

Sunday Letter

Welcome to our Parish Family

St. Columban Parish proclaims the Roman Catholic faith to the communities of McKenna, Nisqually, Rainier, Roy, Tenino, and Yelm in southeast Thurston and southwest Pierce counties. Our community has grown since its origins at the former St. Margaret Mary Church in McKenna, and our current church in Yelm is named for the Irish-born 6th century missionary to Europe St. Columbanus of Bobbio. We have also been present in Tenino since 1891 through St. Peter Mission, named for the apostle and first pope.

Since July 2024, Sacred Heart Parish in Lacey, St. Columban Parish, and St. Peter Mission formed into Parish Family 40 under our pastor, Very Rev. Bryan Ochs.

A Word from our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

A few weeks ago I wrote about a book I read called, "I'll Push You," which is about two friends walking the Camino de Santiago in Spain. In that letter, I mentioned that I



walked the Camino de Santiago a couple of years ago while on a Sabbatical. There has been a lot of interest in this around the parishes and I teased that there might be an opportunity to do this as a parish.

The Camino de Santiago, for those who don't know, is a walking pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela in Northwestern Spain, which is where the relics of St. James, the Apostle, are kept. For centuries, pilgrims have travelled to Santiago to venerate the relics.

There are many routes, but the most famous route begins in France and passes through Pamplona, Burgos, and Leon. I began in Leon and walked about two hundred miles over the course of about two weeks. It was a wonderful experience. I wish that I could have walked more, honestly.

I walked in March, which is low season, so many places were closed, but I appreciated this because there were only about 15 other people on the trail with me at any given moment. I made friends from Germany, Hungary, Australia, Denmark and, of course, the United States. We still keep in touch.

There are many different ways to make the Camino. Many choose to stay in Hotels, but this is more expensive. We stayed in Albergues, which are hostels specifically for pilgrims. Each Albergue cost us anywhere from 5-20 Euros per night. For food, we sometimes cooked for ourselves, but I usually ate out to support the local economy (and to avoid cleanup

duties). Most places had a pilgrim menu which consisted of a couple of courses, desert, and a glass of wine for around 12-18 euros..

Of course, visiting the local parishes was a great experience and I love the Spanish aesthetic in their Churches. They are very beautiful sanctuaries, and I loved stopping by to pray although, sadly, because it was the low season many of the Churches were closed.

Walking into the Cathedral Square in Santiago was surprisingly powerful. I was actually very emotional and the sense of accomplishment was stronger than I expected. By the end, there were many, many more pilgrims on the trail and we offered a Mass at the end at a packed Cathedral with many others. We also got to see the famous "Botafumeiro," the world's largest Thurible. It is one of the most memorable masses I've ever offered.

When this experience comes up in conversation, there is a lot of interest among our parishioners and I think it would be worthwhile to consider the possibility of a short Camino with our local parishes.

On February 3rd at 6:30pm in the fellowship room of the Sacred Heart campus (which is in the office building behind the Church), I will be giving a presentation about the Camino de Santiago. It will primarily be about logistics, with the intention that parishioners would be able to plan their own Camino, or we could begin discerning the possibility of going as a group. If you are interested, please do come and be ready to ask questions. And if you have already experienced the Camino, please come so you can help answer questions and share your experiences!

Dialogue for Justice: Catholic Advocacy to Reduce Poverty

"Dignity! During the wedding celebration at Cana, a family friend of Jesus and Mary was about to suffer an embarrassment. Perhaps uninvited guests, party crashers, joined in the community celebration causing the wine supply to dry up more quickly than had been anticipated. Mary, sensitive and alert to the situation, knows their friends will fall from grace in the community's eyes. Jesus was reluctant to display God's glory at this time. Yet out of care for his mother's request and the wedding couple Jesus performs his first "sign" according to John's Gospel. Notice Jesus' hesitancy. Does this describe our unwillingness to become involved with issues of justice? Do we hold back? What excuses do we make? I'm too busy. Politics is not the affair of the Church. The Bible is a religious

document...it's separate from things of the world. While the miracle at Cana was a social affair most Christ's work in the world challenged social norms. Touching sick or dead people. Talking with women. Teaching others beyond the Jewish culture. Jesus asks us to set aside our agenda to serve his. Where are we being called this week to do just that for the Kingdom of God?

Today's Gospel from Luke quotes Isaiah, "...to bring glad tidings to the poor...proclaim liberty to captives...recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free..." (Lk 4:18-19). Jesus was proclaiming his mission to all in the synagogue that day. These words from the Old Testament are now embedded into the life of Christ, the New Testament. They are the basis of the Catholic Church's social justice teachings, which is based on the intentions and actions of Christ. This proclamation is the mission of Christ. This is what he intends to do. This is what he teaches his intimate disciples. This is what the Church proclaims as its mission. Who is the Church? It is the people of God...us! It is up to us to be bearers of "glad tidings...proclaim liberty...help the blind see, and to set free" those who are burdened by life's situations. Consider the teachings in the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "The Church makes a moral judgment about economic and social matters.... [T]he Church is concerned with the temporal aspects of the common good because they are ordered to the sovereign Good, our ultimate end. She strives to inspire right attitudes with respect to earthly goods and in socio-economic relationships" (CCC 2420).



Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Love as a Theological Virtue

Question: I've heard that love is a theological virtue. What does that mean?

Answer: Charles Shultz, the creator of the Peanuts comics wrote, "I love mankind ... it's people I can't stand!" This good humored comment gets at an important truth. St. John wrote a very strong statement in one of his letters: "If anyone says 'I love God,' but hates his brother, he is a liar; for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen" (1 John 4:20). How often do we say "I love the homeless," but ignore the parish food drive? Or insist on the importance of respecting others, but don't bother to say hello to our cashier? If we can't love an individual person, we might not love people like we think, and we certainly need to work on our love for God.

Love is "the theological virtue by which we love God above all things for His own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God" (CCC 1822). God knows acts of love of Him and others isn't always easy. So He invites us to pray for the grace to do it. The virtue of love gives us the grace and strength we need to offer our lives to God and love people in our lives, especially those who are difficult to respect, tolerate, and care for. Real love, of course, is risky. Real love wills the good of the other when we just want good for ourselves. Real love gets up on the cross when we'd prefer to take a nap in Gethsemane. Real love changes things.



Examination of Conscience, Explained

In St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians, the apostle writes that it is imperative for a Christian to reflect on his conscience before he partakes of Holy Eucharist: "Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup" (1 Corinthians 11:28). The practice of examining one's conscience before seeking the Sacrament of Reconciliation thus dates to the very beginning of the Christian faith and was encouraged as a regular practice by many saints and founders of religious orders as a means of growing in virtue.

An examination of conscience, when it relates to the sacrament, simply means reflecting on one's actions (and particularly the intentions behind those actions) since the penitent's last

absolution, making note of lapses in judgment that should be confessed. A good basis for this reflection can be the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes and the seven deadly sins. $^{(\text{Text } \otimes \text{LPi}, \text{ our bulletin publisher})}$
