitchen, a dining area, a bathroom with showers, and laundry facilities, this program is a much-needed resource for those we serve. One of our first participants, a veteran who had been living in his car for months, was connected to services through our SSVF program and moved into permanent housing within a day. Since its opening, an additional eight households have exited the program.

Supporting Our Seniors' Independence

Volunteer Services is committed to helping our seniors live independently in their homes. One of the many ways our volunteers have kept this promise throughout the year is by equipping homes with ramps. One neighbor, recovering from a stroke, needed a ramp to safely recuperate at home with family support. Another, recently discharged from rehab, could not return home without one. For both these neighbors and countless more, Volunteer Services strives to meet the needs of our seniors.

Long Term Care for Shelter Guests

CCS Long Term Care's Pilot Program at Nativity House Shelter celebrated its fifth year of service this year. Since its inception, the LTC Pilot Program has been bringing home care services and licensed caregivers to our most vulnerable shelter guests.
