Dear Parishioners,

Habemus Papam! We have a Pope! As I write this, The Cardinals elected Pope Leo XIV just a couple of hours ago. These are my initial impressions. They might change by the time this actually appears in the bulletin!

First, I'm stunned for many reasons. I didn't think that we would see white smoke that soon. I also didn't expect an American. A couple of weeks ago I said, "Expect the unexpected." Well, that certainly proved to be true.

The name Leo XIV says a lot. Leo XIII, remember, was Pope in the late 1800s, and his pontificate was most notable for an encyclical called *Rerum Novarum*. This encyclical was crucial due to the fact that industrialization brought up many new moral and social questions. This encyclical shed light on the issues at hand and is known as a giant leap in the Church's social teachings, especially working-class people.

Prior to being elected Pope, Cardinal Prevost served as the Prefect for the Dicastery of Bishops since 2020. He was charged with the task of helping the Pope select new bishops, and I like the guys that he chose. He and Pope Francis often selected solid, well-liked pastors to be bishops. There didn't seem to be any real ideological preference among their selections. They were typically well-liked and successful Shepherds.


This is actually a bit of a shift. Prior to Pope Francis, the path to becoming a bishop didn't often pass through parish life. It passed through high level chancery positions and teaching posts in seminaries. Thus, many of our bishops really didn't have a good grasp of parish life and ministry, which often led to

conflict and tension between priests and their bishops. Cardinal Prevost and Pope Francis focused on finding successful pastors to become bishops, and I think new bishops ordained in the last five years or so have been good picks.

One final thing that stood out to me was that Pope Leo XIV spoke excellent Italian but used a script for his first address to the world. I believe he could have stood out there and spoke very well in Italian, but the fact that he used prepared remarks is noteworthy. He is a man who likes to prepare before he speaks. This for me is very welcome. Some of the most confusing moments of the Francis Pontificate were moments in which he spoke off the cuff, opening his words to unintended interpretations by the media. Pope Leo XIV didn't strike me as being that type of man. I think that when Pope Leo speaks it will be very thoughtful and eloquent.

Putting this together, my initial impressions are that

Pope Leo XIV has an awareness for the lives of common people and will exercise his office with a great deal of care for the challenges that common people face. Time will, of course, reveal many other things about Leo, our new Pope, but there are many things to be optimistic about regarding the Church's future.



Dialogue for Justice:

Catholic Advocacy to Reduce Poverty

We Today's Gospel reading (Jn 13:31-33a, 34-35) takes us back to the banquet table of the Last Supper. Judas has left the banquet table and is on his way to collect his reward of 30 pieces of silver. Judas misses the tender words of Jesus, "My children.... I give you a new commandment: love one another." Jesus calls the grown men who have gathered around him "children." How loving Jesus is toward his flock of believers. He urges them in the spirit of love. and he will know they are true followers by the way they "have love for one another" (Jn 13:35). This leads to a question, "Who is my neighbor?" The command to love one another leaves little room for negotiation or explanation. We cannot dodge our Christian responsibility to care for those in the human community, family, friends, and even enemies. This is a wonderful message to receive during the Easter season. It calls us to examine our hearts in relationship with everyone. Does Easter touch us grow in new ways? In what ways are we called to conversion and are we willing to let the Lord lead us. The hymn They'll Know we are Christians musically reinforces today's Gospel: "... we'll guard each one's dignity and save each one's pride. And they'll know we are Christians, by our love...." We, the children of God, are called to live in God's gracious love by the way we have "love for one another."

Liturgy Corner

Communion Reception in the Hand

Particles

Just like any bread, the wafers we use for communion have particles or crumbs that fall off of them as they are touched and moved.

The Church teaches that once the host has been consecrated it becomes literally the Body of Christ. So when those particles fall, it is the precious pieces of Jesus himself falling to the ground. During distribution of Holy Communion, priests and Extraordinary Ministers of Communion ensure that particles fall back into the ciborium or onto the paten held by the altar server. The particles are then carefully collected and consumed by the priest on the altar after communion when he purifies the vessels.

Communion on the Hand

When the host is placed on your hand, the movement from your hand to the mouth, if you're not done carefully, can cause particles to fall to the floor. If your preference of reception is on the hand, please use your palm like a paten and consume the Host over it in order to catch particles. Check your palm and finger tips, and if you see particles on them, lick them off.
