Reflect on the Sunday Liturgy

Readings: Acts 2:1-11/Ps 104:1, 24, 29-30, 31, 34/1 Cor 12:3b-7, 12-13 or Rom 8:8-17/Jn 20:19-23 or Jn 14:15-16, 23b-2

First Reading: They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak.

Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. (Acts 2:3)



Dear Parishioners,

At some point in your educational history you likely learned of several types of stories that have shaped Western Civilization. This includes comedies and tragedies, and both of these important types of stories are sadly out of style in our current times, and this is having a very negative effect on our entire civilization.

Let's consider tragedies for a moment. I'll address the importance of comedy in a future column. Tragedies have been part of Western story telling for centuries and the Greeks in particular found interest in this type of story. I was talking with a Middle School English teacher about this recently, and we came up with some interesting insights as to why some of the famous tragedies from our history are so important.

First and foremost, tragedies teach us that life doesn't always go as planned. So many of these stories featured characters who wanted something and never got it because they made bad decisions among many other things. Contrast this with the stories Hollywood tells. There is almost always a happy ending and things almost always work out for the characters involved.

It is dangerous to give people the impression that things always work out, and that every story has a happy ending because real life stories don't always have happy endings. We need to make a lot of good decisions in order to have a happy life, and even then things happen that are beyond our control. Tragedies kept that reality at the forefront of our minds, but today I'm not sure we have that so deeply embedded in our consciousness.

This English teacher had a particular interest in Shakespeare, and teaches Romeo and Juliet to her students. She educated me on a particular element of Shakespearean tragedy I found fascinating, in that the tragic character always has a fatal flaw that leads to their doom. In Romeo's case, it is that he acts impulsively without much reflection.

This is another dynamic we would do well to remember. When bad things happen, we are often taught by today's wisdom to blame external forces on these outcomes. If young people get into trouble, we often blame parents, and educational opportunities, and economic realities. While I don't want to dismiss those because they really do factor into these situations, the truth is that there are ways of thinking and acting by these individuals that are not good. Tragedies, like those of Shakespeare, often teach us to start with ourselves and recognize that our own flaws can sometimes lead to our destruction.

As parents and grandparents, you might be inclined to shelter your children from tragic stories, whether they happen in real life or whether they are works of fiction. While we certainly don't want to overwhelm young people with depressing stories, it is important that we don't completely eliminate these types of stories from their lives. They can be very important tools to help them grow.

As Catholics, we can especially be confident in sharing these stories with young people because it also gives us an opportunity to teach about God's interventions in history. God doesn't want us to get hurt, so he revealed his commandments to us as an act of love. Following them can help us avoid a lot of heartache these tragic characters feel. And when those things do happen that are out of our control, God stands with us and helps to give us strength and peace in the midst of these trials.

If Western Civilization as we know it has a future, it will be because we once again begin to value the important contributions tragedies have made to our culture, whether those stories are on paper or on the screen. I hope we see more stories like this in the future.


Dilexit Nos presentations

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

738 Thus the Church's mission is not an addition to that of Christ and the Holy Spirit, but is its sacrament: in her whole being and in all her members, the Church is sent to announce, bear witness, make present, and spread the mystery of the communion of the Holy Trinity...:

All of us who have received one and the same Spirit, that is, the Holy Spirit, are in a sense blended together with one another and with God. For if Christ, together with the Father's and his own Spirit, comes to dwell in each of us, though we are many, still the Spirit is one and undivided. He binds together the spirits of each and every one of us,... and makes all appear as one in him. For just as the power of Christ's sacred flesh unites those in whom it dwells into one body, I think that in the same way the one and undivided Spirit of God, who dwells in all, leads all into spiritual unity.





Dialogue for Justice

Catholic Advocacy to Reduce Poverty

John's Gospel has been called the Gospel of Love. The emphasis on love shows up no less than 25 times! Pentecost Sunday reminds us that we were baptized into the life of the Holy Spirit. Paul's Letter to the Romans has a direct connection to love by reminding us that "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom 5:5). What are we to do with this God-love? Share it. This is how the world will recognize us as his disciples. In his book, In the Spirit, Fr. Richard Hauser, SJ states one of the three roles of the Holy Spirit is to be an enabler. He writes, "...the Spirit is presented as having a special role in strengthening believers to work for the poor outside the Christian community" (p. 50). He continues, "Living under the influence of the Spirit of Christ and becoming like Christ surely does mean one thing: being forever concerned and active in the world to promote the Father's kingdom" (p. 52). Jesus' circle of love excluded no one: not women, not the dead, not an executioner. How have we progressed in expanding our circle of love? Where is the Holy Spirit leading us to widen our circles of love? One of the beautiful messages we learn from the teachings and examples of Christ is that our hearts can expand with this kind of love. Today we exclaim, "Come, Holy Spirit, come!"

Q&A Why Use Incense?

Question: Why do we use incense at Mass?

Answer: The use of incense in religious ceremonies and worship is a practice that predates Christianity, and which is also found in many other religious traditions today.

Incense, which is made from resin infused with aromatic spices and oils, is one of those fundamentally human symbols that incorporates more than one of our senses, helping us to reflect on realities that transcend the everyday details of our lives.

The use of incense in the Church's liturgy — in the Mass, as well as in devotions to the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours — is inspired by the use of incense in the Jewish tradition. In the writings of the Old Testament, we hear about incense being used in the worship of the temple, and Psalm 141 asks, "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering" (vs. 2). The image here is that, as the incense gently rises to heaven, our prayers also rise to God as something sweet and pleasant.

Another ancient use of incense that has also become part of our Catholic tradition is the idea that when we incense something, it's because it is something special or sacred. This is why the Book of the Gospel is incensed during the Liturgy of the Word and the bread, wine, priest celebrant, and congregation are incensed at the presentation of the gifts. To this, we can also add the incensing of the Blessed Sacrament during eucharistic adoration and benediction, and the body of the deceased at the end of the Mass of the Resurrection (the Funeral Mass).


